FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Corrections**, **Department of Conservation** and the **Department of Natural Resources** each assume this proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Springfield Police Department** assume the proposal would not fiscally impact them.

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety (DPS)** state this bill attempts to create a temporary license for peace officers who meet minimum requirements. However, the minimum requirements established in this legislation are pre-1994 POST standards which brings up a public safety issue. With only 120 hours, individuals will not have the complete training that is required and this also does not take into account any experience individuals may have.

DPS states they would be required to perform job task analyses regarding the 120 hours of training needed for a holder of a temporary peace officer license, the test containing no more than 135 questions to be administered by POST for a holder of a temporary license to receive a peace officer's license, as well as the twenty-four hours of continuing education needed every three years. DPS assumes the cost of these job task analyses would be unknown, but under

\$100,000 to the General Revenue Fund. DPS assumes they would also incur some expense to update their POST tracking system, since the requirements (including training before obtaining license as well as continuing education after receiving the license) for holders of these temporary licenses would be different that the current holders of peace officer licenses.

DPS stated the training requirements and the test would be valid for five to seven years, when the job task analyses would need to be performed again.

DPS states that POST already has a process in place for applicants wishing to receive their license again. These regulations are found in 11 CSR 75-13.040, 13.060, and 13.070.

Oversight assumes DPS will incur these expenses in FY 2005. Oversight also assumes the proposal may result in a savings to the local political subdivisions (police departments and sheriff offices) if they pay for the training for their employees since this proposal may reduce the amount of initial training and subsequent continuing law enforcement training required for those peach officers who qualify for the temporary peace officer license. Current requirements for obtaining a peace officer license is 470 - 600 hours of training and then 48 hours of continuing education every three years after receiving the license. This proposal reduces those totals to 120 hours and 24 hours respectively.

Officials from the **Kansas City Police Department** and the **St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department** did not respond to our request for fiscal impact.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal establishes a process for obtaining a temporary peace officer license. Applicants must have completed at least one year of peace officer work, which may be as a reserve officer, a certified peace officer, or a similar position in the military; completed at least 120 hours of law enforcement training; passes a criminal history records check; and have an offer of employment from a law enforcement agency. The Department of Public Safety must establish a procedure for the issuing of these licenses. A temporary license will be valid for one year and will allow the temporary officer to work up to 120 hours during that year. Temporary officers must work at least 36 hours per each quarter worked and must be accompanied at all times by a licensed officer or a training officer.

Upon completing 120 hours of work, the temporary officer may take a test for the regular peace officer license, without receiving additional training. Once obtaining a regular license, the officer will be required to receive 24 hours of continuing education every three years as well as receive training in homeland security.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
