FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials with the **Department of Health and Senior Services** assume no fiscal impact to their agency.

Officials from the **Secretary of State's Office** assume most joint resolutions are considered by the General Assembly that would require the Secretary of State's office to pay for publishing in local newspapers the full text of each statewide ballot measure as directed by Article XII, Section 2(b) of the Missouri Constitution and Section 116.230-116.290, RSMo. The Secretary of State's office is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. Funding for this item is adjusted each year depending upon the election cycle with \$1.6 million historically appropriated in even numbered fiscal years and \$100,000 appropriated in odd numbered fiscal years to meet these requirements. The appropriation has historically been an estimated appropriation because the final cost is dependent upon the number of ballot measures approved by the General Assembly and the initiative petitions certified for the ballot. In FY 2007, at the August and November elections, there were 6 statewide Constitutional Amendments or ballot propositions that cost \$1.2 million to publish (an average of \$193,000 per issue). Therefore, the Secretary of State's Office assumes, for the purposes of this fiscal note, that it should have the full appropriation authority it needs to meet the publishing requirements. However, because these requirements are mandatory, we reserve the right to require funding to meet the cost of our publishing requirements if the Governor and the General Assembly change the amount or eliminate the estimated nature of our appropriation.

Officials from the **Secretary of State's - Administrative Rules** assume many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The Secretary of State's Office is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to Secretary of State's office for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The Secretary of State's office recognizes that this a small amount and does not expect that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what our office can sustain with our core budget. Therefore, we reserve the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

Officials from the **University of Missouri - Columbia** is unable to determine the costs to the University.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Officials from the **Coordinating Board for Higher Education** assume this proposal does not specify any initiatives to be administered by the Missouri Department of Higher Education, nor any matter which would involve the MDHE, thus leaving this proposal with no impact on the MHTE.

Officials from the **Attorney General's Office (AGO)** assume the provisions of this proposal do not directly affect their agency. However, AGO assumes that because this proposal has the potential to be the subject of litigation, costs are unknown, but are likely to be less than \$100,000.
