## **FISCAL ANALYSIS**

## **ASSUMPTION**

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety** – **Missouri State Highway Patrol**, – **Capitol Police**, – **Director's Office**, and the – **Missouri State Water Patrol** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agencies.

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator (CTS)** assume there may be a number of violations. However, CTS does not expect the degree of enforcement to be so great as to fiscally impact the courts.

Officials from the **Office of Prosecution Services** assume the proposal would not have a significant direct fiscal impact on county prosecutors.

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## ASSUMPTION (continued)

Officials from the **Office of the State Public Defender** assume existing staff could provide representation for those few cases arising where indigent persons were charged with allowing an open house party or having an open house party without taking steps to prevent minors from purchasing, possessing, or consuming nonintoxicating beer, intoxicating liquor, or drugs. Passage of more than one bill increasing penalties on existing crimes or creating new crimes would require the State Public Defender System to request increased appropriations to cover the cumulative cost of representing indigent persons accused in the now more serious cases or in the new additional cases.

#### FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

#### **DESCRIPTION**

The proposed legislation would make it a crime for an owner or possessor of real property to fail to take reasonable steps to prevent a minor from purchasing, possessing, or consuming alcohol, nonintoxicating beer, or a controlled substance on their property. The offense would be a class B misdemeanor.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
