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**AN ACT**

To repeal sections 105.466, 105.473, 105.485, 105.487, 105.489, 105.492, 105.957, 105.961, 105.963, 105.973, 130.011, 130.021, 130.036, 130.041, 130.046, 130.049, 130.050, 130.054, and 130.057, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof twenty-two new sections relating to ethics, with penalty provisions.

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*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:*

Section A. Sections 105.466, 105.473, 105.485, 105.487, 105.489, 105.492, 105.957,  
2 105.961, 105.963, 105.973, 130.011, 130.021, 130.036, 130.041, 130.046, 130.049, 130.050,  
3 130.054, and 130.057, RSMo, are repealed and twenty-two new sections enacted in lieu thereof,  
4 to be known as sections 105.466, 105.473, 105.485, 105.487, 105.489, 105.492, 105.957,  
5 105.961, 105.963, 130.011, 130.018, 130.019, 130.021, 130.036, 130.041, 130.042, 130.046,  
6 130.049, 130.050, 130.054, 130.057, and 130.062, to read as follows:

105.466. 1. No provision of sections 105.450 to 105.458, 105.462 to [105.468] **105.467**,  
2 and 105.472 to 105.482 shall be construed to prohibit any person from performing any  
3 ministerial act or any act required by order of a court or by law to be performed.

4 2. No provision of sections 105.450 to 105.458, 105.462 to [105.468] **105.467**, and  
5 105.472 to 105.482 shall be construed to prohibit any person from communicating with the  
6 office of the attorney general or any prosecuting attorney or any attorney for any political  
7 subdivision concerning any prospective claim or complaint then under consideration not

8 otherwise prohibited by law.

9 3. No provision of sections 105.450 to 105.458, 105.462 to [105.468] **105.467**, and  
10 105.472 to 105.482 shall be construed to prohibit any person, firm or corporation from receiving  
11 compensation for property taken by the state or any political subdivision thereof under the power  
12 of eminent domain in accordance with the provisions of the constitution and the laws of the state.

105.473. 1. Each lobbyist shall, not later than **January fifth of each year, or** five days  
2 after beginning any activities as a lobbyist, file standardized registration forms, verified by a  
3 written declaration that it is made under the penalties of perjury, along with a filing fee of ten  
4 dollars, with the commission. The forms shall include the lobbyist's name and business address,  
5 the name and address of all persons such lobbyist employs for lobbying purposes, the name and  
6 address of each lobbyist principal by whom such lobbyist is employed or in whose interest such  
7 lobbyist appears or works. The commission shall maintain files on all lobbyists' filings, which  
8 shall be open to the public. Each lobbyist shall file an updating statement under oath within one  
9 week of any addition, deletion, or change in the lobbyist's employment or representation. The  
10 filing fee shall be deposited to the general revenue fund of the state. The lobbyist principal or  
11 a lobbyist employing another person for lobbying purposes may notify the commission that a  
12 judicial, executive or legislative lobbyist is no longer authorized to lobby for the principal or the  
13 lobbyist and should be removed from the commission's files.

14 2. Each person shall, before giving testimony before any committee of the general  
15 assembly, give to the secretary of such committee such person's name and address and the  
16 identity of any lobbyist or organization, if any, on whose behalf such person appears. A person  
17 who is not a lobbyist as defined in section 105.470 shall not be required to give such person's  
18 address if the committee determines that the giving of such address would endanger the person's  
19 physical health.

20 3. (1) During any period of time in which a lobbyist continues to act as an executive  
21 lobbyist, judicial lobbyist or a legislative lobbyist, the lobbyist shall file with the commission on  
22 standardized forms prescribed by the commission monthly reports which shall be due at the close  
23 of business on the tenth day of the following month;

24 (2) Each report filed pursuant to this subsection shall include a statement, verified by a  
25 written declaration that it is made under the penalties of perjury, setting forth the following:

26 (a) The total of all expenditures by the lobbyist or his or her lobbyist principals made on  
27 behalf of all public officials, their staffs and employees, and their spouses and dependent  
28 children, which expenditures shall be separated into at least the following categories by the  
29 executive branch, judicial branch and legislative branch of government: printing and publication  
30 expenses; media and other advertising expenses; travel; entertainment; honoraria; meals, food  
31 and beverages; and gifts;

32 (b) An itemized listing of the name of the recipient and the nature and amount of each  
33 expenditure by the lobbyist or his or her lobbyist principal, including a service or anything of  
34 value, for all expenditures made during any reporting period, paid or provided to or for a public  
35 official, such official's staff, employees, spouse or dependent children;

36 (c) The total of all expenditures made by a lobbyist or lobbyist principal for occasions  
37 and the identity of the group invited, the date and description of the occasion and the amount of  
38 the expenditure for each occasion when any of the following are invited in writing:

39 a. All members of the senate;

40 b. All members of the house of representatives;

41 c. All members of a joint committee of the general assembly or a standing committee of  
42 either the house of representatives or senate; or

43 d. All members of a caucus of the general assembly if the caucus consists of at least ten  
44 members, a list of the members of the caucus has been previously filed with the ethics committee  
45 of the house or the senate, and such list has been approved by either of such ethics committees;

46 (d) Any expenditure made on behalf of a public official, or the public official's staff,  
47 employees, spouse or dependent children, if such expenditure is solicited by such public official,  
48 the public official's staff, employees, or spouse or dependent children, from the lobbyist or his  
49 or her lobbyist principals and the name of such person or persons, except any expenditures made  
50 to any not-for-profit corporation, charitable, fraternal or civic organization or other association  
51 formed to provide for good in the order of benevolence;

52 (e) A statement detailing any direct business relationship or association or partnership  
53 the lobbyist has with any public official.

54 The reports required by this subdivision shall cover the time periods since the filing of the last  
55 report or since the lobbyist's employment or representation began, whichever is most recent.

56 4. No expenditure reported pursuant to this section shall include any amount expended  
57 by a lobbyist or lobbyist principal on himself or herself. All expenditures disclosed pursuant to  
58 this section shall be valued on the report at the actual amount of the payment made, or the  
59 charge, expense, cost, or obligation, debt or bill incurred by the lobbyist or the person the  
60 lobbyist represents. Whenever a lobbyist principal employs more than one lobbyist, expenditures  
61 of the lobbyist principal shall not be reported by each lobbyist, but shall be reported by one of  
62 such lobbyists.

63 5. Any lobbyist principal shall provide in a timely fashion whatever information is  
64 reasonably requested by the lobbyist principal's lobbyist for use in filing the reports required by  
65 this section.

66 6. All information required to be filed pursuant to the provisions of this section with the  
67 commission shall be kept available by the executive director of the commission at all times open

68 to the public for inspection and copying for a reasonable fee for a period of five years from the  
69 date when such information was filed.

70 7. No person shall knowingly employ any person who is required to register as a  
71 registered lobbyist but is not registered pursuant to this section. Any person who knowingly  
72 violates this subsection shall be subject to a civil penalty in an amount of not more than ten  
73 thousand dollars for each violation. Such civil penalties shall be collected by action filed by the  
74 commission.

75 8. No lobbyist shall knowingly omit, conceal, or falsify in any manner information  
76 required pursuant to this section.

77 9. The prosecuting attorney of Cole County shall be reimbursed only out of funds  
78 specifically appropriated by the general assembly for investigations and prosecutions for  
79 violations of this section.

80 10. Any public official or other person whose name appears in any lobbyist report filed  
81 pursuant to this section who contests the accuracy of the portion of the report applicable to such  
82 person may petition the commission for an audit of such report and shall state in writing in such  
83 petition the specific disagreement with the contents of such report. The commission shall  
84 investigate such allegations in the manner described in section 105.959. If the commission  
85 determines that the contents of such report are incorrect, incomplete or erroneous, it shall enter  
86 an order requiring filing of an amended or corrected report.

87 11. The commission shall provide a report listing the total spent by a lobbyist for the  
88 month and year to any member or member-elect of the general assembly, judge or judicial  
89 officer, or any other person holding an elective office of state government on or before the  
90 twentieth day of each month. For the purpose of providing accurate information to the public,  
91 the commission shall not publish information in either written or electronic form for ten working  
92 days after providing the report pursuant to this subsection. The commission shall not release any  
93 portion of the lobbyist report if the accuracy of the report has been questioned pursuant to  
94 subsection 10 of this section unless it is conspicuously marked "Under Review".

95 [12. Each lobbyist or lobbyist principal by whom the lobbyist was employed, or in whose  
96 behalf the lobbyist acted, shall provide a general description of the proposed legislation or action  
97 by the executive branch or judicial branch which the lobbyist or lobbyist principal supported or  
98 opposed.

99 This information shall be supplied to the commission on March fifteenth and May thirtieth of  
100 each year.]

105.485. 1. Each financial interest statement required by sections 105.483 to 105.492  
2 shall be on a form prescribed by the commission and shall be signed and verified by a written  
3 declaration that it is made under [penalties] **the penalty** of perjury; provided, however, the

4 [form] **statement** shall not seek information which is not specifically required by sections  
5 105.483 to 105.492.

6           2. Each person required to file a financial interest statement pursuant to [subdivisions  
7 (1) to (12) of] section 105.483 shall file the following information for [himself, his] **such person,**  
8 **the person's** spouse and dependent children at any time during the period covered by the  
9 statement, whether singularly or collectively; provided, however, that said person, if [he] **the**  
10 **person** does not know and [his] **the person's** spouse will not divulge any information required  
11 to be reported by this section concerning the financial interest of [his] **the person's** spouse, shall  
12 state on [his] **the** financial interest statement that [he] **the person** has disclosed that information  
13 known to [him] **the person** and that [his] **the person's** spouse has refused or failed to provide  
14 other information upon [his] **the person's** bona fide request, and such statement shall be deemed  
15 to satisfy the requirements of this section for such financial interest of [his] **the person's** spouse;  
16 and provided further if the spouse of any person required to file a financial interest statement is  
17 also required by section 105.483 to file a financial interest statement, the financial interest  
18 statement filed by each need not disclose the financial interest of the other, provided that each  
19 financial interest statement shall state that the spouse of the person has filed a separate financial  
20 interest statement and the name under which the statement was filed:

21           (1) The name and address of each of the employers of such person from whom income  
22 of one thousand dollars or more was received during the year covered by the statement;

23           (2) The name and address of each sole proprietorship [which he] **the person** owned; the  
24 name, address and the general nature of the business conducted of each general partnership and  
25 joint venture in which [he] **the person** was a partner or participant; the name and address of each  
26 partner or coparticipant for each partnership or joint venture unless such names and addresses  
27 are filed by the partnership or joint venture with the secretary of state; the name, address and  
28 general nature of the business conducted of any closely held corporation or limited partnership  
29 in which the person owned ten percent or more of any class of the outstanding stock or limited  
30 partners' units; and the name of any publicly traded corporation or limited partnership which is  
31 listed on a regulated stock exchange or automated quotation system in which the person owned  
32 two percent or more of any class of outstanding stock, limited partnership units or other equity  
33 interests;

34           (3) The name and address of any other source not reported pursuant to subdivisions (1)  
35 and (2) and subdivisions (4) to (9) of this subsection from which such person received one  
36 thousand dollars or more of income during the year covered by the statement, including, but not  
37 limited to, any income otherwise required to be reported on any tax return such person is required  
38 by law to file; except that only the name of any publicly traded corporation or limited partnership  
39 which is listed on a regulated stock exchange or automated quotation system need be reported

40 pursuant to this subdivision;

41 (4) The location by county, the subclassification for property tax assessment purposes,  
42 the approximate size and a description of the major improvements and use for each parcel of real  
43 property in the state, other than the individual's personal residence, having a fair market value  
44 of ten thousand dollars or more in which such person held a vested interest including a leasehold  
45 for a term of ten years or longer, and, if the property was transferred during the year covered by  
46 the statement, the name and address of the persons furnishing or receiving consideration for such  
47 transfer;

48 (5) The name and address of each entity in which such person owned stock, bonds or  
49 other equity interest with a value in excess of ten thousand dollars; except that, if the entity is a  
50 corporation listed on a regulated stock exchange, only the name of the corporation need be listed;  
51 and provided that any member of any board or commission of the state or any political  
52 subdivision who does not receive any compensation for [his] **the member's** services to the state  
53 or political subdivision other than reimbursement for [his] actual expenses or a per diem  
54 allowance as prescribed by law for each day of such service, need not report interests in publicly  
55 traded corporations or limited partnerships which are listed on a regulated stock exchange or  
56 automated quotation system pursuant to this subdivision; and provided further that the provisions  
57 of this subdivision shall not require reporting of any interest in any qualified plan or annuity  
58 pursuant to the Employees' Retirement Income Security Act;

59 (6) The name and address of each corporation for which such person served in the  
60 capacity of a director, officer or receiver;

61 (7) The name and address of each not-for-profit corporation and each association,  
62 organization, or union, whether incorporated or not, except not-for-profit corporations formed  
63 to provide church services, fraternal organizations or service clubs from which the officer or  
64 employee draws no remuneration, in which such person was an officer, director, employee or  
65 trustee at any time during the year covered by the statement, and for each such organization, a  
66 general description of the nature and purpose of the organization;

67 (8) The name and address of each source from which such person received a gift or gifts,  
68 or honorarium or honoraria in excess of two hundred dollars in value per source during the year  
69 covered by the statement other than gifts from persons within the third degree of consanguinity  
70 or affinity of the person filing the financial interest statement. For the purposes of this section,  
71 a gift shall not be construed to mean political contributions otherwise required to be reported by  
72 law or hospitality such as food, beverages or admissions to social, art, or sporting events or the  
73 like, or informational material. For the purposes of this section, a gift shall include gifts to or  
74 by creditors of the individual for the purpose of canceling, reducing or otherwise forgiving the  
75 indebtedness of the individual to that creditor;

76 (9) The lodging and travel expenses provided by any third person for expenses incurred  
77 outside the state of Missouri whether by gift or in relation to the duties of office of such official,  
78 except that such statement shall not include travel or lodging expenses:

79 (a) Paid in the ordinary course of business for businesses described in subdivisions (1),  
80 (2), (5) and (6) of this subsection which are related to the duties of office of such official; or

81 (b) For which the official may be reimbursed as provided by law; or

82 (c) Paid by persons related by the third degree of consanguinity or affinity to the person  
83 filing the statement; or

84 (d) Expenses which are reported by the campaign committee or candidate committee of  
85 the person filing the statement pursuant to the provisions of chapter 130, RSMo; or

86 (e) Paid for purely personal purposes which are not related to the person's official duties  
87 by a third person who is not a lobbyist, a lobbyist principal or member, or officer or director of  
88 a member, of any association or entity which employs a lobbyist. The statement shall include  
89 the name and address of such person who paid the expenses, the date such expenses were  
90 incurred, the amount incurred, the location of the travel and lodging, and the nature of the  
91 services rendered or reason for the expenses;

92 (10) The assets in any revocable trust of which the individual is the settlor if such assets  
93 would otherwise be required to be reported under this section;

94 (11) The name, position and relationship of any relative within the first degree of  
95 consanguinity or affinity to any other person who:

96 (a) Is employed by the state of Missouri, by a political subdivision of the state or special  
97 district, as defined in section 115.013, RSMo, of the state of Missouri;

98 (b) Is a lobbyist; or

99 (c) Is a fee agent of the department of revenue.

