FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Transportation** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agency.

Officials from the **Office of State Courts Administrator (CTS)** assume some cases may become protracted, but CTS assume the proposed legislation would have no fiscal impact on the courts.

Officials from the **Department of Revenue (DOR)** assume the Driver License Bureau in fiscal year 2005 processed 3,229 convictions for excessive blood alcohol content and assumes that this legislation will produce an estimated 1,615 additional five-year denial cases from this legislation. This is based on 50% of those convictions already having on file a driving while intoxicated or excessive blood alcohol content conviction.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

The DOR makes the assumption that they will enter 6 convictions per day for excessive alcohol content that will cause a five-year denial. Based on the above estimates, DOR believes this will have minimal administrative impact and the costs will be absorbed.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

DESCRIPTION

The proposed legislation specifies that a driver's license may be revoked for a period of five years if a person has been convicted twice of driving with excessive blood-alcohol content or has been convicted of driving with excessive blood-alcohol content and driving while intoxicated within a five-year period.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
