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	WHEREAS, the children of Missouri are our future and will provide the leadership,
2	creativity, and productivity to strengthen and sustain the quality of life in our state; and
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4	WHEREAS, the State of Missouri has the responsibility for ensuring that our children
5	have every possible opportunity for school and future success; and
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7 8	WHEREAS, each student in Missouri deserves to be challenged academically and prepared for college, meaningful employment in our global economy, and lifelong success; and
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10 11	WHEREAS, each student in Missouri deserves to be actively engaged in learning and connected to the school and broader community; and
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13 14	WHEREAS, each student in Missouri deserves to be supported by qualified, caring adults and receive access to personalized learning; and
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16 17	WHEREAS, each student in Missouri deserves to learn about and practice a healthy lifestyle; and
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19 20	WHEREAS, each student in Missouri deserves to learn in an environment that is physically and emotionally safe; and
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22	WHEREAS, the consequences of not ensuring our young people are challenged,

23 engaged, supported, healthy, and safe are clear; and

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25 WHEREAS, nearly 20,500 students did not graduate from Missouri's high schools in 2009, with lost lifetime earnings for that class alone totaling more than \$5.3 billion according 26 to the Alliance for Excellent Education; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, Missouri spends over \$53 million each year to provide community college 30 remediation education for recent high school graduates who did not acquire the basic skills necessary to succeed in college or at work; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, the percentage of Missouri children living in poverty has increased from approximately 15% in 2005 to nearly 20% in 2009; and 34 35 36 WHEREAS, Missouri's obesity rates have increased 13.4% over 10 years; and 37 38 WHEREAS, research indicates that more than 20% of students report there is no adult 39 at their school who cares about them or knows them well: and 40 41 WHEREAS, 23% of public schools reported that bullying occurred among students on 42 a daily or weekly basis during the 2009-2010 school year, according to the 2011 Indicators of 43 School Crime and Safety report: 44 45 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of 46 Representatives of the Ninety-sixth General Assembly, Second Regular Session, the Senate 47 concurring therein, hereby: 48 49 (1) Recognize the month of March as "Missouri Whole Child Month" in Missouri; and 50 51 (2) Recognize the value of assuring that each student is challenged, engaged, supported, healthy, and safe; and 52 53 54 (3) Encourage parents, educators, and community members to support a whole child approach to education for each student; and 55 56

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57 (4) Encourage every Missouri school to celebrate Whole Child Month by identifying at
58 least one of the whole child tenets to promote and encourage throughout the month; and

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60 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Chief Clerk of the Missouri House of 61 Representatives be instructed to prepare properly inscribed copies of this resolution for each 62 school district in this state.

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