100 3. For the purposes of subdivisions (1), (2) and (3) of subsection 2 of this section, an  
101 individual shall be deemed to have received a salary from [his] **the individual's** employer or  
102 income from any source at the time when [he] **the individual** shall receive a negotiable  
103 instrument whether or not payable at a later date and at the time when under the practice of [his]  
104 **the individual's** employer or the terms of an agreement, [he] **the individual** has earned or is  
105 entitled to anything of actual value whether or not delivery of the value is deferred or right to it  
106 has vested. The term "income" as used in this section shall have the same meaning as provided  
107 in the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and amendments thereto, as the same may be or becomes  
108 effective, at any time or from time to time for the taxable year, provided that income shall not  
109 be considered received or earned for purposes of this section from a partnership or sole  
110 proprietorship until such income is converted from business to personal use.

111 4. Each official, officer or employee or candidate of any political subdivision described

112 in subdivision (11) of section 105.483 shall be required to file a financial interest statement as  
113 required by subsection 2 of this section, unless the political subdivision biennially adopts an  
114 ordinance, order or resolution at an open meeting by September fifteenth of the preceding year,  
115 which establishes and makes public its own method of disclosing potential conflicts of interest  
116 and substantial interests and therefore excludes the political subdivision or district and its  
117 officers and employees from the requirements of subsection 2 of this section. A certified copy  
118 of the ordinance, order or resolution shall be sent to the commission within ten days of its  
119 adoption. The commission shall assist any political subdivision in developing forms to complete  
120 the requirements of this subsection. The ordinance, order or resolution shall contain, at a  
121 minimum, the following requirements with respect to disclosure of substantial interests:

122 (1) Disclosure in writing of the following described transactions, if any such transactions  
123 were engaged in during the calendar year:

124 (a) For such person, and all persons within the first degree of consanguinity or affinity  
125 of such person, the date and the identities of the parties to each transaction with a total value in  
126 excess of five hundred dollars, if any, that such person had with the political subdivision, other  
127 than compensation received as an employee or payment of any tax, fee or penalty due to the  
128 political subdivision, and other than transfers for no consideration to the political subdivision;

129 (b) The date and the identities of the parties to each transaction known to the person with  
130 a total value in excess of five hundred dollars, if any, that any business entity in which such  
131 person had a substantial interest, had with the political subdivision, other than payment of any  
132 tax, fee or penalty due to the political subdivision or transactions involving payment for  
133 providing utility service to the political subdivision, and other than transfers for no consideration  
134 to the political subdivision;

135 (2) The chief administrative officer and chief purchasing officer of such political  
136 subdivision shall disclose in writing the information described in subdivisions (1), (2) and (6)  
137 of subsection 2 of this section;

138 (3) Disclosure of such other financial interests applicable to officials, officers and  
139 employees of the political subdivision, as may be required by the ordinance or resolution;

140 (4) Duplicate disclosure reports made pursuant to this subsection shall be filed with the  
141 commission and the governing body of the political subdivision. The clerk of such governing  
142 body shall maintain such disclosure reports available for public inspection and copying during  
143 normal business hours.

105.487. The financial interest statements shall be filed at the following times, but no  
2 person is required to file more than one financial interest statement in any calendar year:

3 (1) Each candidate for elective office, except those candidates for county committee of  
4 a political party pursuant to section 115.609, RSMo, or section 115.611, RSMo, who is required



5 to file a personal financial disclosure statement shall file a financial interest statement no later  
6 than [fourteen days after the close of filing at which the candidate seeks nomination or election,  
7 and the statement shall be for the twelve months prior to the closing date, except that in the event  
8 an individual does not become a candidate until after the date of certification for candidates, the  
9 statement shall be filed within fourteen days of the individual's nomination by caucus. An  
10 individual required to file a financial interest statement because of the individual's candidacy for  
11 office prior to a primary election in accordance with this section is also required to amend such  
12 statement no later than the close of business on Monday prior to the general election to reflect  
13 any changes in financial interest during the interim] **the thirty-first day of March or within ten**  
14 **days of filing for office, whichever is later, except any candidate for elective office who is**  
15 **required to file a financial interest statement when the election is held in April, shall file**  
16 **the statement no later than the thirty-first day of January or within ten days of filing for**  
17 **office, whichever is later. Each statement filed shall cover the calendar year ending the**  
18 **immediately preceding December thirty-first, provided that the governor, lieutenant**  
19 **governor, any member of the general assembly, or any member of the governing body of**  
20 **a political subdivision may supplement such person's financial interest statement to report**  
21 **additional interests acquired after December thirty-first of the covered year until the date**  
22 **of filing of the financial interest statement.** The appropriate election authority shall provide  
23 to the candidate at the time of filing for [election] **office** written notice of the candidate's  
24 obligation to file pursuant to sections 105.483 to 105.492 and the candidate shall sign a statement  
25 acknowledging receipt of such notice;

26 (2) Each person appointed to office, except any person elected for county committee of  
27 a political party pursuant to section 115.617, RSMo, and each official or employee described in  
28 section 105.483 who is not otherwise covered in this subsection shall file the statement within  
29 thirty days of such appointment or employment. **This statement shall cover the time period**  
30 **described in subsection (1) of this section;**

31 (3) Every other person required by sections 105.483 to 105.492 to file a financial interest  
32 statement shall file the statement annually not later than the [first] **thirty-first** day of [May]  
33 **March** and the statement shall cover the calendar year ending the immediately preceding  
34 December thirty-first; provided that the governor, lieutenant governor, any member of the  
35 general assembly or any member of the governing body of a political subdivision may  
36 supplement such person's financial interest statement to report additional interests acquired after  
37 December thirty-first of the covered year until the date of filing of the financial interest  
38 statement. **If an individual becomes a candidate for office by nomination of a political**  
39 **caucus, the individual shall file a financial interest statement within ten days of the**  
40 **nomination. Such statement shall cover the time period described in subdivision (1) of this**

41 **section;**

42 (4) The deadline for filing any statement required by sections 105.483 to 105.492 shall  
43 be 5:00 p.m. of the last day designated for filing the statement. When the last day of filing falls  
44 on a Saturday or Sunday or on an official state holiday, the deadline for filing is extended to 5:00  
45 p.m. on the next day which is not a Saturday or Sunday or official holiday. Any statement  
46 required within a specified time shall be deemed to be timely filed if it is postmarked not later  
47 than midnight of the day previous to the last day designated for filing the statement.

105.489. The financial interest statements required to be filed pursuant to the provisions  
2 of sections 105.483 to 105.492, other than pursuant to subsection 4 of section 105.485, shall be  
3 filed with the appropriate filing officer or officers. For the purpose of sections 105.483 to  
4 105.492, the term "filing officer" is defined as:

5 (1) In the case of state elected officials and candidates for such office, and all other state  
6 officials and employees, the filing officer is the commission;

7 (2) In the case of judges of courts of law, the filing officer shall be the clerk of the  
8 supreme court. Financial interest statements filed by judges shall be made available for public  
9 inspection unless otherwise provided by supreme court rule;

10 (3) In the case of persons holding elective office in any political subdivision and  
11 candidates for such offices, and in the case of all other officers or employees of a political  
12 subdivision, the filing officer shall be the commission;

13 **(4) In the case of all other persons required to file financial interest statements for**  
14 **which no filing officer is designated, the filing officer shall be the commission.**

105.492. 1. Any person required in sections 105.483 to 105.492 to file a financial  
2 interest statement who fails to file such statement by the times required in section 105.487 shall,  
3 if such person receives any compensation or other remuneration from public funds for the  
4 person's services, not be paid such compensation or receive such remuneration until the person  
5 has filed a financial interest statement as required by sections 105.483 to 105.492. Any person  
6 required in sections 105.483 to 105.492 to file a financial statement who fails to file such  
7 statement by the time required in section 105.487 and continues to fail to file the required  
8 financial interest statement for thirty or more days after receiving notice from the commission  
9 shall be subject to suspension from office in the manner otherwise provided by law or the  
10 constitution. The attorney general or prosecuting or circuit attorney, at the request of the  
11 commission, may take appropriate legal action to enforce the provisions of this section.

12 2. If a candidate for office does not file a financial interest statement by the close of  
13 business on the twenty-first day after the last day for filing for election for which the person is  
14 a candidate, the commission shall notify the official who accepted such candidate's declaration  
15 of candidacy that the candidate is disqualified. Such election official shall remove the

16 candidate's name from the ballot.

17           3. Failure of any elected official or judge to file a financial interest statement thirty days  
18 after notice from the appropriate filing officer shall be grounds for removal from office as may  
19 be otherwise provided by law or the constitution.

20           4. Any person who knowingly misrepresents or omits any facts required to be contained  
21 in any financial interest statement filed as required by sections 105.483 to 105.496 is guilty of  
22 a class B misdemeanor. Venue for any criminal proceeding brought pursuant to this section shall  
23 be the county in which the defendant resided at the time the defendant filed the financial interest  
24 statement.

25           5. Any lobbyist who fails to timely file a lobbying disclosure report as required by  
26 section 105.473 shall be assessed a late filing fee of ten dollars for every day such report is late.  
27 **Any lobbyist who is assessed such a late fee may appeal this assessment as provided in**  
28 **subsection 7 of section 105.963.**

          105.957. 1. The commission shall receive any complaints alleging violation of the  
2 provisions of:

3           (1) The requirements imposed on lobbyists by sections 105.470 to 105.478;

4           (2) The financial interest disclosure requirements contained in sections 105.483 to  
5 105.492;

6           (3) The campaign finance disclosure requirements contained in chapter 130, RSMo;

7           (4) Any code of conduct promulgated by any department, division or agency of state  
8 government, or by state institutions of higher education, or by executive order;

9           (5) The conflict of interest laws contained in sections 105.450 to [105.468] **105.467** and  
10 section 171.181, RSMo; and

11           (6) The provisions of the constitution or state statute or order, ordinance or resolution  
12 of any political subdivision relating to the official conduct of officials or employees of the state  
13 and political subdivisions.

14           2. Complaints filed with the commission shall be in writing and filed only by a natural  
15 person. The complaint shall contain all facts known by the complainant that have given rise to  
16 the complaint and the complaint shall be sworn to, under penalty of perjury, by the complainant.  
17 No complaint shall be investigated unless the complaint alleges facts which, if true, fall within  
18 the jurisdiction of the commission.

19           3. No complaint shall be investigated which concerns alleged criminal conduct which  
20 allegedly occurred previous to the period of time allowed by law for criminal prosecution for  
21 such conduct. The commission may refuse to investigate any conduct which is the subject of  
22 civil or criminal litigation. The commission, its executive director or an investigator shall not  
23 investigate any complaint concerning conduct which is not criminal in nature which occurred

24 more than two years prior to the date of the complaint. A complaint alleging misconduct on the  
25 part of a candidate for public office, other than those alleging failure to file the appropriate  
26 financial interest statements or campaign finance disclosure reports, shall not be accepted by the  
27 commission within sixty days prior to the primary election at which such candidate is running  
28 for office, and until after the general election.

29 4. Complaints which allege violations as described in this section which are filed with  
30 the commission shall be handled as provided by section 105.961.

