### **DESCRIPTION**

The proposed legislation would require a plaintiff, in an action for damages in excess of \$3,000 against an individual or entity licensed by the state to practice a profession, to file an affidavit with the court stating that the plaintiff obtained the written opinion of a similarly licensed professional that the defendant failed to use the care a reasonably prudent and careful professional would have under similar circumstances. The affidavit would be filed within 90 days of the filing of the petition, unless an extension not to exceed an additional 90 days is granted. The case would be dismissed if the plaintiff or the plaintiff's attorney would fail to file the affidavit.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
