FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** assume the proposed legislation would have no fiscal impact on the courts.

Officials from the **Department of Social Services (DOS)** assume the proposal gives juvenile courts jurisdiction over children who violate laws dealing with the possession or use of tobacco. Previously this type of violation was the province of the circuit court. There is no fiscal impact to the DOS because children would not normally be placed under the supervision of the Division of Youth Services solely for violation of tobacco control ordinances.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

The proposed legislation would give juvenile courts jurisdiction in cases involving children under the age of 17 who violate state or municipal ordinances or regulations prohibiting the possession or use of tobacco products.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
