FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation would change the elements of the crime of public intoxication in a church, school, or courthouse. Current law requires the offender to be "intoxicated and disorderly." The proposal would require the offender to be either "intoxicated or disorderly."

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