31 **5. Complaints claiming campaign finance disclosure requirement violations shall**  
32 **be filed no later than thirty days after the campaign finance report is filed, unless the**  
33 **complaint can be substantiated only with a series of campaign finance disclosure reports,**  
34 **in which case the complaint shall be filed within thirty days of the filing of the last report**  
35 **in the series of reports claimed to violate the requirements. In addition to the contents**  
36 **required for each complaint pursuant to this chapter or chapter 130, RSMo, the copy of**  
37 **the complaint supplied to the person or entity named in the complaint shall include the**  
38 **personal information of the person filing the complaint, including the person's name,**  
39 **address, and telephone number or numbers.**

40 **6. Complaints found by the commission to be motivated by malice or reason**  
41 **contrary to the spirit of any law on which such complaint was based, filed without just**  
42 **cause, shall result in an assessment against the complainant for the reasonable costs**  
43 **incurred by the subject party of the complaint and any other person or entity named**  
44 **therein, in defending against the complaint, and the reasonable costs incurred by the**  
45 **commission in investigating the complaint.**

46 **7. Any complaint filed under this section shall be deemed a closed record under**  
47 **subdivision (14) of section 610.021, RSMo. No information relating to any complaint filed**  
48 **under this section shall be disclosed in any form to the public until the commission has**  
49 **completed the investigation of the complaint and has rendered its findings and conclusions**  
50 **on the complaint. Any person or entity who discloses any such information relating to a**  
51 **complaint before the commission has rendered its findings and conclusions on the**  
52 **complaint shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed two thousand five hundred**  
53 **dollars, and upon conviction, shall be subject to a criminal penalty of a fine not to exceed**  
54 **two thousand five hundred dollars or a term of imprisonment not to exceed one year, or**  
55 **both. The commission shall provide a method requiring the complainant to acknowledge**  
56 **that the complainant understands that the complaint is a closed record and to acknowledge**  
57 **that the complainant understands the penalties for violating this section in substantially**  
58 **the following form:**

59 **"This complaint is a closed record and is protected from disclosure under the**

60 **authority of section 610.021, RSMo. Any person or entity who discloses any information**  
61 **contained in this complaint before the commission has rendered its findings and**  
62 **conclusions shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed two thousand five hundred**  
63 **dollars and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a criminal penalty of a fine not to exceed**  
64 **two thousand five hundred dollars or a term of imprisonment not to exceed one year, or**  
65 **both the fine and imprisonment."**

105.961. 1. Upon receipt of a complaint as described by section 105.957, the  
2 commission shall assign the complaint to a special investigator, who may be a commission  
3 employee, who shall investigate and determine the merits of the complaint. Within ten days of  
4 such assignment, the special investigator shall review such complaint and disclose, in writing,  
5 to the commission any conflict of interest which the special investigator has or might have with  
6 respect to the investigation and subject thereof. Within one hundred twenty days of receipt of  
7 the complaint from the commission, the special investigator shall submit the special  
8 investigator's report to the commission. The commission, after review of such report, shall  
9 determine:

10 (1) That there is reasonable grounds for belief that a violation has occurred; or

11 (2) That there are no reasonable grounds for belief that a violation exists and the  
12 complaint should be dismissed; or

13 (3) That additional time is necessary to complete the investigation, and the status and  
14 progress of the investigation to date. The commission, in its discretion, may allow the  
15 investigation to proceed for additional successive periods of one hundred twenty days each,  
16 pending reports regarding the status and progress of the investigation at the end of each such  
17 period.

18 2. When the commission concludes, based on the report from the special investigator,  
19 or based on an audit conducted pursuant to section 105.959, that there are reasonable grounds  
20 to believe that a violation of any criminal law has occurred, and if the commission believes that  
21 criminal prosecution would be appropriate upon a vote of four members of the commission, the  
22 commission shall refer the report to the Missouri office of prosecution services, prosecutors  
23 coordinators training council established in section 56.760, RSMo, which shall submit a panel  
24 of five attorneys for recommendation to the court having criminal jurisdiction, for appointment  
25 of an attorney to serve as a special prosecutor; except that, the attorney general of Missouri or  
26 any assistant attorney general shall not act as such special prosecutor. The court shall then  
27 appoint from such panel a special prosecutor pursuant to section 56.110, RSMo, who shall have  
28 all the powers provided by section 56.130, RSMo. The court shall allow a reasonable and  
29 necessary attorney's fee for the services of the special prosecutor. Such fee shall be assessed as  
30 costs if a case is filed, or ordered by the court if no case is filed, and paid together with all other

31 costs in the proceeding by the state, in accordance with rules and regulations promulgated by the  
32 state courts administrator, subject to funds appropriated to the office of administration for such  
33 purposes. If the commission does not have sufficient funds to pay a special prosecutor, the  
34 commission shall refer the case to the prosecutor or prosecutors having criminal jurisdiction.  
35 If the prosecutor having criminal jurisdiction is not able to prosecute the case due to a conflict  
36 of interest, the court may appoint a special prosecutor, paid from county funds, upon  
37 appropriation by the county or the attorney general to investigate and, if appropriate, prosecute  
38 the case. The special prosecutor or prosecutor shall commence an action based on the report by  
39 the filing of an information or seeking an indictment within sixty days of the date of such  
40 prosecutor's appointment, or shall file a written statement with the commission explaining why  
41 criminal charges should not be sought. If the special prosecutor or prosecutor fails to take either  
42 action required by this subsection, upon request of the commission, a new special prosecutor,  
43 who may be the attorney general, shall be appointed. The report may also be referred to the  
44 appropriate disciplinary authority over the person who is the subject of the report.

45         3. When the commission concludes, based on the report from the special investigator or  
46 based on an audit conducted pursuant to section 105.959, that there are reasonable grounds to  
47 believe that a violation of any law has occurred which is not a violation of criminal law or that  
48 criminal prosecution is not appropriate, the commission shall conduct a hearing which shall be  
49 a closed meeting and not open to the public. The hearing shall be conducted pursuant to the  
50 procedures provided by sections 536.063 to 536.090, RSMo, and shall be considered to be a  
51 contested case for purposes of such sections. The commission shall determine, in its discretion,  
52 whether or not that there is probable cause that a violation has occurred. If the commission  
53 determines, by a vote of at least four members of the commission, that probable cause exists that  
54 a violation has occurred, the commission may refer its findings and conclusions to the  
55 appropriate disciplinary authority over the person who is the subject of the report, as described  
56 in subsection 7 of this section. After the commission determines by a vote of at least four  
57 members of the commission that probable cause exists that a violation has occurred, and the  
58 commission has referred the findings and conclusions to the appropriate disciplinary authority  
59 over the person subject of the report, the subject of the report may appeal the determination of  
60 the commission to the administrative hearing commission. Such appeal shall stay the action of  
61 the Missouri ethics commission. Such appeal shall be filed not later than the fourteenth day after  
62 the subject of the commission's action receives [actual] notice of the commission's action.

63         4. If the appropriate disciplinary authority receiving a report from the commission  
64 pursuant to subsection 3 of this section fails to follow, within sixty days of the receipt of the  
65 report, the recommendations contained in the report, or if the commission determines, by a vote  
66 of at least four members of the commission that some action other than referral for criminal

67 prosecution or for action by the appropriate disciplinary authority would be appropriate, the  
68 commission shall take any one or more of the following actions:

69 (1) Notify the person to cease and desist violation of any provision of law which the  
70 report concludes was violated and that the commission may seek judicial enforcement of its  
71 decision pursuant to subsection 5 of this section;

72 (2) Notify the person of the requirement to file, amend or correct any report, statement,  
73 or other document or information required by sections 105.473, 105.483 to 105.492, or chapter  
74 130, RSMo, and that the commission may seek judicial enforcement of its decision pursuant to  
75 subsection 5 of this section; and

76 (3) File the report with the executive director to be maintained as a public document; or

77 (4) Issue a letter of concern or letter of reprimand to the person, which would be  
78 maintained as a public document; or

79 (5) Issue a letter that no further action shall be taken, which would be maintained as a  
80 public document; or

81 (6) Through reconciliation agreements or civil action, the power to seek fees for  
82 violations in an amount not greater than one thousand dollars or double the amount involved in  
83 the violation.

84 5. Upon vote of at least four members, the commission may initiate formal judicial  
85 proceedings seeking to obtain any of the following orders:

86 (1) Cease and desist violation of any provision of sections 105.450 to 105.496, or chapter  
87 130, RSMo, or sections 105.955 to 105.963;

88 (2) Pay any civil penalties required by sections 105.450 to 105.496 or chapter 130,  
89 RSMo;

90 (3) File any reports, statements, or other documents or information required by sections  
91 105.450 to 105.496, or chapter 130, RSMo; or

92 (4) Pay restitution for any unjust enrichment the violator obtained as a result of any  
93 violation of any criminal statute as described in subsection 6 of this section.

94

95 The Missouri ethics commission shall give [actual] notice to the subject of the complaint of the  
96 proposed action as set out in this section. The subject of the complaint may appeal the action  
97 of the Missouri ethics commission, other than a referral for criminal prosecution, to the  
98 [administrative hearing commission] **circuit court of Cole County**. Such appeal shall stay the  
99 action of the Missouri ethics commission. Such appeal shall be filed no later than fourteen days  
100 after the subject of the commission's actions receives actual notice of the commission's actions.

101 6. In the proceeding in circuit court, the commission may seek restitution against any  
102 person who has obtained unjust enrichment as a result of violation of any provision of sections

103 105.450 to 105.496, or chapter 130, RSMo, and may recover on behalf of the state or political  
104 subdivision with which the alleged violator is associated, damages in the amount of any unjust  
105 enrichment obtained and costs and attorney's fees as ordered by the court.

106 7. The appropriate disciplinary authority to whom a report shall be sent pursuant to  
107 subsection 2 or 3 of this section shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

108 (1) In the case of a member of the general assembly, the ethics committee of the house  
109 of which the subject of the report is a member;

110 (2) In the case of a person holding an elective office or an appointive office of the state,  
111 if the alleged violation is an impeachable offense, the report shall be referred to the ethics  
112 committee of the house of representatives;

113 (3) In the case of a person holding an elective office of a political subdivision, the report  
114 shall be referred to the governing body of the political subdivision;

115 (4) In the case of any officer or employee of the state or of a political subdivision, the  
116 report shall be referred to the person who has immediate supervisory authority over the  
117 employment by the state or by the political subdivision of the subject of the report;

118 (5) In the case of a judge of a court of law, the report shall be referred to the commission  
119 on retirement, removal and discipline, or if the inquiry involves an employee of the judiciary to  
120 the applicable presiding judge;

121 (6) In the case of a person holding an appointive office of the state, if the alleged  
122 violation is not an impeachable offense, the report shall be referred to the governor;

123 (7) In the case of a statewide elected official, the report shall be referred to the attorney  
124 general;

125 (8) In a case involving the attorney general, the report shall be referred to the prosecuting  
126 attorney of Cole County.

127 8. The special investigator having a complaint referred to the special investigator by the  
128 commission shall have the following powers:

129 (1) To request and shall be given access to information in the possession of any person  
130 or agency which the special investigator deems necessary for the discharge of the special  
131 investigator's responsibilities;

132 (2) To examine the records and documents of any person or agency, unless such  
133 examination would violate state or federal law providing for confidentiality;

134 (3) To administer oaths and affirmations;

135 (4) Upon refusal by any person to comply with a request for information relevant to an  
136 investigation, an investigator may issue a subpoena for any person to appear and give testimony,  
137 or for a subpoena duces tecum to produce documentary or other evidence which the investigator  
138 deems relevant to a matter under the investigator's inquiry. The subpoenas and subpoenas duces



139 tecum may be enforced by applying to a judge of the circuit court of Cole County or any county  
140 where the person or entity that has been subpoenaed resides or may be found, for an order to  
141 show cause why the subpoena or subpoena duces tecum should not be enforced. The order and  
142 a copy of the application therefor shall be served in the same manner as a summons in a civil  
143 action, and if, after hearing, the court determines that the subpoena or subpoena duces tecum  
144 should be sustained and enforced, the court shall enforce the subpoena or subpoena duces tecum  
145 in the same manner as if it had been issued by the court in a civil action; and

146 (5) To request from the commission such investigative, clerical or other staff assistance  
147 or advancement of other expenses which are necessary and convenient for the proper completion  
148 of an investigation. Within the limits of appropriations to the commission, the commission may  
149 provide such assistance, whether by contract to obtain such assistance or from staff employed  
150 by the commission, or may advance such expenses.

151 9. (1) Any retired judge may request in writing to have the judge's name removed from  
152 the list of special investigators subject to appointment by the commission or may request to  
153 disqualify himself or herself from any investigation. Such request shall include the reasons for  
154 seeking removal;

155 (2) By vote of four members of the commission, the commission may disqualify a judge  
156 from a particular investigation or may permanently remove the name of any retired judge from  
157 the list of special investigators subject to appointment by the commission.

158 10. Any person who is the subject of any investigation pursuant to this section shall be  
159 entitled to be represented by counsel at any proceeding before the special investigator or the  
160 commission.

161 11. The provisions of sections 105.957, 105.959 and 105.961 are in addition to other  
162 provisions of law under which any remedy or right of appeal or objection is provided for any  
163 person, or any procedure provided for inquiry or investigation concerning any matter. The  
164 provisions of this section shall not be construed to limit or affect any other remedy or right of  
165 appeal or objection.

166 12. No person shall be required to make or file a complaint to the commission as a  
167 prerequisite for exhausting the person's administrative remedies before pursuing any civil cause  
168 of action allowed by law.

169 13. If, in the opinion of the commission, the complaining party was motivated by malice  
170 or reason contrary to the spirit of any law on which such complaint was based, in filing the  
171 complaint without just cause, [this] **the complaining party shall be assessed the reasonable**  
172 **costs incurred by the subject party of the complaint and any other person or entity named**  
173 **therein, in defending against the complaint, and the reasonable costs incurred by the**  
174 **commission in investigating the complaint. Additionally, the commission's finding shall be**

175 reported to appropriate law enforcement authorities. Any person who knowingly files a  
176 complaint without just cause, or with malice, [is guilty of a class A misdemeanor] **shall be**  
177 **subject to a criminal penalty of a fine not to exceed five thousand dollars or a term of**  
178 **imprisonment not to exceed one year, or both.**

179 14. A respondent party who prevails in a formal judicial action brought by the  
180 commission shall be awarded those reasonable fees and expenses incurred by that party in the  
181 formal judicial action, unless the court finds that the position of the commission was  
182 substantially justified or that special circumstances make such an award unjust.

