## AN ACT

To repeal sections 86.200, 86.207, 86.237, 86.257, 86.260, 86.263, and 86.270, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof seven new sections relating to police retirement.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 86.200, 86.207, 86.237, 86.257, 86.260, 86.263, and

- 2 86.270, RSMo, are repealed and seven new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be
- 3 known as sections 86.200, 86.207, 86.237, 86.257, 86.260, 86.263, and 86.270, to
- 4 read as follows:

86.200. The following words and phrases as used in sections 86.200 to

- 2 86.366, unless a different meaning is plainly required by the context, shall have
- 3 the following meanings:
- 4 (1) "Accumulated contributions", the sum of all mandatory contributions
- 5 deducted from the compensation of a member and credited to the member's
- 6 individual account, together with members' interest thereon;
- 7 (2) "Actuarial equivalent", a benefit of equal value when computed upon
- 8 the basis of mortality tables and interest assumptions adopted by the board of
- 9 trustees;
- 10 (3) "Average final compensation":
- 11 (a) With respect to a member who earns no creditable service on or after
- 12 October 1, 2001, the average earnable compensation of the member during the

- member's last three years of creditable service as a police officer, or if the member has had less than three years of creditable service, the average earnable compensation of the member's entire period of creditable service;
- (b) With respect to a member who is not participating in the DROP pursuant to section 86.251 on October 1, 2001, who did not participate in the DROP at any time before such date, and who earns any creditable service on or after October 1, 2001, the average earnable compensation of the member during the member's last two years of creditable service as a policeman, or if the member has had less than two years of creditable service, then the average earnable compensation of the member's entire period of creditable service;
  - (c) With respect to a member who is participating in the DROP pursuant to section 86.251 on October 1, 2001, or whose participation in DROP ended before such date, who returns to active participation in the system pursuant to section 86.251, and who terminates employment as a police officer for reasons other than death or disability before earning at least two years of creditable service after such return, the portion of the member's benefit attributable to creditable service earned before DROP entry shall be determined using average final compensation as defined in paragraph (a) of this subdivision; and the portion of the member's benefit attributable to creditable service earned after return to active participation in the system shall be determined using average final compensation as defined in paragraph (b) of this subdivision;
  - (d) With respect to a member who is participating in the DROP pursuant to section 86.251 on October 1, 2001, or whose participation in the DROP ended before such date, who returns to active participation in the system pursuant to section 86.251, and who terminates employment as a police officer after earning at least two years of creditable service after such return, the member's benefit attributable to all of such member's creditable service shall be determined using the member's average final compensation as defined in paragraph (b) of this subdivision;
  - (e) With respect to a member who is participating in the DROP pursuant to section 86.251 on October 1, 2001, or whose participation in DROP ended before such date, who returns to active participation in the system pursuant to section 86.251, and whose employment as a police officer terminates due to death or disability after such return, the member's benefit attributable to all of such member's creditable service shall be determined using the member's average final compensation as defined in paragraph (b) of this subdivision; and

- (f) With respect to the surviving spouse or surviving dependent child of a member who earns any creditable service on or after October 1, 2001, the average earnable compensation of the member during the member's last two years of creditable service as a police officer or, if the member has had less than two years of creditable service, the average earnable compensation of the member's entire period of creditable service;
- 55 (4) "Beneficiary", any person in receipt of a retirement allowance or other 56 benefit;
- 57 (5) "Board of police commissioners", any board of police commissioners, 58 police commissioners and any other officials or boards now or hereafter 59 authorized by law to employ and manage a permanent police force in such cities;
- 60 (6) "Board of trustees", the board provided in sections 86.200 to 86.366 to 61 administer the retirement system;
- 62 (7) "Creditable service", prior service plus membership service as provided 63 in sections 86.200 to 86.366;
- 64 (8) "DROP", the deferred retirement option plan provided for in section 65 86.251;
- (9) "Earnable compensation", the annual salary which a member would 66 earn during one year on the basis of the member's rank or position as specified 67 in the applicable salary matrix in section 84.160, RSMo, plus additional 68 69 compensation for academic work as provided in subsection 8 of section 84.160, 70 RSMo, plus shift differential as provided in subdivision (4) of subsection 9 of section 84.160, RSMo. Such amount shall include the member's deferrals to a 71deferred compensation plan pursuant to Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code 72or to a cafeteria plan pursuant to Section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code or, 73 effective October 1, 2001, to a transportation fringe benefit program pursuant to 74Section 132(f)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code. Earnable compensation shall not 7576 include a member's additional compensation for overtime, standby time, court 77 time, nonuniform time or unused vacation time. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the earnable compensation taken into account under the plan established 78 79 pursuant to sections 86.200 to 86.366 with respect to a member who is a noneligible participant, as defined in this subdivision, for any plan year beginning 80 81 on or after October 1, 1996, shall not exceed the amount of compensation that may be taken into account under Section 401(a)(17) of the Internal Revenue Code, 82 as adjusted for increases in the cost of living, for such plan year. For purposes 83 of this subdivision, a "noneligible participant" is an individual who first becomes 84

