ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** and **Department of Corrections** assume this proposal would not fiscally impact their agencies.

Officials from the **Department of Social Services - Children's Division (CD)** state this proposal could require the CD or other agencies to supervise visitation between the offending individual and any child, if so ordered by the court. The CD assumes there would be no fiscal impact as the provisions of this proposal could be carried out with existing staff.

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FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal requires courts to make orders concerning custody and visitation rights in a manner that protects any child for whom the parent has custodial or visitation rights. Current law requires custody and visitation orders to protect the child who is the subject of the order.

The proposal also prevents courts from awarding unsupervised visitation or custody to a parent who has committed a sex offense against a child. Current law prevents courts from awarding custody to a parent who has committed a sex offense against the child who is the subject of the order.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