183 15. The special investigator and members and staff of the commission shall maintain  
184 confidentiality with respect to all matters concerning a complaint until and if a report is filed  
185 with the commission, with the exception of communications with any person which are  
186 necessary to the investigation. The report filed with the commission resulting from a complaint  
187 acted upon under the provisions of this section shall not contain the name of the complainant or  
188 other person providing information to the investigator, if so requested in writing by the  
189 complainant or such other person. Any person who violates the confidentiality requirements  
190 imposed by this section or subsection 17 of section 105.955 required to be confidential is guilty  
191 of a class A misdemeanor and shall be subject to removal from or termination of employment  
192 by the commission.

193 16. Any judge of the court of appeals or circuit court who ceases to hold such office by  
194 reason of the judge's retirement and who serves as a special investigator pursuant to this section  
195 shall receive annual compensation, salary or retirement for such services at the rates of  
196 compensation provided for senior judges by subsections 1, 2 and 4 of section 476.682, RSMo.  
197 Such retired judges shall by the tenth day of each month following any month in which the judge  
198 provided services pursuant to this section certify to the commission and to the state courts  
199 administrator the amount of time engaged in such services by hour or fraction thereof, the dates  
200 thereof, and the expenses incurred and allowable pursuant to this section. The commission shall  
201 then issue a warrant to the state treasurer for the payment of the salary and expenses to the extent,  
202 and within limitations, provided for in this section. The state treasurer upon receipt of such  
203 warrant shall pay the same out of any appropriations made for this purpose on the last day of the  
204 month during which the warrant was received by the state treasurer.

105.963. 1. The executive director shall assess every candidate for state or local office  
2 failing to file with a filing officer other than a local election authority as provided by section  
3 130.026, RSMo, a campaign disclosure report as required by chapter 130, RSMo, other than the  
4 report required pursuant to subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of section 130.046, RSMo, a late  
5 filing fee of ten dollars for each day after such report is due to the commission. The executive  
6 director shall mail a notice, by registered mail, to any candidate and candidate committee

7 treasurer and deputy treasurer who fails to file such report informing such person of such failure  
8 and the fees provided by this section. If the candidate persists in such failure for a period in  
9 excess of thirty days beyond receipt of such notice, the amount of the late filing fee shall increase  
10 to one hundred dollars for each day that the report is not filed, provided that the total amount of  
11 such fees assessed pursuant to this subsection per report shall not exceed three thousand dollars.

12         2. (1) Any candidate for state or local office who fails to file a campaign disclosure  
13 report required pursuant to subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of section 130.046, RSMo, other than  
14 a report required to be filed with a local election authority as provided by section 130.026,  
15 RSMo, shall be assessed by the executive director a late filing fee of one hundred dollars for each  
16 day that the report is not filed, until the first day after the date of the election. After such election  
17 date, the amount of such late filing fee shall accrue at the rate of ten dollars per day that such  
18 report remains unfiled, except as provided in subdivision (2) of this subsection.

19         (2) The executive director shall mail a notice, by certified mail or other means to give  
20 actual notice, to any candidate and candidate committee treasurer and deputy treasurer who fails  
21 to file the report described in subdivision (1) of this subsection informing such person of such  
22 failure and the fees provided by this section. If the candidate persists in such failure for a period  
23 in excess of thirty days beyond receipt of such notice, the amount of the late filing fee shall  
24 increase to one hundred dollars for each day that the report is not filed, provided that the total  
25 amount of such fees assessed pursuant to this subsection per report shall not exceed six thousand  
26 dollars.

27         3. The executive director shall assess every person required to file a financial interest  
28 statement pursuant to sections 105.483 to 105.492 failing to file such a financial interest  
29 statement with the commission a late filing fee of ten dollars for each day after such statement  
30 is due to the commission. The executive director shall mail a notice, by certified mail, to any  
31 person who fails to file such statement informing the individual required to file of such failure  
32 and the fees provided by this section. If the person persists in such failure for a period in excess  
33 of thirty days beyond receipt of such notice, the amount of the late filing fee shall increase to one  
34 hundred dollars for each day thereafter that the statement is late, provided that the total amount  
35 of such fees assessed pursuant to this subsection per statement shall not exceed six thousand  
36 dollars.

37         4. Any person assessed a late filing fee may seek review of such assessment or the  
38 amount of late filing fees assessed, at the person's option, by filing a petition within fourteen days  
39 after receiving actual notice of assessment with the administrative hearing commission, or  
40 without exhausting the person's administrative remedies may seek review of such issues with the  
41 circuit court of Cole County.

42         5. The executive director of the Missouri ethics commission shall collect such late filing

43 fees as are provided for in this section. Unpaid late filing fees shall be collected by action filed  
44 by the commission. The commission shall contract with the appropriate entity to collect such  
45 late filing fees after a thirty-day delinquency. If not collected within one hundred twenty days,  
46 the Missouri ethics commission shall file a petition in Cole County circuit court to seek a  
47 judgment on said fees. All late filing fees collected pursuant to this section shall be transmitted  
48 to the state treasurer and deposited to the general revenue fund.

49 6. The late filing fees provided by this section shall be in addition to any penalty

51 7. If any **lobbyist fails to file a lobbyist report in a timely manner and that lobbyist**  
52 **is assessed a late fee, or if any individual who is required to file a personal financial**  
53 **disclosure statement fails to file such disclosure statement in a timely manner and is**  
54 **assessed a late fee, or if any** candidate fails to file a campaign disclosure report in a timely  
55 manner and that candidate is assessed a late filing fee, the **lobbyist, individual, or candidate[,**  
56 **candidate committee treasurer or assistant treasurer]** may file an appeal of the assessment of the  
57 late filing fee with the commission. The commission may forgive the assessment of the late  
58 filing fee upon a showing of good cause. Such appeal shall be filed within ten days of the receipt  
59 of notice of the assessment of the late filing fee.

60 8. **Any assessment of a late filing fee under this section, except a late fee assessed**  
61 **for failure to file the disclosure report required not later than the eighth day before an**  
62 **election, shall be deemed a closed record under subdivision (14) of section 610.021, RSMo.**  
63 **No information relating to such late filing fees shall be disclosed in any form to the public**  
64 **unless the late fee has been assessed and remains unpaid by the close of the next business**  
65 **day after assessment. Any person or entity who discloses any such information relating to**  
66 **any assessment of a late filing fee in violation of this section shall be subject to a civil**  
67 **penalty not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars, and upon conviction, shall be**  
68 **subject to a criminal penalty of a fine not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars or**  
69 **a term of imprisonment not to exceed one year, or both.**

130.011. As used in this chapter, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, the  
2 following terms mean:

3 (1) "Appropriate officer" or "appropriate officers", the person or persons designated in  
4 section 130.026 to receive certain required statements and reports;

5 (2) "Ballot measure" or "measure", any proposal submitted or intended to be submitted  
6 to qualified voters for their approval or rejection, including any proposal submitted by initiative  
7 petition, referendum petition, or by the general assembly or any local governmental body having  
8 authority to refer proposals to the voter;

9 (3) "Candidate", an individual who seeks nomination or election to public office. The

10 term "candidate" includes an elected officeholder who is the subject of a recall election, an  
11 individual who seeks nomination by the individual's political party for election to public office,  
12 an individual standing for retention in an election to an office to which the individual was  
13 previously appointed, an individual who seeks nomination or election whether or not the specific  
14 elective public office to be sought has been finally determined by such individual at the time the  
15 individual meets the conditions described in paragraph (a) or (b) of this subdivision, and an  
16 individual who is a "write-in candidate" as defined in subdivision (28) of this section. A  
17 candidate shall be deemed to seek nomination or election when the person first:

18 (a) Receives contributions or makes expenditures or reserves space or facilities with  
19 intent to promote the person's candidacy for office; or

20 (b) Knows or has reason to know that contributions are being received or expenditures  
21 are being made or space or facilities are being reserved with the intent to promote the person's  
22 candidacy for office; except that, such individual shall not be deemed a candidate if the person  
23 files a statement with the appropriate officer within five days after learning of the receipt of  
24 contributions, the making of expenditures, or the reservation of space or facilities disavowing  
25 the candidacy and stating that the person will not accept nomination or take office if elected;  
26 provided that, if the election at which such individual is supported as a candidate is to take place  
27 within five days after the person's learning of the above-specified activities, the individual shall  
28 file the statement disavowing the candidacy within one day; or

29 (c) Announces or files a declaration of candidacy for office;

30 (4) "Cash", currency, coin, United States postage stamps, or any negotiable instrument  
31 which can be transferred from one person to another person without the signature or endorsement  
32 of the transferor;

33 (5) "Check", a check drawn on a state or federal bank, or a draft on a negotiable order  
34 of withdrawal account in a savings and loan association or a share draft account in a credit union;

35 (6) "Closing date", the date through which a statement or report is required to be  
36 complete;

37 (7) "Committee", a person or any combination of persons, who accepts contributions or  
38 makes expenditures for the primary or incidental purpose of influencing or attempting to  
39 influence the action of voters for or against the nomination or election to public office of one or  
40 more candidates or the qualification, passage or defeat of any ballot measure or for the purpose  
41 of paying a previously incurred campaign debt or obligation of a candidate or the debts or  
42 obligations of a committee or for the purpose of contributing funds to another committee:

43 (a) "Committee", does not include:

44 a. A person or combination of persons, if neither the aggregate of expenditures made nor  
45 the aggregate of contributions received during a calendar year exceeds five hundred dollars and

46 if no single contributor has contributed more than [two hundred fifty dollars] **the amount set out**  
47 **in subdivision (3) of subsection 1 of section 130.032, as increased by subsection 2 of section**  
48 **130.032**, of such aggregate contributions;

49         b. An individual, other than a candidate, who accepts no contributions and who deals  
50 only with the individual's own funds or property;

51         c. A corporation, cooperative association, partnership, proprietorship, or joint venture  
52 organized or operated for a primary or principal purpose other than that of influencing or  
53 attempting to influence the action of voters for or against the nomination or election to public  
54 office of one or more candidates or the qualification, passage or defeat of any ballot measure, and  
55 it accepts no contributions, and all expenditures it makes are from its own funds or property  
56 obtained in the usual course of business or in any commercial or other transaction and which are  
57 not contributions as defined by subdivision (12) of this section;

58         d. A labor organization organized or operated for a primary or principal purpose other  
59 than that of influencing or attempting to influence the action of voters for or against the  
60 nomination or election to public office of one or more candidates, or the qualification, passage,  
61 or defeat of any ballot measure, and it accepts no contributions, and expenditures made by the  
62 organization are from its own funds or property received from membership dues or membership  
63 fees which were given or solicited for the purpose of supporting the normal and usual activities  
64 and functions of the organization and which are not contributions as defined by subdivision (12)  
65 of this section;

66         e. A person who acts as an authorized agent for a committee in soliciting or receiving  
67 contributions or in making expenditures or incurring indebtedness on behalf of the committee  
68 if such person renders to the committee treasurer or deputy treasurer or candidate, if applicable,  
69 an accurate account of each receipt or other transaction in the detail required by the treasurer to  
70 comply with all record keeping and reporting requirements of this chapter;

71         f. Any department, agency, board, institution or other entity of the state or any of its  
72 subdivisions or any officer or employee thereof, acting in the person's official capacity;

73         (b) The term "committee" includes, but is not limited to, each of the following  
74 committees: campaign committee, candidate committee, continuing committee and political  
75 party committee;

76         (8) "Campaign committee", a committee, other than a candidate committee, which shall  
77 be formed by an individual or group of individuals to receive contributions or make expenditures  
78 and whose sole purpose is to support or oppose the qualification and passage of one or more  
79 particular ballot measures in an election or the retention of judges under the nonpartisan court  
80 plan, such committee shall be formed no later than thirty days prior to the election for which the  
81 committee receives contributions or makes expenditures, and which shall terminate the later of

82 either thirty days after the general election or upon the satisfaction of all committee debt after  
83 the general election, except that no committee retiring debt shall engage in any other activities  
84 in support of a measure for which the committee was formed;

85 (9) "Candidate committee", a committee which shall be formed by a candidate to receive  
86 contributions or make expenditures in behalf of the person's candidacy and which shall continue  
87 in existence for use by an elected candidate or which shall terminate the later of either thirty days  
88 after the general election for a candidate who was not elected or upon the satisfaction of all  
89 committee debt after the election, except that no committee retiring debt shall engage in any  
90 other activities in support of the candidate for which the committee was formed. Any candidate  
91 for elective office shall have only one candidate committee for the elective office sought, which  
92 is controlled directly by the candidate for the purpose of making expenditures. A candidate  
93 committee is presumed to be under the control and direction of the candidate unless the candidate  
94 files an affidavit with the appropriate officer stating that the committee is acting without control  
95 or direction on the candidate's part;

96 (10) "Continuing committee", a committee of continuing existence which is not formed,  
97 controlled or directed by a candidate, and is a committee other than a candidate committee or  
98 campaign committee, whose primary or incidental purpose is to receive contributions or make  
99 expenditures to influence or attempt to influence the action of voters whether or not a particular  
100 candidate or candidates or a particular ballot measure or measures to be supported or opposed  
101 has been determined at the time the committee is required to file any statement or report pursuant  
102 to the provisions of this chapter. "Continuing committee" includes, but is not limited to, any  
103 committee organized or sponsored by a business entity, a labor organization, a professional  
104 association, a trade or business association, a club or other organization and whose primary  
105 purpose is to solicit, accept and use contributions from the members, employees or stockholders  
106 of such entity and any individual or group of individuals who accept and use contributions to  
107 influence or attempt to influence the action of voters. Such committee shall be formed no later  
108 than thirty days prior to the election for which the committee receives contributions or makes  
109 expenditures;

