FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of the Governor** and the **Office of Administration - Division of Facilities Management** assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Office of the Attorney General** assume that any potential costs arising from this proposal can be absorbed with existing resources.

Officials from the **City of Charleston** assume the proposal would result in savings of \$1,000 per year from the preservation of city equipment and costs of roughly \$15,000 per year for utilities, maintenance and insurance.

Officials from the **Office of the Adjutant General** / **Missouri National Guard (OTAG)** state they would retain ownership and control of the Charleston Army National Guard Armory until such time as the state of Missouri no longer requires the armory for military usage. When the armory is determined to be in excess to military needs, the armory would then be declared surplus and available for conveyance to the City of Charleston. OTAG assumes no fiscal impact from the proposal.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

The proposal does not specify the sales price for the property. **Oversight** assumes the Commissioner of Administration will price the property commiserate with its market value, and therefore, the state will not realize a fiscal impact from this proposal. Oversight also assume the conveyance is optional for the City of Charleston and will not result in a negative fiscal impact to the City.
