FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** stated this proposal would have no fiscal impact on the Courts.

Officials from the **Office of Administration - Administrative Hearing Commission** anticipate that this proposal will not significantly alter its caseload. However, if other similar bills also pass, there would be fiscal impact. If there are more cases, or more complex cases, there could be a fiscal impact.

Officials from the **Department of Transportation** assumes the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their agency.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections** stated this proposal would have zero to minimal fiscal impact.

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services** stated any costs to prosecutors resulting from this proposal would be absorbed with existing resources.

Officials from the **Office of Administration - Division of Budget and Planning (BAP)** assume the proposal will not result in additional costs or savings to BAP. The proposed legislation may increase total state revenue.

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ASSUMPTION (continued)

Officials from the **Office of Attorney General (AGO)** assume they will need a .5 FTE to assist the Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Professional Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects in issuing and enforcing subpoenas, representation at administrative hearings, and enforcing and recovering civil penalties.

Oversight assumes the AGO will be reimbursed for services from the Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Professional Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects Fund. In addition, the Attorney General may commence an action to recover reasonable attorney fees.

Officials from the **Department of Revenue - Division of Taxation (DOR)** stated that while this proposal will directly affect total State Revenue, the proposal have no fiscal impact on DOR since the department serves as a cashiering function only.

Officials from the **Department of Economic Development - Division of Finance** stated that this proposal will have no fiscal impact on their division. Recovery of expenses will result in a "wash" to the Board of Registration for Architects, Professional Engineers, Professional Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects Board Fund. Any civil penalties collected will be deposited in the state General Revenue Fund.

Officials from the **Office of Secretary of State (SOS)** assumed the rules, regulations and forms issued by the Department of Economic Development could require as many as 4 pages in the *Code of State Regulations*. For any given rule, roughly half again as many pages are published in the *Missouri Register* as in the Code because cost statements, fiscal notes and the like are not repeated in the Code. These costs are estimated. The estimated cost of a page in the *Missouri Register* is \$23. The estimated cost of a page in the *Code of State Regulations* is \$27. The actual costs could be more or less the SOS's estimated cost of \$246 for FY 2005. The impact of this legislation in future years is unknown and depends upon the frequency and length of rules, filed, amended, rescinded or withdrawn.

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process. Any decisions to raise fees to defray costs would likely be made in subsequent fiscal years.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

Businesses employing architects, professional engineers, land surveyors and landscape architects that are assessed civil penalties and costs could see a direct negative fiscal impact as a result of this proposal.

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DESCRIPTION

This proposal prohibits persons from practicing architecture, engineering, land surveying, or landscape architecture in this state without being duly licensed by the Missouri Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects (Board).

The proposal gives the Board authority to file complaints with the Administrative Hearing Commission, initiate investigations, issue subpoenas, and to file with courts of competent jurisdiction for civil penalties to be imposed against persons which are in violation of the provisions of the proposal.

The proposal also places limits on the civil penalties, specifies when the penalties will be paid, and gives the Attorney General the authority to commence action to recover penalties. All penalties collected will be deposited in the General Revenue Fund; and any money assessed and collected by the Board to defray the costs and expenses incurred in connection with investigations and hearings will be placed in the State Board for Architects, Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Landscape Architects Fund.

Any person practicing these professions without a license is guilty of a class A misdemeanor.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