110 (11) "Connected organization", any organization such as a corporation, a labor  
111 organization, a membership organization, a cooperative, or trade or professional association  
112 which expends funds or provides services or facilities to establish, administer or maintain a  
113 committee or to solicit contributions to a committee from its members, officers, directors,  
114 employees or security holders. An organization shall be deemed to be the connected  
115 organization if more than fifty percent of the persons making contributions to the committee  
116 during the current calendar year are members, officers, directors, employees or security holders  
117 of such organization or their spouses;

118 (12) "Contribution", a payment, gift, loan, advance, deposit, or donation of money or  
119 anything of value for the purpose of supporting or opposing the nomination or election of any  
120 candidate for public office or the qualification, passage or defeat of any ballot measure, or for  
121 the support of any committee supporting or opposing candidates or ballot measures or for paying  
122 debts or obligations of any candidate or committee previously incurred for the above purposes.  
123 A contribution of anything of value shall be deemed to have a money value equivalent to the fair  
124 market value. "Contribution" includes, but is not limited to:

125 (a) A candidate's own money or property used in support of the person's candidacy other  
126 than expense of the candidate's food, lodging, travel, and payment of any fee necessary to the  
127 filing for public office;

128 (b) Payment by any person, other than a candidate or committee, to compensate another  
129 person for services rendered to that candidate or committee;

130 (c) Receipts from the sale of goods and services, including the sale of advertising space  
131 in a brochure, booklet, program or pamphlet of a candidate or committee and the sale of tickets  
132 or political merchandise;

133 (d) Receipts from fund-raising events including testimonial affairs;

134 (e) Any loan, guarantee of a loan, cancellation or forgiveness of a loan or debt or other  
135 obligation by a third party, or payment of a loan or debt or other obligation by a third party if the  
136 loan or debt or other obligation was contracted, used, or intended, in whole or in part, for use in  
137 an election campaign or used or intended for the payment of such debts or obligations of a  
138 candidate or committee previously incurred, or which was made or received by a committee;

139 (f) Funds received by a committee which are transferred to such committee from another  
140 committee or other source, except funds received by a candidate committee as a transfer of funds  
141 from another candidate committee controlled by the same candidate but such transfer shall be  
142 included in the disclosure reports;

143 (g) Facilities, office space or equipment supplied by any person to a candidate or  
144 committee without charge or at reduced charges, except gratuitous space for meeting purposes  
145 which is made available regularly to the public, including other candidates or committees, on an  
146 equal basis for similar purposes on the same conditions;

147 (h) The direct or indirect payment by any person, other than a connected organization,  
148 of the costs of establishing, administering, or maintaining a committee, including legal,  
149 accounting and computer services, fund raising and solicitation of contributions for a committee;

150 (i) "Contribution" does not include:

151 a. Ordinary home hospitality or services provided without compensation by individuals  
152 volunteering their time in support of or in opposition to a candidate, committee or ballot  
153 measure, nor the necessary and ordinary personal expenses of such volunteers incidental to the



154 performance of voluntary activities, so long as no compensation is directly or indirectly asked  
155 or given;

156         b. An offer or tender of a contribution which is expressly and unconditionally rejected  
157 and returned to the donor within ten business days after receipt or transmitted to the state  
158 treasurer;

159         c. Interest earned on deposit of committee funds;

160         d. The costs incurred by any connected organization listed pursuant to subdivision [(4)]  
161 **(5)** of subsection 5 of section 130.021 for establishing, administering or maintaining a  
162 committee, or for the solicitation of contributions to a committee which solicitation is solely  
163 directed or related to the members, officers, directors, employees or security holders of the  
164 connected organization;

165             (13) "County", any one of the several counties of this state or the city of St. Louis;

166             (14) "Disclosure report", an itemized report of receipts, expenditures and incurred  
167 indebtedness which is prepared on forms approved by the Missouri ethics commission and filed  
168 at the times and places prescribed;

169             (15) "Election", any primary, general or special election held to nominate or elect an  
170 individual to public office, to retain or recall an elected officeholder or to submit a ballot  
171 measure to the voters, and any caucus or other meeting of a political party or a political party  
172 committee at which that party's candidate or candidates for public office are officially selected.  
173 A primary election and the succeeding general election shall be considered separate elections;

174             (16) "Expenditure", a payment, advance, conveyance, deposit, donation or contribution  
175 of money or anything of value for the purpose of supporting or opposing the nomination or  
176 election of any candidate for public office or the qualification or passage of any ballot measure  
177 or for the support of any committee which in turn supports or opposes any candidate or ballot  
178 measure or for the purpose of paying a previously incurred campaign debt or obligation of a  
179 candidate or the debts or obligations of a committee; a payment, or an agreement or promise to  
180 pay, money or anything of value, including a candidate's own money or property, for the  
181 purchase of goods, services, property, facilities or anything of value for the purpose of supporting  
182 or opposing the nomination or election of any candidate for public office or the qualification or  
183 passage of any ballot measure or for the support of any committee which in turn supports or  
184 opposes any candidate or ballot measure or for the purpose of paying a previously incurred  
185 campaign debt or obligation of a candidate or the debts or obligations of a committee. An  
186 expenditure of anything of value shall be deemed to have a money value equivalent to the fair  
187 market value. "Expenditure" includes, but is not limited to:

188             (a) Payment by anyone other than a committee for services of another person rendered  
189 to such committee;

- 190 (b) The purchase of tickets, goods, services or political merchandise in connection with  
191 any testimonial affair or fund-raising event of or for candidates or committees, or the purchase  
192 of advertising in a brochure, booklet, program or pamphlet of a candidate or committee;

- 194 (d) The direct or indirect payment by any person, other than a connected organization  
195 for a committee, of the costs of establishing, administering or maintaining a committee,  
196 including legal, accounting and computer services, fund raising and solicitation of contributions

- 198 (e) "Expenditure" does not include:
- 199 a. Any news story, commentary or editorial which is broadcast or published by any  
200 broadcasting station, newspaper, magazine or other periodical without charge to the candidate  
201 or to any person supporting or opposing a candidate or ballot measure;
- 202 b. The internal dissemination by any membership organization, proprietorship, labor  
203 organization, corporation, association or other entity of information advocating the election or  
204 defeat of a candidate or candidates or the passage or defeat of a ballot measure or measures to  
205 its directors, officers, members, employees or security holders, provided that the cost incurred  
206 is reported pursuant to [subsection 2 of section 130.051] **section 130.048**;
- 207 c. Repayment of a loan, but such repayment shall be indicated in required reports;
- 208 d. The rendering of voluntary personal services by an individual of the sort commonly  
209 performed by volunteer campaign workers and the payment by such individual of the individual's  
210 necessary and ordinary personal expenses incidental to such volunteer activity, provided no  
211 compensation is, directly or indirectly, asked or given;
- 212 e. The costs incurred by any connected organization listed pursuant to subdivision [(4)]  
213 **(5)** of subsection 5 of section 130.021 for establishing, administering or maintaining a  
214 committee, or for the solicitation of contributions to a committee which solicitation is solely  
215 directed or related to the members, officers, directors, employees or security holders of the  
216 connected organization;
- 217 f. The use of a candidate's own money or property for expense of the candidate's personal  
218 food, lodging, travel, and payment of any fee necessary to the filing for public office, if such  
219 expense is not reimbursed to the candidate from any source;
- 220 (17) "Exploratory committees", a committee which shall be formed by an individual to  
221 receive contributions and make expenditures on behalf of this individual in determining whether  
222 or not the individual seeks elective office. Such committee shall terminate no later than  
223 December thirty-first of the year prior to the general election for the possible office;
- 224 (18) "Fund-raising event", an event such as a dinner, luncheon, reception, coffee,  
225 testimonial, rally, auction or similar affair through which contributions are solicited or received

226 by such means as the purchase of tickets, payment of attendance fees, donations for prizes or  
227 through the purchase of goods, services or political merchandise;

228 (19) "In-kind contribution" or "in-kind expenditure", a contribution or expenditure in a  
229 form other than money;

230 (20) "Labor organization", any organization of any kind, or any agency or employee  
231 representation committee or plan, in which employees participate and which exists for the  
232 purpose, in whole or in part, of dealing with employers concerning grievances, labor disputes,  
233 wages, rates of pay, hours of employment, or conditions of work;

234 (21) "Loan", a transfer of money, property or anything of ascertainable monetary value  
235 in exchange for an obligation, conditional or not, to repay in whole or in part and which was  
236 contracted, used, or intended for use in an election campaign, or which was made or received by  
237 a committee or which was contracted, used, or intended to pay previously incurred campaign  
238 debts or obligations of a candidate or the debts or obligations of a committee;

239 (22) "Person", an individual, group of individuals, corporation, partnership, committee,  
240 proprietorship, joint venture, any department, agency, board, institution or other entity of the  
241 state or any of its political subdivisions, union, labor organization, trade or professional or  
242 business association, association, political party or any executive committee thereof, or any other  
243 club or organization however constituted or any officer or employee of such entity acting in the

245 (23) "Political merchandise", goods such as bumper stickers, pins, hats, ties, jewelry,  
246 literature, or other items sold or distributed at a fund-raising event or to the general public for  
247 publicity or for the purpose of raising funds to be used in supporting or opposing a candidate for  
248 nomination or election or in supporting or opposing the qualification, passage or defeat of a  
249 ballot measure;

250 (24) "Political party", a political party which has the right under law to have the names  
251 of its candidates listed on the ballot in a general election;

252 (25) "Political party committee", a state, district, county, city, or area committee of a  
253 political party, as defined in section 115.603, RSMo, which may be organized as a not-for-profit  
254 corporation under Missouri law, and which committee is of continuing existence, and has the  
255 primary or incidental purpose of receiving contributions and making expenditures to influence  
256 or attempt to influence the action of voters on behalf of the political party;

257 (26) "Public office" or "office", any state, judicial, county, municipal, school or other  
258 district, ward, township, or other political subdivision office or any political party office which  
259 is filled by a vote of registered voters;

260 (27) "Regular session", includes that period beginning on the first Wednesday after the  
261 first Monday in January and ending following the first Friday after the second Monday in May;

262 (28) "Write-in candidate", an individual whose name is not printed on the ballot but who  
263 otherwise meets the definition of "candidate" in subdivision (3) of this section.

**130.018. 1. Every governor-elect shall form a gubernatorial inaugural committee to receive and accept contributions, monetary and in-kind, to be used solely in support of the governor-elect's inaugural activities. The committee shall be subject to all reporting requirements, penalties, procedures, limitations, and obligations of candidate committees and of candidates for the office of governor as provided in this chapter, and shall be subject to any regulations adopted pursuant to such sections.**

**2. No expenditure of public funds shall be made in support of any gubernatorial inaugural activity until the governor-elect has formed a gubernatorial inaugural committee as provided by this section. The expenditure of public funds shall not be subject to the contribution limitation in section 130.032, RSMo.**

**3. For a governor-elect not seeking reelection, any funds remaining in the inaugural committee's bank account after all inaugural expenses have been paid shall escheat to the state.**

**130.019. 1. The house of representatives and the senate shall form a legislative inaugural committee to receive and accept contributions, monetary and in-kind, to be used solely in support of the legislative inaugural activities. The committee shall be subject to all reporting requirements, penalties, procedures, limitations, and obligations of candidate committees and of candidates for offices in the house of representatives as provided in this chapter, and shall be subject to any regulations adopted pursuant to such sections.**

**2. No expenditure of public funds shall be made in support of any legislative inaugural activity until the house of representatives and senate have formed a legislative inaugural committee as provided by this section. The expenditure of public funds shall not be subject to the contribution limitation in section 130.032.**

**3. Any funds remaining in the legislative inaugural committee's bank account after all legislative inaugural expenses have been paid shall escheat to the state.**

130.021. 1. Every committee shall have a treasurer who, except as provided in subsection 10 of this section, shall be a resident of this state. A committee may also have a deputy treasurer who, except as provided in subsection 10 of this section, shall be a resident of this state, to serve in the capacity of committee treasurer in the event the committee treasurer is unable for any reason to perform the treasurer's duties.

2. Every candidate for offices listed in subsection 1 of section 130.016 who has not filed a statement of exemption pursuant to that subsection and every candidate for offices listed in subsection 6 of section 130.016 who is not excluded from filing a statement of organization and disclosure reports pursuant to subsection 6 shall form a candidate committee and appoint a

10 treasurer. Thereafter, all contributions on hand and all further contributions received by such  
11 candidate and any of the candidate's own funds to be used in support of the person's candidacy  
12 shall be deposited in a candidate committee depository account established pursuant to the  
13 provisions of subsection 4 of this section, and all expenditures shall be made through the  
14 candidate, treasurer or deputy treasurer of the person's candidate committee. Nothing in this  
15 chapter shall prevent a candidate from appointing himself or herself as a committee of one and  
16 serving as the person's own treasurer, maintaining the candidate's own records and filing all the  
17 reports and statements required to be filed by the treasurer of a candidate committee.

18 3. A candidate who has more than one candidate committee supporting the person's  
19 candidacy shall designate one of those candidate committees as the committee responsible for  
20 consolidating the aggregate contributions to all such committees under the candidate's control  
21 and direction as required by section 130.041.

22 4. (1) Every committee shall have a single official fund depository within this state  
23 which shall be a federally or state-chartered bank, a federally or state-chartered savings and loan  
24 association, or a federally or state-chartered credit union in which the committee shall open and  
25 thereafter maintain at least one official depository account in its own name. An "official  
26 depository account" shall be a checking account or some type of negotiable draft or negotiable  
27 order of withdrawal account, and the official fund depository shall, regarding an official  
28 depository account, be a type of financial institution which provides a record of deposits,  
29 canceled checks or other canceled instruments of withdrawal evidencing each transaction by  
30 maintaining copies within this state of such instruments and other transactions. All contributions  
31 which the committee receives in money, checks and other negotiable instruments shall be  
32 deposited in a committee's official depository account. Contributions shall not be accepted and  
33 expenditures shall not be made by a committee except by or through an official depository  
34 account and the committee treasurer, deputy treasurer or candidate. Contributions received by  
35 a committee shall not be commingled with any funds of an agent of the committee, a candidate  
36 or any other person, except that contributions from a candidate of the candidate's own funds to  
37 the person's candidate committee shall be deposited to an official depository account of the  
38 person's candidate committee. No expenditure shall be made by a committee when the office  
39 of committee treasurer is vacant except that when the office of a candidate committee treasurer  
40 is vacant, the candidate shall be the treasurer until the candidate appoints a new treasurer.

