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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Insurance**, **Financial Institutions and Professional Registration** assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their agency.

Officials from the **Department of Social Services (DSS) - Division of Medical Services (DMS)** does not believe the DMS would be considered as an entity that holds itself out to receive complaints about health care in hospitals. Therefore, there is no fiscal impact to the DSS.

Officials from the **Department of Mental Health (DMH)** state this proposal should not apply to the Department because none of the DMH facilities are licensed by the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS). If DMH received a complaint about care received in a licensed hospital, DMH would not have jurisdiction to investigate and would forward the complaint to the DHSS or the Department of Social Services, depending on the age of the patient. There is no fiscal impact to the Department.

Officials from the **Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) - Division of Regulation and Licensure (DRL)** state the fiscal impact on the DRL is unknown, but is believed to be in excess of \$100,000. DRL will also need an unknown number of additional staff.

DRL believes there will be an increase in the number of complaint investigations to be completed, but the number and magnitude of those investigations is presently unknown.

Section 197.145.2. states that any public or private entity, including governmental agencies, that hold themselves out as an entity that receives complaints regarding the care delivered in a hospital licensed in the state must forward such complaints to the department. Section 197.145.2 further states that the department must investigate any complaints received which were either not investigated by the forwarding entity or were investigated without a case review.

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<u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

DRL is not sure exactly what entities would be required to report complaints under this legislation. One entity that may be required to report is the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO). In 2006, JCAHO received twenty-six thousand (26,000) complaints nationwide. If Missouri is considered to be an average state, then we could expect to receive 520 complaints annually from JCAHO. Of those 520 complaints, DRL cannot determine how many may be duplicative of complaints that DRL also received and investigated, how many were already investigated with a case review by JCAHO, or how many will require a full investigation and case review by the department. We also have no way of determining how many complaints could come from other entities required to report.

Complaint surveys require sixty-seven (67) hours of staff time for pre-inspection activities, travel time, on-site inspection time, and off-site reviews. Given 2,080 working hours in a year, an employee could perform 31 full complaint investigations a year. Considering the salary for a Health Facility Nursing Consultant to be \$46,284 (2 steps above entry level), along with related fringe benefits, \$100,000 of cost would be exceeded if only two staff were hired. At this time DRL cannot determine the actual number of staff needed.

Section 197.145.5 indicates entities in violation of the proposal would be subject to fines. The proposal does not identify what fund is to receive the fines or for what purpose the fines are to be used. **Oversight** assumes no entities would be fined.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This legislation requires any public or private organization that receives complaints about hospital care to forward the complaints to the Department of Health and Senior Services. The department is allowed to inquire into any complaint that was not investigated by the forwarding organization. Any organization violating the provisions of the bill will be fined up to \$500 for the first offense, and the fine for any second or subsequent offense will increase by \$1,000 for each violation.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
