FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

Currently, law enforcement officers who seize hazardous materials as evidence are allowed to collect representative samples and destroy or dispose of the materials with court approval. This bill authorizes law enforcement officials to dispose of hazardous materials upon the proper documentation without court approval. In any prosecution, representative samples of hazardous materials accompanied by photos, video tapes, lab reports, or other means are admissible and deemed competent evidence to verify the identity and quantity of the material because of the danger posed by exposure to the hazardous materials.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