41 (2) A committee treasurer, deputy treasurer or candidate may withdraw funds from a  
42 committee's official depository account and deposit such funds in one or more savings accounts  
43 in the committee's name in any bank, savings and loan association or credit union within this  
44 state, and may also withdraw funds from an official depository account for investment in the  
45 committee's name in any certificate of deposit, bond or security. Proceeds from interest or

46 dividends from a savings account or other investment or proceeds from withdrawals from a  
47 savings account or from the sale of an investment shall not be expended or reinvested, except  
48 in the case of renewals of certificates of deposit, without first redepositing such proceeds in an  
49 official depository account. Investments, other than savings accounts, held outside the  
50 committee's official depository account at any time during a reporting period shall be disclosed  
51 by description, amount, any identifying numbers and the name and address of any institution or  
52 person in which or through which it is held in an attachment to disclosure reports the committee  
53 is required to file. Proceeds from an investment such as interest or dividends or proceeds from  
54 its sale, shall be reported by date and amount. In the case of the sale of an investment, the names  
55 and addresses of the persons involved in the transaction shall also be stated. Funds held in  
56 savings accounts and investments, including interest earned, shall be included in the report of  
57 money on hand as required by section 130.041.

58         5. The treasurer or deputy treasurer acting on behalf of any person or organization or  
59 group of persons which is a committee by virtue of the definitions of "committee" in section  
60 130.011 and any candidate who is not excluded from forming a committee in accordance with  
61 the provisions of section 130.016 shall file a statement of organization with the appropriate  
62 officer within twenty days after the person or organization becomes a committee but no later than  
63 the date for filing the first report required pursuant to the provisions of section 130.046. The  
64 statement of organization shall contain the following information:

65         (1) The name, mailing address and telephone number, if any, of the committee filing the  
66 statement of organization. If the committee is deemed to be affiliated with a connected  
67 organization as provided in subdivision (11) of section 130.011, the name of the connected  
68 organization, or a legally registered fictitious name which reasonably identifies the connected  
69 organization, shall appear in the name of the committee. If the committee is a candidate  
70 committee, the name of the candidate shall be a part of the committee's name;

71         (2) The name, mailing address and telephone number of the candidate;

72         (3) The name, mailing address and telephone number of the committee treasurer, and the  
73 name, mailing address and telephone number of its deputy treasurer if the committee has named  
74 a deputy treasurer;

75         (4) The names, mailing addresses and titles of its officers, if any;

76         (5) The name and mailing address of any connected organizations with which the  
77 committee is affiliated;

78         (6) The name and mailing address of its depository, and the name and account number  
79 of each account the committee has in the depository, **except that when the report is required**  
80 **to be filed with an appropriate officer, as defined in section 130.021, other than the**  
81 **Missouri ethics commission, the account number of each account may be omitted;**

82 (7) Identification of the major nature of the committee such as a candidate committee,  
83 campaign committee, continuing committee, political party committee, incumbent committee,  
84 or any other committee according to the definition of "committee" in section 130.011;

85 (8) In the case of the candidate committee designated in subsection 3 of this section, the  
86 full name and address of each other candidate committee which is under the control and direction  
87 of the same candidate, together with the name, address and telephone number of the treasurer of

89 (9) The name and office sought of each candidate supported or opposed by the

91 (10) The ballot measure concerned, if any, and whether the committee is in favor of or  
92 opposed to such measure.

93 6. A committee may omit the information required in subdivisions (9) and (10) of  
94 subsection 5 of this section if, on the date on which it is required to file a statement of  
95 organization, the committee has not yet determined the particular candidates or particular ballot  
96 measures it will support or oppose. Any contribution received over the allowable contribution  
97 limits described in section 130.032 shall be returned to the contributor by the committee within  
98 five business days of the declaration of candidacy or position on a candidate or a particular ballot  
99 measure of the committee.

100 7. A committee which has filed a statement of organization and has not terminated shall  
101 not be required to file another statement of organization, except that when there is a change in  
102 any of the information previously reported as required by subdivisions (1) to (8) of subsection  
103 5 of this section an amended statement of organization shall be filed within twenty days after the  
104 change occurs, but no later than the date of the filing of the next report required to be filed by  
105 that committee by section 130.046.

106 8. Upon termination of a committee, a termination statement indicating dissolution shall  
107 be filed not later than ten days after the date of dissolution with the appropriate officer or officers  
108 with whom the committee's statement of organization was filed. The termination statement shall  
109 include: the distribution made of any remaining surplus funds and the disposition of any deficits;  
110 and the name, mailing address and telephone number of the individual responsible for preserving  
111 the committee's records and accounts as required in section 130.036.

112 9. Any statement required by this section shall be signed and attested by the committee  
113 treasurer or deputy treasurer, and by the candidate in the case of a candidate committee.

114 10. A committee domiciled outside this state shall be required to file a statement of  
115 organization and appoint a treasurer residing in this state and open an account in a depository  
116 within this state; provided that either of the following conditions prevails:

117 (1) The aggregate of all contributions received from persons domiciled in this state

118 exceeds twenty percent in total dollar amount of all funds received by the committee in the  
119 preceding twelve months; or

120 (2) The aggregate of all contributions and expenditures made to support or oppose  
121 candidates and ballot measures in this state exceeds one thousand five hundred dollars in the  
122 current calendar year.

123 11. If a committee domiciled in this state receives a contribution of one thousand five  
124 hundred dollars or more from any committee domiciled outside of this state, the committee  
125 domiciled in this state shall file a disclosure report with the commission. The report shall  
126 disclose the full name, mailing address, telephone numbers and domicile of the contributing  
127 committee and the date and amount of the contribution. The report shall be filed within  
128 forty-eight hours of the receipt of such contribution if the contribution is received after the last  
129 reporting date before the election.

130.036. 1. The candidate, treasurer or deputy treasurer of a committee shall maintain  
2 accurate records and accounts on a current basis. The records and accounts shall be maintained  
3 in accordance with accepted normal bookkeeping procedures and shall contain the bills, receipts,  
4 deposit records, canceled checks and other detailed information necessary to prepare and  
5 substantiate any statement or report required to be filed pursuant to this chapter. Every person  
6 who acts as an agent for a committee in receiving contributions, making expenditures or  
7 incurring indebtedness for the committee shall, on request of that committee's treasurer, deputy  
8 treasurer or candidate, but in any event within five days after any such action, render to the  
9 candidate, committee treasurer or deputy treasurer a detailed account thereof, including names,  
10 addresses, dates, exact amounts and any other details required by the candidate, treasurer or  
11 deputy treasurer to comply with this chapter. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 4 of  
12 section 130.021 prohibiting commingling of funds, an individual, trade or professional  
13 association, business entity, or labor organization which acts as an agent for a committee in  
14 receiving contributions may deposit contributions received on behalf of the committee to the  
15 agent's account within a financial institution within this state, for purposes of facilitating  
16 transmittal of the contributions to the candidate, committee treasurer or deputy treasurer. Such  
17 contributions shall not be held in the agent's account for more than five days after the date the  
18 contribution was received by the agent, and shall not be transferred to the account of any other  
19 agent or person, other than the committee treasurer.

20 2. Unless a contribution is rejected by the candidate or committee and returned to the  
21 donor or transmitted to the state treasurer within ten business days after its receipt, it shall be  
22 considered received and accepted on the date received, notwithstanding the fact that it was not  
23 deposited by the closing date of a reporting period.

24 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 130.041 that only contributors of more than



25 one hundred dollars shall be reported by name and address for all committees, the committee's  
26 records shall contain a listing of each contribution received by the committee, including those  
27 accepted and those which are rejected and either returned to the donor or transmitted to the state  
28 treasurer. Each contribution, regardless of the amount, shall be recorded by date received, name  
29 and address of the contributor and the amount of the contribution, except that any contributions  
30 from unidentifiable persons which are received through fund-raising activities and events as  
31 permitted in subsection 6 of section 130.031 shall be recorded to show the dates and amounts  
32 of all such contributions received together with information contained in statements required by  
33 subsection 6 of section 130.031. The procedure for recording contributions shall be of a type  
34 which enables the candidate, committee treasurer or deputy treasurer to maintain a continuing  
35 total of all contributions received from any one contributor.

36 4. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 130.041 that certain expenditures need not  
37 be identified in reports by name and address of the payee, the committee's records shall include  
38 a listing of each expenditure made and each contract, promise or agreement to make an  
39 expenditure, showing the date and amount of each transaction, the name and address of the  
40 person to whom the expenditure was made or promised, and the purpose of each expenditure  
41 made or promised.

42 5. In the case of a committee which makes expenditures for both the support or  
43 opposition of any candidate and the passage or defeat of a ballot measure, the committee  
44 treasurer shall maintain records segregated according to each candidate or measure for which the  
45 expenditures were made.

46 6. Records shall indicate which transactions, either contributions received or  
47 expenditures made, were cash transactions or in-kind transactions.

48 7. Any candidate who, pursuant to section 130.016, is exempt from the requirements to  
49 form a committee shall maintain records of each contribution received or expenditure made in  
50 support of his candidacy. Any other person or combination of persons who, although not deemed  
51 to be a committee according to the definition of the term "committee" in section 130.011, accepts  
52 contributions or makes expenditures, other than direct contributions from the person's own funds,  
53 for the purpose of supporting or opposing the election or defeat of any candidate or for the  
54 purpose of supporting or opposing the qualifications, passage or defeat of any ballot measure  
55 shall maintain records of each contribution received or expenditure made. The records shall  
56 include name, address and amount pertaining to each contribution received or expenditure made  
57 and any bills, receipts, canceled checks or other documents relating to each transaction.

58 8. All records and accounts of receipts and expenditures shall be preserved for at least  
59 three years after the date of the election to which the records pertain. Records and accounts  
60 regarding supplemental disclosure reports or reports not required pursuant to an election shall

61 be preserved for at least three years after the date of the report to which the records pertain. Such  
62 records shall be available for inspection by the [campaign finance review board] **Missouri ethics**  
63 **commission** and its duly authorized representatives.

130.041. 1. Except as provided in subsection 5 of section 130.016, the candidate, if  
2 applicable, treasurer or deputy treasurer of every committee which is required to file a statement  
3 of organization, shall file a legibly printed or typed disclosure report of receipts and  
4 expenditures. The reports shall be filed with the appropriate officer designated in section  
5 130.026 at the times and for the periods prescribed in section 130.046; **however, any candidate**  
6 **whose appropriate officers are the Missouri ethics commission and the candidate's election**  
7 **authority shall not be required to file reports with the election authority if the report has**  
8 **been filed electronically with the Missouri ethics commission and the candidate has filed**  
9 **a declaration with the election authority that electronic filing will be used exclusively unless**  
10 **notified otherwise.** Except as provided in sections 130.049 and 130.050, each report shall set  
11 forth:

12 (1) The full name, as required in the statement of organization pursuant to subsection 5  
13 of section 130.021, and mailing address of the committee filing the report and the full name,  
14 mailing address and telephone number of the committee's treasurer and deputy treasurer if the  
15 committee has named a deputy treasurer;

16 (2) The amount of money, including cash on hand at the beginning of the reporting  
17 period;

18 (3) Receipts for the period, including:

19 (a) Total amount of all monetary contributions received which can be identified in the  
20 committee's records by name and address of each contributor. In addition, the candidate  
21 committee shall make a reasonable effort to obtain and report the employer, or occupation if  
22 self-employed or notation of retirement, of each person from whom the committee received one  
23 or more contributions which in the aggregate total in excess of one hundred dollars and shall  
24 make a reasonable effort to obtain and report a description of any contractual relationship over  
25 five hundred dollars between the contributor and the state if the candidate is seeking election to  
26 a state office or between the contributor and any political subdivision of the state if the candidate  
27 is seeking election to another political subdivision of the state;

28 (b) Total amount of all anonymous contributions accepted;

29 (c) Total amount of all monetary contributions received through fund-raising events or  
30 activities from participants whose names and addresses were not obtained with such  
31 contributions, with an attached statement or copy of the statement describing each fund-raising  
32 event as required in subsection 6 of section 130.031;

33 (d) Total dollar value of all in-kind contributions received;

34 (e) A separate listing by name and address and employer, or occupation if self-employed  
35 or notation of retirement, of each person from whom the committee received contributions, in  
36 money or any other thing of value, aggregating more than one hundred dollars, together with the  
37 date and amount of each such contribution;

38 (f) A listing of each loan received by name and address of the lender and date and  
39 amount of the loan. For each loan of more than one hundred dollars, a separate statement shall  
40 be attached setting forth the name and address of the lender and each person liable directly,  
41 indirectly or contingently, and the date, amount and terms of the loan;

42 (4) Expenditures for the period, including:

43 (a) The total dollar amount of expenditures made by check drawn on the committee's  
44 depository;

45 (b) The total dollar amount of expenditures made in cash;

46 (c) The total dollar value of all in-kind expenditures made;

