#### **FISCAL ANALYSIS**

#### <u>ASSUMPTION</u>

Officials from the **Department of Insurance (INS)** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization. It is very likely, however, that there will not be enough data for insurers to calculate rates based on this proposal. Insurers have testified that the entire state of Missouri lacks sufficient data for rate-making purposes for some classification codes and that it is necessary to use other states' data to develop some rates. The INS collects information on open and closed medical malpractice claims. The total closed claim count for the entire state of Missouri from 1995 to 2002 was 5,453 claims.

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#### FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

The proposal may impact small business physicians if medical malpractice rates are reduced.

### **DESCRIPTION**

This proposal requires all insurers providing medical malpractice insurance to health care providers to establish premium rates based on the average judgment awarded in medical malpractice cases by county. For providers practicing in more than one county, the premium rate will be adjusted based on the percentage of the provider's practice conducted in each county.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