- 85 a member on or after the first day of the first plan year beginning after the 86 earlier of:
- 87 (a) The last day of the plan year that includes August 28, 1995; or
- 88 (b) December 31, 1995;
- 89 (10) "Internal Revenue Code", the federal Internal Revenue Code of 1986,
- 90 as amended;
- 91 (11) "Mandatory contributions", the contributions required to be deducted
- 92 from the salary of each member who is not participating in DROP in accordance
- 93 with section 86.320;
- 94 (12) ["Medical board", the board of physicians provided for in section
- 95 86.237;
- 96 (13)] "Member", a member of the retirement system as defined by sections
- 97 86.200 to 86.366;
- 98 [(14)] (13) "Members' interest", interest on accumulated contributions at
- 99 such rate as may be set from time to time by the board of trustees;
- 100 [(15)] (14) "Membership service", service as a policeman rendered since
- 101 last becoming a member, except in the case of a member who has served in the
- 102 armed forces of the United States and has subsequently been reinstated as a
- 103 policeman, in which case "membership service" means service as a policeman
- 104 rendered since last becoming a member prior to entering such armed service;
- [(16)] (15) "Plan year" or "limitation year", the twelve consecutive-month
- 106 period beginning each October first and ending each September thirtieth;
- [(17)] (16) "Policeman" or "police officer", any member of the police force
- 108 of such cities who holds a rank in such police force for which the annual salary
- 109 is listed in section 84.160, RSMo;
- 110 [(18)] (17) "Prior service", all service as a policeman rendered prior to the
- 111 date the system becomes operative or prior to membership service which is
- 112 creditable in accordance with the provisions of sections 86.200 to 86.366;
- [(19)] (18) "Reserve officer", any member of the police reserve
- 114 force of such cities, armed or unarmed, who works less than full time,
- 115 with or without compensation, and who, by his or her assigned function
- 116 or as implied by his or her uniform, performs duties associated with
- 117 those of a police officer and who currently receives a service
- 118 retirement as provided by sections 86.200 to 86.366;
- 119 (19) "Retirement allowance", annual payments for life as provided by
- 120 sections 86.200 to 86.366 which shall be payable in equal monthly installments

- or any benefits in lieu thereof granted to a member upon termination of the employment as a police officer and actual retirement;
- 123 (20) "Retirement system", the police retirement system of the cities as 124 defined in sections 86.200 to 86.366;
- 125 (21) "Surviving spouse", the surviving spouse of a member who was the 126 member's spouse at the time of the member's death.
  - 86.207. 1. All persons who become policemen and all policemen who enter or reenter the service of the city after the first day of October, 1957, become members as a condition of their employment and shall receive no pensions or retirement allowance from any other pension or retirement system supported wholly or in part by the city or the state of Missouri, nor shall they be required to make contributions under any other pension or retirement system of the city or the state of Missouri, anything to the contrary notwithstanding.
- 8 2. If any member ceases to be in service for more than one year unless the member has attained the age of fifty-five or has twenty years or more of 10 creditable service, or if the member withdraws the member's accumulated 11 contributions or if the member receives benefits under the retirement system or dies, the member thereupon ceases to be a member; except in the case of a 12member who has served in the armed forces of the United States and has 13 subsequently been reinstated as a policeman. A member who has terminated 14 employment as a police officer, has actually retired and is receiving retirement 15 benefits under the system shall be considered a retired member. 16
- 3. A reserve officer shall not be considered a member of the system for the purpose of determining creditable service, nor shall any contributions be due. A reserve officer shall not be entitled to any benefits from the system other than those awarded when the reserve officer originally retired under section 86.250, nor shall service as a reserve officer prohibit distribution of those benefits.
- 86.237. 1. The board of trustees is authorized to use the city counselor of the specified cities as a legal advisor to the board of trustees and may also appoint an attorney-at-law or firm of attorneys-at-law to serve as the legal advisor and consultant to the board of trustees and to represent the system and the board of trustees in all legal proceedings.
- 2. The board of trustees shall designate a medical [board to be composed for three physicians who shall] director, who shall appoint physicians, lineling himself or herself if appropriate, as he or she deems

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necessary to arrange for and pass upon all medical examinations required under the provisions of sections 86.200 to 86.366[,]. Such physicians shall investigate all essential statements [and certificates] as to physical or mental conditions made by or on behalf of a member in connection with an application for disability retirement and shall report in writing [to the board of trustees its] 13 their conclusions and recommendations upon all the matters referred to [it] 14them. [In addition, the board of trustees may appoint a fourth physician to act 15 as an administrator of the medical board who may, with the consent of the board 16 of trustees, select the members of the medical board and coordinate any reports 17to the board of trustees.] The medical director shall report in writing to 18 the board of trustees conclusions and recommendations concerning all 19 essential statements as to physical or mental conditions made by or on behalf of a member in connection with an application for disability 2122retirement.