47 (d) The full name and mailing address of each person to whom an expenditure of money  
48 or any other thing of value in the amount of more than one hundred dollars has been made,  
49 contracted for or incurred, together with the date, amount and purpose of each expenditure.  
50 Expenditures of one hundred dollars or less may be grouped and listed by categories of  
51 expenditure showing the total dollar amount of expenditures in each category, except that the  
52 report shall contain an itemized listing of each payment made to campaign workers by name,  
53 address, date, amount and purpose of each payment and the aggregate amount paid to each such  
54 worker;

55 (e) A list of each loan made, by name and mailing address of the person receiving the  
56 loan, together with the amount, terms and date;

57 (5) The total amount of cash on hand as of the closing date of the reporting period  
58 covered, including amounts in depository accounts and in petty cash fund;

59 (6) The total amount of outstanding indebtedness as of the closing date of the reporting  
60 period covered;

61 (7) The amount of expenditures for or against a candidate or ballot measure during the  
62 period covered and the cumulative amount of expenditures for or against that candidate or ballot  
63 measure, with each candidate being listed by name, mailing address and office sought. For the  
64 purpose of disclosure reports, expenditures made in support of more than one candidate or ballot  
65 measure or both shall be apportioned reasonably among the candidates or ballot measure or both.  
66 In apportioning expenditures to each candidate or ballot measure, political party committees and  
67 continuing committees need not include expenditures for maintaining a permanent office, such  
68 as expenditures for salaries of regular staff, office facilities and equipment or other expenditures  
69 not designed to support or oppose any particular candidates or ballot measures; however, all such

70 expenditures shall be listed pursuant to subdivision (4) of this subsection;

71 (8) A separate listing by full name and address of any committee including a candidate  
72 committee controlled by the same candidate for which a transfer of funds or a contribution in any  
73 amount has been made during the reporting period, together with the date and amount of each  
74 such transfer or contribution;

75 (9) A separate listing by full name and address of any committee, including a candidate  
76 committee controlled by the same candidate from which a transfer of funds or a contribution in  
77 any amount has been received during the reporting period, together with the date and amount of  
78 each such transfer or contribution;

79 (10) Each committee that receives a contribution which is restricted or designated in  
80 whole or in part by the contributor for transfer to a particular candidate, committee or other  
81 person shall include a statement of the name and address of that contributor in the next disclosure  
82 report required to be filed after receipt of such contribution, together with the date and amount  
83 of any such contribution which was so restricted or designated by that contributor, together with  
84 the name of the particular candidate or committee to whom such contribution was so designated  
85 or restricted by that contributor and the date and amount of such contribution.

86 2. For the purpose of this section and any other section in this chapter except sections  
87 130.049 and 130.050 which requires a listing of each contributor who has contributed a specified  
88 amount, the aggregate amount shall be computed by adding all contributions received from any  
89 one person during the following periods:

90 (1) In the case of a candidate committee, the period shall begin on the date on which the  
91 candidate became a candidate according to the definition of the term "candidate" in section  
92 130.011 and end at 11:59 p.m. on the day of the primary election, if the candidate has such an  
93 election or at 11:59 p.m. on the day of the general election. If the candidate has a general  
94 election held after a primary election, the next aggregating period shall begin at 12:00 midnight  
95 on the day after the primary election day and shall close at 11:59 p.m. on the day of the general  
96 election. Except that for contributions received during the thirty-day period immediately  
97 following a primary election, the candidate shall designate whether such contribution is received  
98 as a primary election contribution or a general election contribution;

99 (2) In the case of a campaign committee, the period shall begin on the date the committee  
100 received its first contribution and end on the closing date for the period for which the report or  
101 statement is required;

102 (3) In the case of a political party committee or a continuing committee, the period shall  
103 begin on the first day of January of the year in which the report or statement is being filed and  
104 end on the closing date for the period for which the report or statement is required; except, if the  
105 report or statement is required to be filed prior to the first day of July in any given year, the

106 period shall begin on the first day of July of the preceding year.

107           3. The disclosure report shall be signed and attested by the committee treasurer or deputy  
108 treasurer and by the candidate in case of a candidate committee.

109           4. The words "consulting or consulting services, fees, or expenses", or similar words,  
110 shall not be used to describe the purpose of a payment as required in this section. The reporting  
111 of any payment to such an independent contractor shall be on a form supplied by the appropriate  
112 officer, established by the ethics commission and shall include identification of the specific  
113 service or services provided including, but not limited to, public opinion polling, research on  
114 issues or opposition background, print or broadcast media production, print or broadcast media  
115 purchase, computer programming or data entry, direct mail production, postage, rent, utilities,  
116 phone solicitation, or fund raising, and the dollar amount prorated for each service.

**130.042. Persons requesting to inspect or copy disclosure reports made and filed  
2 pursuant to this chapter or chapter 105, RSMo, shall provide photo identification with  
3 which to compare and verify their signatures prior to the disclosure reports being made  
4 available for inspection or copying.**

130.046. 1. The disclosure reports required by section 130.041 for all committees shall  
2 be filed at the following times and for the following periods:

3           (1) Not later than the eighth day before an election for the period closing on the twelfth  
4 day before the election if the committee has made any contribution or expenditure either in  
5 support or opposition to any candidate or ballot measure;

6           (2) Not later than the thirtieth day after an election for a period closing on the  
7 twenty-fifth day after the election, if the committee has made any contribution or expenditure  
8 either in support of or opposition to any candidate or ballot measure; except that, a successful  
9 candidate who takes office prior to the twenty-fifth day after the election shall have complied  
10 with the report requirement of this subdivision if a disclosure report is filed by such candidate  
11 and any candidate committee under the candidate's control before such candidate takes office,  
12 and such report shall be for the period closing on the day before taking office; and

13           (3) Not later than the fifteenth day following the close of each calendar quarter.

15 Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, if any committee accepts contributions or  
16 makes expenditures in support of or in opposition to a ballot measure or a candidate, and the  
17 report required by this subsection for the most recent calendar quarter is filed prior to the fortieth  
18 day before the election on the measure or candidate, the committee shall file an additional  
19 disclosure report not later than the fortieth day before the election for the period closing on the  
20 forty-fifth day before the election.

21           2. In the case of a ballot measure to be qualified to be on the ballot by initiative petition  
22 or referendum petition, or a recall petition seeking to remove an incumbent from office,  
23 disclosure reports relating to the time for filing such petitions shall be made as follows:

24           (1) In addition to the disclosure reports required to be filed pursuant to subsection 1 of  
25 this section the treasurer of a committee, other than a continuing committee, supporting or  
26 opposing a petition effort to qualify a measure to appear on the ballot or to remove an incumbent  
27 from office shall file an initial disclosure report fifteen days after the committee begins the  
28 process of raising or spending money. After such initial report, the committee shall file quarterly  
29 disclosure reports as required by subdivision (3) of subsection 1 of this section until such time  
30 as the reports required by subdivisions (1) and (2) of subsection 1 of this section are to be filed.  
31 In addition the committee shall file a second disclosure report no later than the fifteenth day after  
32 the deadline date for submitting such petition. The period covered in the initial report shall begin  
33 on the day the committee first accepted contributions or made expenditures to support or oppose  
34 the petition effort for qualification of the measure and shall close on the fifth day prior to the date  
35 of the report;

36           (2) If the measure has qualified to be on the ballot in an election and if a committee  
37 subject to the requirements of subdivision (1) of this subsection is also required to file a  
38 preelection disclosure report for such election any time within thirty days after the date on which  
39 disclosure reports are required to be filed in accordance with subdivision (1) of this subsection,  
40 the treasurer of such committee shall not be required to file the report required by subdivision  
41 (1) of this subsection, but shall include in the committee's preelection report all information  
42 which would otherwise have been required by subdivision (1) of this subsection.

43           3. The candidate, if applicable, treasurer or deputy treasurer of a committee shall file  
44 disclosure reports pursuant to this section, except for any calendar quarter in which the  
45 contributions received by the committee or the expenditures or contributions made by the  
46 committee do not exceed five hundred dollars. The reporting dates and periods covered for such  
47 quarterly reports shall not be later than the fifteenth day of January, April, July and October for  
48 periods closing on the thirty-first day of December, the thirty-first day of March, the thirtieth day  
49 of June and the thirtieth day of September. No candidate, treasurer or deputy treasurer shall be  
50 required to file the quarterly disclosure report required not later than the fifteenth day of any  
51 January immediately following a November election, provided that such candidate, treasurer or  
52 deputy treasurer shall file the information required on such quarterly report on the quarterly  
53 report to be filed not later than the fifteenth day of April immediately following such November  
54 election. Each report by such committee shall be cumulative from the date of the last report. In  
55 the case of the continuing committee's first report, the report shall be cumulative from the date  
56 of the continuing committee's organization. Every candidate, treasurer or deputy treasurer shall

57 file, at a minimum, the campaign disclosure reports covering the quarter immediately preceding  
58 the date of the election and those required by subdivisions (1) and (2) of subsection 1 of this  
59 section. A continuing committee shall submit additional reports if it makes aggregate  
60 expenditures, other than contributions to a committee, of five hundred dollars or more, within  
61 the reporting period at the following times for the following periods:

62 (1) Not later than the eighth day before an election for the period closing on the twelfth

64 (2) Not later than forty-eight hours after aggregate expenditures of five hundred dollars  
65 or more are made after the twelfth day before the election; and

68 4. The reports required to be filed no later than the thirtieth day after an election and any

72 recent disclosure report filed and end on the closing date for the period covered. If the  
73 committee has not previously filed a disclosure report, the period covered begins on the date the  
74 committee was formed; except that in the case of a candidate committee, the period covered  
75 begins on the date the candidate became a candidate according to the definition of the term  
76 candidate in section 130.011.

77 5. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this chapter to the contrary:

78 (1) Certain disclosure reports pertaining to any candidate who receives nomination in  
79 a primary election and thereby seeks election in the immediately succeeding general election  
80 shall not be required in the following cases:

81 (a) If there are less than fifty days between a primary election and the immediately  
82 succeeding general election, the disclosure report required to be filed quarterly; provided that,  
83 any other report required to be filed prior to the primary election and all other reports required  
84 to be filed not later than the eighth day before the general election are filed no later than the final  
85 dates for filing such reports;

86 (b) If there are less than eighty-five days between a primary election and the immediately  
87 succeeding general election, the disclosure report required to be filed not later than the thirtieth  
88 day after the primary election need not be filed; provided that any report required to be filed prior  
89 to the primary election and any other report required to be filed prior to the general election are  
90 filed no later than the final dates for filing such reports; and

91 (2) No disclosure report needs to be filed for any reporting period if during that reporting  
92 period the committee has neither received contributions aggregating more than five hundred

93 dollars nor made expenditure aggregating more than five hundred dollars and has not received  
94 contributions aggregating more than [three hundred dollars] **the amount set out in subdivision**  
95 **(3) of subsection 1 of section 130.032, as increased by subsection 2 of section 130.032**, from  
96 any single contributor and if the committee's treasurer files a statement with the appropriate  
97 officer that the committee has not exceeded the identified thresholds in the reporting period. Any  
98 contributions received or expenditures made which are not reported because this statement is  
99 filed in lieu of a disclosure report shall be included in the next disclosure report filed by the  
100 committee. This statement shall not be filed in lieu of the report for two or more consecutive  
101 disclosure periods if either the contributions received or expenditures made in the aggregate  
102 during those reporting periods exceed five hundred dollars. This statement shall not be filed, in  
103 lieu of the report, later than the thirtieth day after an election if that report would show a deficit  
104 of more than one thousand dollars.

105 6. (1) If the disclosure report required to be filed by a committee not later than the  
106 thirtieth day after an election shows a deficit of unpaid loans and other outstanding obligations  
107 in excess of five thousand dollars, semiannual supplemental disclosure reports shall be filed with  
108 the appropriate officer for each succeeding semiannual period until the deficit is reported in a  
109 disclosure report as being reduced to five thousand dollars or less; except that, a supplemental  
110 semiannual report shall not be required for any semiannual period which includes the closing  
111 date for the reporting period covered in any regular disclosure report which the committee is  
112 required to file in connection with an election. The reporting dates and periods covered for  
113 semiannual reports shall be not later than the fifteenth day of January and July for periods closing  
114 on the thirty-first day of December and the thirtieth day of June;

115 (2) Committees required to file reports pursuant to subsection 2 or 3 of this section  
116 which are not otherwise required to file disclosure reports for an election shall file semiannual  
117 reports as required by this subsection if their last required disclosure report shows a total of  
118 unpaid loans and other outstanding obligations in excess of five thousand dollars.

119 7. In the case of a committee which disbands and is required to file a termination  
120 statement pursuant to the provisions of section 130.021 with the appropriate officer not later than  
121 the tenth day after the committee was dissolved, the candidate, committee treasurer or deputy  
122 treasurer shall attach to the termination statement a complete disclosure report for the period  
123 closing on the date of dissolution. A committee shall not utilize the provisions of subsection 8  
124 of section 130.021 or the provisions of this subsection to circumvent or otherwise avoid the  
125 reporting requirements of subsection 6 or 7 of this section.

126 8. Disclosure reports shall be filed with the appropriate officer not later than 5:00 p.m.  
127 prevailing local time of the day designated for the filing of the report and a report postmarked  
128 not later than midnight of the day previous to the day designated for filing the report shall be



129 deemed to have been filed in a timely manner. The appropriate officer may establish a policy  
130 whereby disclosure reports may be filed by facsimile transmission.

