#### FISCAL ANALYSIS

#### **ASSUMPTIONS**

Officials from the Office of the Secretary of State, the Office of State Courts Administrator, and the Office of the Attorney General assume this proposal would have no impact on their organizations.

Officials from the **Department of Conservation** assume the proposal would require restitution to the state for illegally taking trophy deer and would authorize the Conservation Commission to suspend, revoke, or deny a permit to hunt. The proposed language would credit restitution for illegal deer to the Conservation Commission Fund. The Commission assumes the impact could be positive after the expense of scoring antlers, however, the amount of impact is unknown.

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### ASSUMPTION (continued)

Oversight assumes there would be a significant but unknown amount of restitution paid to the Conservation Commission Fund; and a minimal additional cost to the Department of Conservation for extra documentation, including antler scoring for certain poaching cases. Oversight assumes the Department of Conservation could assume the minimal additional cost with existing resources; however, if additional or unexpected costs are incurred these costs could be addressed through the budget process.

# **DESCRIPTION**

This proposal would require restitution to the state for illegally taking certain trophy deer; and

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authorizes the Conservation Commission to suspend, revoke, or deny a permit to hunt for any person who fails to appear at a hearing or fails to pay a fine imposed for a violation of Missouri fish and game laws.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
