ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Economic Development - Division of Professional Registration** state having reviewed the proposed legislation and having sought the conclusion of the appropriate board(s), they are of the opinion the proposal, in its present form, has no fiscal impact on their organization.

Officials from the **Office of Attorney General** assume that any potential costs arising from this proposal can be absorbed with existing resources.

Officials from the **Office of Secretary of State (SOS)** state the fiscal impact for this proposal to the SOS for administrative rules is less than \$1,500. The SOS does not expect additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, the SOS recognizes that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what the office can sustain with its core budget. Therefore, the SOS reserves the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the Governor.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

The proposal may impact small businesses that employ massage therapists.

DESCRIPTION

This proposal changes the laws regarding massage therapy. The proposal: (1) Authorizes the Board of Therapeutic Massage to promulgate rules establishing requirements for granting licenses for applicants from other states who have completed massage therapy programs which are less than 500 hours; (2) Prohibits massage therapy businesses from employing an unlicensed person for the purpose of performing massage therapy services; (3) Requires that copies of all board survey inspections of massage businesses be sent to the business within 30 days of the inspection; (4) Allows the board to waive or extend the time requirements for completion of continuing education requirements under certain circumstances as determined by the board; (5) Exempts nonresident licensed massage therapists from licensure if they are providing services or instruction in conjunction with disaster relief or at special events; and (6) Allows the board to contract for legal services.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
