FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety**, **Office of Administration - Budget and Planning**, **Department of Social Services** and the **Department of Insurance**, **Financial Institutions & Professional Registration** each assume the proposal would have no fiscal impact on their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Department of Mental Health (DMH)** assume this proposal provides for immunity from liability for certain health care professionals deployed during a state of emergency. The impact to DMH would not be significant - it is doubtful the Governor's mandated deployment would impinge on staffing levels to a degree that would jeopardize the level of care and treatment that DMH is statutorily required to provide the citizen's of this state.

Officials from the **Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS)** assume this legislation gives authority to the DHSS to train volunteers to dispense medications in a state of emergency. Volunteers shall dispense the medication under the supervision of a licensed health care provider.

The Center for Emergency Response and Terrorism (CERT) already trains volunteers to aid in the event of a state of emergency. CERT will expand this program to provide training to volunteers on how to dispense medication. CERT will be absorb this additional workload using federal preparedness grant funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

This legislation is not expected to fiscally impact the operations of DHSS. If a fiscal impact were to result, funds to support the program would be sought through the appropriations process.