86.257. 1. Upon the application of a member in service or of the board of police commissioners, any member who has had ten or more years of creditable service [shall terminate employment as a police officer and] and who has become permanently unable to perform the duties of a police officer as the result of an injury or illness not exclusively caused or induced by the actual performance of his or her official duties or by his or her own negligence, shall be [actually] retired by the board of trustees[, not more than ninety days next following the date of filing such application on an ordinary disability retirement allowance; provided, that of the police retirement system upon certification by the medical [board after a medical examination 10 of such member shall certify that such] director of the police retirement 11 system and approval by the board of trustees of the police retirement 1213 system that the member is mentally or physically [incapacitated for the further performance of duty, that such incapacity] unable to perform the duties of 14 a police officer, that the inability is permanent or likely to [be] become 15permanent, and that [such] the member should be retired. 16

2. Once each year during the first five years following such member's retirement, and at least once in every three-year period thereafter, the board of trustees may, and upon the member's application shall, require any nonduty disability beneficiary who has not yet attained sixty years of age, to undergo a medical examination at a place designated by the medical director or such physicians as the

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- medical director appoints. If any nonduty disability beneficiary who 23 has not attained sixty years of age refuses to submit to a medical 24 examination, his or her nonduty disability pension may be discontinued 2526 until his or her withdrawal of such refusal, and if his or her refusal continues for one year, all rights in and to such pension may be 2728 revoked by the board of trustees.
  - 3. If the medical director certifies to the board of trustees that a nonduty disability beneficiary is able to perform the duties of a police officer, and if the board of trustees concurs on the report, then such beneficiary's nonduty disability pension shall cease.
- 33 4. If upon cessation of a disability pension under subsection 3 of this section, the former disability beneficiary is restored to active 34 service, he or she shall again become a member, and he or she shall 35 contribute thereafter at the same rate as other members. Upon his or 36 her subsequent retirement, he or she shall be credited with all of his or her active retirement, but not including any time during which the former disability beneficiary received a disability pension under this 40 section.
- 86.260. 1. Upon termination of employment as a police officer and actual retirement for [ordinary] nonduty disability a member shall receive a service retirement allowance as calculated under subsection 1 of section 86.253 if the member has attained the age of fifty-five or completed twenty years of creditable service; otherwise the member shall receive [an ordinary] a nonduty 5 disability retirement allowance which shall be equal to ninety percent of the 7 member's accrued service retirement in section 86.253, but not less than one-fourth of the member's average final compensation; provided, however, that no such allowance shall exceed ninety percent of the member's accrued service 10 retirement benefit based on continuation of the member's creditable service to the age set out in section 86.250. 11
- 2. Effective October 1, 1999, the [ordinary] nonduty disability retirement 12allowance will be increased by fifteen percent of the member's average final 13 compensation for each unmarried dependent child of the disabled member who 14 is under the age of eighteen, or who, regardless of age, is totally and permanently 15 mentally or physically disabled and incapacitated from engaging in gainful 16 occupation sufficient to support himself or herself. 17
  - 3. Any member receiving benefits pursuant to the provisions of this

section immediately prior to October 1, 1999, shall upon application to the board of trustees be made, constituted, appointed and employed by the board of trustees as a special consultant on the problems of retirement, aging and other matters while the member is receiving such benefits, and upon request of the board of trustees shall give opinions in writing or orally in response to such requests as may be required. Beginning October 1, 1999, for such services as may be required, there shall be payable an additional monthly compensation of one hundred dollars or five percent of the member's average final compensation, whichever is greater, for each unmarried dependent child of the member.

- 4. Any benefit payable to or for the benefit of a child or children under the age of eighteen years pursuant to the provisions of subsections 2 and 3 of this section shall continue to be paid beyond the age of eighteen years through the age of twenty-two years in those cases where the child is a full-time student at a regularly accredited college, business school, nursing school, school for technical or vocational training, or university, but such extended benefit shall cease whenever the child ceases to be a student. A college or university shall be deemed to be regularly accredited which maintains membership in good standing in a national or regional accrediting agency recognized by any state college or university.
- 5. No benefits pursuant to this section shall be paid to a child over eighteen years of age who is totally and permanently disabled if such child is a patient or resident of a public-supported institution, nor shall such benefits be paid unless such disability occurred prior to such child reaching the age of eighteen.

