FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the Office of the State Courts Administrator, Office of the State Public Defender, Office of Prosecution Services, and Department of Corrections each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Department of Social Services - Division of Youth Services (DYS)** state broadening the age of eligibility for dual jurisdiction consideration would allow opportunities to some certified youth who, but for the length of time their cases take to achieve resolution (often longer than standard adult prosecutions), would have been eligible.

While it is difficult to anticipate judicial behavior related to these matters, it is probable that enactment of this legislation would cast a broader net and increase the utilization of dual jurisdiction programming by the courts. Critical elements of the original legislation remain in place that would allow the Division of Youth Services to evaluate candidates for appropriateness and effectively manage resources available for dual jurisdiction programming.

DYS assumes no fiscal impact from the proposal.
