FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Transportation**, **Department of Revenue**, **Department of Public Safety** – **Director's Office**, – **Missouri State Water Patrol**, – **Missouri State Highway Patrol**, and the **Office of the State Public Defender** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator (CTS)** expects, after a period of adjustment, substantial compliance with the proposed legislation. CTS would not anticipate a significant increase in the workload of the courts.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation would establish minimum guidelines for allowing a child to ride as a passenger on a motorcycle or motortricycle. A child would be required to be at least eight years old, four feet six inches in height, and 65 pounds in weight. Any person convicted of transporting a child not meeting the minimum requirements on a motorcycle or motortricycle would be guilty of a class C misdemeanor.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