86.263. [Upon application by the member or the board of police commissioners] 1. Any member who [has become totally and permanently incapacitated for duty at some definite time and place] is permanently unable to perform the duties of a police officer as the natural [and], proximate, and exclusive result of an accident occurring [while in] within the actual performance of duty at some definite time and place, through no negligence on the member's part, [and if such accident occurred not more than five years prior to date of application unless the accident was reported and an examination made of the member by the medical staff of the board of police commissioners within five years of the date of the accident with subsequent examinations made as requested,] shall, upon application, be retired upon certification by [the board of trustees provided that] the medical [board shall certify that such]

- director of the police retirement system and approval by the board of trustees of the police retirement system that the member is mentally or physically [incapacitated for further performance of duty, that such incapacity] unable to perform the duties of a police officer and that the inability is permanent or reasonably likely to [be] become permanent [and that such member should be retired; provided that if the accident occurred prior to the age and year set out in section 86.250, application for benefits must be made before such age and year except that the interval between date of accident and of application may be six months].
  - 2. No member shall be approved for retirement under the provisions of subsection 1 of this section unless the application was made and submitted to the board of trustees of the police retirement system no later than five years following the date of accident, provided, that if the accident was reported within five years of the date of the accident and an examination made of the member within thirty days of the date of accident by a health care provider whose services were provided through the board of police commissioners with subsequent examinations made as requested, then an application made more than five years following the date of the accident shall be considered timely.
  - 3. Once each year during the first five years following a member's retirement, and at least once in every three-year period thereafter, the board of trustees may require any disability beneficiary who has not yet attained sixty years of age to undergo a medical examination or medical examinations at a place designated by the medical director or such physicians as the medical director appoints. If any disability beneficiary who has not attained sixty years of age refuses to submit to a medical examination, his or her disability pension may be discontinued until his or her withdrawal of such refusal, and if his or her refusal continues for one year, all rights in and to such pension may be revoked by the board of trustees.
  - 4. If the medical director certifies to the board of trustees that a disability beneficiary is able to perform the duties of a police officer, and if the board of trustees concurs with the medical director's determination, then such beneficiary's disability pension shall cease.
- 5. If upon cessation of a disability pension under subsection 4 of this section, the former disability beneficiary is restored to active

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service, he or she shall again become a member, and he or she shall contribute thereafter at the same rate as other members. Upon his or her subsequent retirement, he or she shall be credited with all of his or her active service time as a member including the service time prior to receiving disability retirement, but not including any time during which the former disability beneficiary received a disability pension under this section.

6. If upon cessation of a disability pension under subsection 4 of this section, the former disability beneficiary is not restored to active service, such former disability beneficiary shall be entitled to the retirement benefit to which such former disability beneficiary would have been entitled if such former disability beneficiary had terminated service for any reason other than dishonesty, intemperate habits, or being convicted of a felony at the time of such cessation of such former disability beneficiary's disability pension. For purposes of such retirement benefits, such former disability beneficiary shall be credited with all of the former disability beneficiary's active service time as a member, but not including any time during which the former disability beneficiary received a disability beneficiary pension under this section.

86.270. 1. Any determination of whether a member is disabled under the provisions of section 86.257 or 86.263 shall consist of an investigation of the member's physical and mental condition by the medical director of the police retirement system and all physicians appointed by the medical director under the provisions of section 86.237 and an investigation by the board of trustees of the police retirement system of any other matter relevant to determine whether the member satisfies the applicable requirements of section 86.257 or 86.263. The board of trustees may authorize the use of staff of the police retirement system and other persons not employed by the police retirement system to assist in its investigation. The board of trustees 11 12of the police retirement system and the medical director of the police 13 retirement system and any such physicians appointed by the medical 14director under the provisions of section 86.237 may communicate with each other as to matters relevant to determine whether the member satisfies the applicable requirements of section 86.257 or 86.263. 16

2. The board of trustees shall require each member who applies for

disability benefits and any disability beneficiary to be reexamined under 18 the provisions of section 86.257 or 86.263 to undergo [a] medical 19 [examination] examinations at [a place] places designated by the medical 20 [board] director and any physicians appointed by the medical director 2122under the provisions of section 86.237. The examination shall be made by 23the medical [board] director or by [a physician or] any physicians [designated] appointed by [such board] the medical director under the provisions of 24section 86.237. [Once each year during the first five years following the 25retirement of a member on a disability retirement allowance and once in every 26 three-year period after that, the board of trustees may require any disabled 27member to undergo a medical examination. Should any disabled member refuse 2829 to submit to such medical examination, such member's disability allowance may be discontinued until the withdrawal of such refusal and should the refusal 30 continue for one year all rights in and to the member's disability allowance may 31 be revoked by the board of trustees.] 32

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
