FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator** assume the proposed legislation would have no fiscal impact on the courts.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** assume passage of this bill would require all sex offenders whose victim(s) was less than seventeen years old to be placed on a global positional (or similarly effective type of) tracking system for perpetual monitoring purposes as a condition of either probation or parole. Potential costs for the DOC would be the result of necessary equipment and trained staff to implement this higher level of supervision. At this time, it is unknown what these costs may be or exactly how the program would be implemented.

Victim's statistics do not exist in every offender file. Of the data that DOC has access to, there are currently 828 who conclusively meet the outlined criteria, and the possibility exists that over 1,000 offenders may be affected.

In summary, increased supervision cost by the DOC due to implementation of this proposal would result in additional costs and although the exact fiscal impact is unknown, it is estimated that potential costs will be in excess of \$100,000 per year.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation requires that when there has been a guilty plea or verdict in any offense involving the offender having sexual intercourse or deviate sexual intercourse with a person younger than 17 years of age, the offender must be electronically monitored while on probation or parole.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
