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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials at the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** assume this proposal requires that fines collected from red light cameras be given to the school district where the violation occurred. It also states that the money will not be distributed as state aid as specified in 163.031. It would appear that this would not have a negative fiscal impact on the state. If anything it could cause a reduction due to increased fine money in a school district which would be a larger deduction from the foundation formula. Since the proposal says the money will not be distributed as state aid as specified in 163.031, this may mean that the fines deduction does not increase as a result of fines from red light cameras. School districts could see an indeterminate increase in fine revenue as the formula is phased in.

This fine money is also distributed differently from other fine revenue in that it is given to the district where the fine occurs rather than being distributed based on September membership to all districts within the county. This will mean that not all districts will share in the red light camera fine proceeds as they do with other fines.

Officials at the **Department of Public Safety**, **Missouri Department of Transportation**, **Missouri Highway Patrol** and the **Office of the State Courts Administrator** assume that there is no fiscal impact from this proposal.

Officials at the **City of Columbia** assume each violation is \$97.50 plus court costs of \$22.50 for a total of \$120. Currently the city has 2 such cameras in operation with a goal of having 16 functional by the end of 2010. Using a conservative estimate of 3 caught violations per day at each such intersection, this would equate to 17,520 violations per year ($3 \times 16 \times 365$) for a total of \$1,708,200 (17,520 x \$97.50) in lost revenue to the City.

Officials at the **City of Kansas City** assume a loss to the City of approximately \$2,500,000 in fiscal year 2011 as the city has red light cameras at its most dangerous intersections.

Oversight assumes that the Cities that currently have red light cameras will lose an unknown amount of fine revenue currently collected and the school district within that city will gain the fine revenue. This gain in fine revenue to the school districts will result in a deduction in the state's distribution to school districts the following year.

No other City responded to **Oversight's** request for fiscal impact.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

This bill specifies that any fine collected for a red light violation by an entity utilizing an automated photo red light enforcement system must be given to the local school district where the infraction occurred and not distributed through the School Foundation Formula.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