130.049. **1.** An out-of-state committee which according to the provisions of subsection  
2 10 of section 130.021 is not required to file a statement of organization and is not required to file  
3 the full disclosure reports required by section 130.041 shall file reports with the Missouri ethics  
4 commission according to [the provisions of such sections] **this subsection** if the committee  
5 makes contributions or expenditures in support of or in opposition to candidates or ballot  
6 measures in this state in any election covered by this chapter or makes contributions to any  
7 committee domiciled in this state. An initial report shall be filed no later than fourteen days prior  
8 to the date such out-of-state committee first makes a contribution or expenditure in this state,  
9 **and thereafter reports shall be filed at the times and for the reporting periods prescribed**  
10 **in subsection 1 of section 130.046.** [Such initial report shall state the name and address of the  
11 committee receiving such contributions or expenditures.] The contributions or expenditures shall  
12 be made no later than thirty days prior to the election. [The out-of-state committee thereafter  
13 shall file copies of the campaign disclosure report required to be filed in the domicile of the  
14 committee with the Missouri ethics commission as required by subsections 1 to 3 of section  
15 130.046.] No candidate or committee may accept any contribution made by a committee  
16 domiciled outside this state unless the provisions of this section are met.

17 **2. Each out-of-state committee report shall contain:**

130.050. [1. An out-of-state committee which, according to the provisions of subsection  
2 10 of section 130.021, is not required to file a statement of organization and is not required to  
3 file the full disclosure reports required by section 130.041 shall file reports with the Missouri  
4 ethics commission according to the provisions of this subsection if the committee makes  
5 contributions or expenditures in support of or in opposition to candidates or ballot measures in  
6 this state in any election covered by this chapter or makes contributions to any committee  
7 domiciled in this state. An initial report shall be filed on or within fourteen days prior to the date  
8 such out-of-state committee first makes a contribution or expenditure in this state, and thereafter  
9 reports shall be filed at the times and for the reporting periods prescribed in subsection 1 of  
10 section 130.046. Each report shall contain:

11           (1) The full name, address and domicile of the committee making the report and the  
12 name, residential and business addresses, domicile and telephone numbers of the committee's  
13 treasurer;

14           (2) The name and address of any entity such as a labor union, trade or business or  
15 professional association, club or other organization or any business entity with which the  
16 committee is affiliated;

17           (3) A statement of the total dollar amount of all funds received by the committee in the  
18 current calendar year and a statement of the total contributions in the same period from persons  
19 domiciled in this state and a list by name, address, date and amount of each Missouri resident  
20 who contributed an aggregate of more than two hundred dollars in the current calendar year;

21           (4) A list by name, address, date and amount regarding any contributor to the out-of-state  
22 committee, regardless of state of residency, who made a contribution during the reporting period  
23 which was restricted or designated in whole or in part for use in supporting or opposing a  
24 candidate, ballot measure or committee in this state or was restricted for use in this state at the  
25 committee's discretion, or a statement that no such contributions were received;

26           (5) A statement as to whether the committee is required to file reports with the Federal  
27 Election Commission, and a listing of agencies in other states with which the committee files  
28 reports, if any;

29 (6) A separate listing showing contributions made in support of or opposition to each  
30 candidate or ballot measure in this state, together with the date and amount of each contribution;

31 (7) A separate listing showing contributions made to any committee domiciled in this  
32 state with the date and amount of each contribution.

33 2. In the case of a political party committee's selection of an individual to be the party's  
34 nominee for public office in an election covered by this chapter, any individual who seeks such  
35 nomination and who is a candidate according to the definition of the term candidate in section  
36 130.011 shall be required to comply with all requirements of this chapter; except that, for the  
37 purposes of this subsection, the reporting dates and reporting periods in section 130.046 shall not  
38 apply, and the first reporting date shall be no later than the fifteenth day after the date on which  
39 a nomination covered by this subsection was made and for the period beginning on the date the  
40 individual became a candidate, as the term candidate is defined in section 130.011, and closing  
41 on the tenth day after the date the nomination was made, with subsequent reports being made as  
42 closely as practicable to the times required in section 130.046.

43 3.] The receipt of any late contribution or loan of more than two hundred fifty dollars by  
44 a candidate committee supporting a candidate for statewide office or by any other committee  
45 shall be reported to the appropriate officer no later than forty-eight hours after receipt. For  
46 purposes of this subsection the term "late contribution or loan" means a contribution or loan  
47 received after the closing date of the last disclosure report required to be filed before an election  
48 but received prior to the date of the election itself. The disclosure report of a late contribution  
49 may be made by any written means of communication, setting forth the name and address of the  
50 contributor or lender and the amount of the contribution or loan and need not contain the  
51 signatures and certification required for a full disclosure report described in section 130.041. A  
52 late contribution or loan shall be included in subsequent disclosure reports without regard to any  
53 special reports filed pursuant to this subsection.

130.054. 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 3 of section 105.957, RSMo,  
2 any natural person may file a complaint with the Missouri ethics commission alleging failure to  
3 timely or accurately file a personal financial disclosure statement, a campaign finance disclosure  
4 report or a violation of the provisions of this chapter by any candidate for elective office, within  
5 sixty days prior to the primary election at which such candidate is running for office, until after  
6 the general election. Any such complaint shall be in writing, shall state all facts known by the  
7 complainant which have given rise to the complaint, and shall be sworn to, under penalty of  
8 perjury, by the complainant.

9 2. Within the first business day after receipt of a complaint pursuant to this section, the  
10 executive director shall supply a copy of the complaint to the person or entity named in the  
11 complaint, deleting any material identifying the name of the complainant, **unless the complaint**

12 **claims a violation of campaign finance disclosure requirements, in which case the**  
13 **complainant's name shall not be deleted.** The executive director shall notify the complainant  
14 and the person or entity named in the complaint of the date and time at which the commission  
15 shall audit and investigate the allegations contained in the complaint pursuant to subsection 3  
16 of this section.

17 3. Within fifteen business days of receipt of a complaint pursuant to this section, the  
18 commission shall audit and investigate the allegations contained in the complaint and shall  
19 determine by a vote of at least four members of the commission that there are reasonable grounds  
20 to believe that a violation of law has occurred within the jurisdiction of the commission. The  
21 respondent may reply in writing or in person to the allegations contained in the complaint and  
22 may state justifications to dismiss the complaint. The complainant may also present evidence  
23 in support of the allegations contained in the complaint, but such evidence shall be limited in  
24 scope to the allegations contained in the original complaint, and such complaint may not be  
25 supplemented or otherwise enlarged in scope.

26 4. If, after audit and investigation of the complaint and upon a vote of at least four  
27 members of the commission, the commission determines that there are reasonable grounds to  
28 believe that a violation of law has occurred within the jurisdiction of the commission, the  
29 commission shall proceed with such complaint as provided by sections 105.957 to 105.963,  
30 RSMo. If the commission does not determine that there are reasonable grounds to believe that  
31 such a violation of law has occurred, the complaint shall be dismissed. If a complaint is  
32 dismissed, the fact that such complaint was dismissed, with a statement of the nature of the  
33 complaint, shall be made public within twenty-four hours of the commission's action.

34 5. Any complaint made pursuant to this section, and all proceedings and actions  
35 concerning such a complaint, shall be subject to the provisions of subsection 15 of section  
36 105.961, RSMo.

37 **6. Complaints claiming campaign finance disclosure requirement violations shall**  
38 **be filed within thirty days of the filing of the report that is claimed to violate the**  
39 **requirements, unless the complaint can be substantiated only with a series of campaign**  
40 **finance disclosure reports, in which case the complaint shall be filed within thirty days of**  
41 **the filing of the last report in the series of reports claimed to violate the requirements. In**  
42 **addition to the contents required for each complaint pursuant to this chapter or chapter**  
43 **105, RSMo, the copy of the complaint supplied to the person or entity named in the**  
44 **complaint shall include the personal information of the person filing the complaint,**  
45 **including the person's name, address, and telephone number or numbers.**

46 **7. Complaints found by the commission to be motivated by malice or a reason**  
47 **contrary to the spirit of any law on which such complaint was based, filed without just**

48 **cause, shall result in an assessment against the complainant for the reasonable costs**  
49 **incurred by the subject party of the complaint and any other person or entity named**  
50 **therein, in defending against the complaint, and the reasonable costs incurred by the**  
51 **commission in investigating the complaint.**

52 **8. Any complaint filed under this section shall be deemed a closed record under**  
53 **subdivision (14) of section 610.021, RSMo. No information relating to any complaint filed**  
54 **under this section shall be disclosed in any form to the public until the commission has**  
55 **completed the investigation of the complaint and has rendered its findings and conclusions**  
56 **on the complaint. Any person or entity who discloses any such information relating to a**  
57 **complaint before the commission has rendered its findings and conclusions on the**  
58 **complaint shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed two thousand five hundred**  
59 **dollars, and upon conviction, shall be subject to a criminal penalty of a fine not to exceed**  
60 **two thousand five hundred dollars or a term of imprisonment not to exceed one year, or**  
61 **both. The commission shall provide a method requiring the complainant to acknowledge**  
62 **that the complainant understands that the complaint is a closed record and to acknowledge**  
63 **that the complainant understands the penalties for violating this section in substantially**  
64 **the following form:**

65 **"This complaint is a closed record and is protected from disclosure under the**  
66 **authority of section 610.021, RSMo. Any person or entity who discloses any information**  
67 **contained in this complaint before the commission has rendered its findings and**  
68 **conclusions shall be subject to a civil penalty not to exceed two thousand five hundred**  
69 **dollars and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a criminal penalty of a fine not to exceed**  
70 **two thousand five hundred dollars or a term of imprisonment not to exceed one year, or**  
71 **both the fine and imprisonment."**

130.057. 1. In order for candidates for election and public officials to more easily file  
2 reports required by law and to access information contained in such reports, and for the Missouri  
3 ethics commission to receive and store reports in an efficient and economical method, and for  
4 the general public and news media to access information contained in such reports, the  
5 commission shall establish and maintain an electronic reporting system pursuant to this section.

6 2. The ethics commission may establish for elections in 1996 and shall establish for  
7 elections and all required reporting beginning in 1998 and maintain thereafter a state campaign  
8 finance and financial interest disclosure electronic reporting system pursuant to this section for  
9 all candidates required to file. The system may be used for the collection, filing and  
10 dissemination of all reports, including monthly lobbying reports filed by law, and all reports filed  
11 with the commission pursuant to this chapter and chapter 105, RSMo. The system may be  
12 established and used for all reports required to be filed for the primary and general elections in

13 1996 and all elections thereafter, except that the system may require maintenance of a paper  
14 backup system for the primary and general elections in 1996. The reports shall be maintained  
15 and secured in the electronic format by the commission.

16 3. When the commission determines that the electronic reporting system has been  
17 properly implemented, the commission shall certify to all candidates and committees required  
18 to file pursuant to this chapter that such electronic reporting system has been established and  
19 implemented. Beginning with the primary and general elections in 2000, or the next primary or  
20 general election in which the commission has made certification pursuant to this subsection,  
21 whichever is later, candidates and all other committees shall file reports by using either the  
22 electronic format prescribed by the commission or paper forms provided by the commission for  
23 that purpose. Continuing committees shall file reports by electronic format prescribed by the  
24 commission, except continuing committees, **political party committees, or campaign**  
25 **committees** which make contributions equal to or less than [fifteen] **five** thousand dollars in the  
26 applicable calendar year. Any continuing [committee which makes] **committees, political party**  
27 **committees, or campaign committees which make** contributions in support of or opposition  
28 to any measure or candidate equal to or less than [fifteen] **five** thousand dollars in the applicable  
29 calendar year shall file reports on paper forms provided by the commission for that purpose or  
30 by electronic format prescribed by the commission, whichever reporting method the continuing  
31 committee chooses. The commission shall supply a computer program which shall be used for  
32 filing by modem or by a common magnetic media chosen by the commission. In the event that  
33 filings are performed electronically, the candidate shall file a signed original written copy within  
34 five working days; except that, if a means becomes available which will allow a verifiable  
35 electronic signature, the commission may also accept this in lieu of a written statement.

36 4. Beginning January 1, 2000, or on the date the commission makes the certification  
37 pursuant to subsection 3 of this section, whichever is later, all reports filed with the commission  
38 by any candidate for a statewide office, or such candidate's committee, shall be filed in electronic  
39 format as prescribed by the commission; provided however, that if a candidate for statewide  
40 office, or such candidate's committee receives or spends five thousand dollars or less for any  
41 reporting period, the report for that reporting period shall not be required to be filed  
42 electronically.

43 5. A copy of all reports filed in the state campaign finance electronic reporting system  
44 shall be placed on a public electronic access system so that the general public may have open  
45 access to the reports filed pursuant to this section. The access system shall be organized and  
46 maintained in such a manner to allow an individual to obtain information concerning all  
47 contributions made to or on behalf of, and all expenditures made on behalf of, any public official  
48 described in subsection 2 of this section in formats that will include both written and

49 electronically readable formats.

50           6. All records that are in electronic format, not otherwise closed by law, shall be  
51 available in electronic format to the public. The commission shall maintain and provide for  
52 public inspection, a listing of all reports with a complete description for each field contained on  
53 the report, that has been used to extract information from their database files. The commission  
54 shall develop a report or reports which contain every field in each database.

55           7. Annually, the commission shall provide, without cost, a system-wide dump of  
56 information contained in the commission's electronic database files to the general assembly. The  
57 information is to be copied onto a medium specified by the general assembly. Such information  
58 shall not contain records otherwise closed by law. It is the intent of the general assembly to  
59 provide open access to the commission's records. The commission shall make every reasonable  
60 effort to comply with requests for information and shall take a liberal interpretation when  
61 considering such requests.

10 nomination was made, with subsequent reports being made as closely as practicable to the  
11 times required in section 130.046.**

2           [105.973. 1. The ethics commission shall print and make  
3 available a summary of all laws over which the commission has  
4 enforcement powers pursuant to chapter 105 and chapter 130, RSMo.  
5 The summary shall be in plain English and compiled to put  
6 individuals on notice of such laws.

7           2. A candidate shall sign a statement verifying that such  
candidate has received the summary when filing for an office.]
