AMEND House Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 1192, Page 1,
Section A, Line 2, by inserting after all of said line the
following:
"170.015. 1. Any course materials and instruction relating
to human sexuality and sexually transmitted diseases shall be
medically and factually accurate, be based on peer reviewed
projects that have been demonstrated to influence healthy
behavior, be age appropriate, and shall:
(1) Present abstinence from sexual activity as the
preferred choice of behavior in relation to all sexual activity
[for unmarried pupils because it is the only method that is one
hundred percent effective in preventing pregnancy, sexually
transmitted diseases and the emotional trauma associated with
adolescent sexual activity, and advise students that teenage
sexual activity places them at a higher risk of dropping out of
school because of the consequences of sexually transmitted
diseases and unplanned pregnancy] as the only sure way to avoid
pregnancy or sexually transmitted infection;
(2) Stress that sexually transmitted [diseases] <u>infections</u>
are serious, possible, health hazards of sexual activity. Pupils
shall be provided with the latest medical information regarding
exposure to human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), acquired immune
deficiency syndrome (AIDS), human papilloma virus, hepatitis and
other sexually transmitted diseases;
(3) Present students with the latest medically factual
information [regarding both the possible side effects and health
benefits of all forms of contraception, including the success and
failure rates for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually

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transmitted diseases; or shall present students with information on contraceptives and pregnancy in a manner consistent with the provisions of the federal abstinence education law, 42 U.S.C. Section 710] <u>about the health benefits and side effects of all</u> <u>contraceptives and barrier methods as a means to prevent</u> <u>pregnancy and to reduce the risk of contracting sexually</u> <u>transmitted infections, HIV/AIDS, and other diseases;</u>

8 [Include a discussion of the possible emotional and (4)9 psychological consequences of preadolescent and adolescent sexual 10 activity and the consequences of adolescent pregnancy, as well as 11 the advantages of adoption, including the adoption of special 12 needs children, and the processes involved in making an adoption 13 plan] Provide information about the vaccine for human papilloma 14 virus, which may prevent cervical cancer, genital warts, 15 infertility, and other reproductive health problems, when administered prior to becoming sexually active; 16

17 (5) Encourage family communication between parents and 18 children about sexuality;

19 (6) Help young people gain knowledge about the physical, 20 biological, and hormonal changes of adolescence and subsequent 21 states of human maturation and the skills to make responsible 22 decisions about sexuality, including how alcohol and drug use can 23 affect that decision making;

24 [(5)] (7) Teach skills of conflict management, personal 25 responsibility and positive self-esteem through discussion and 26 role-playing at appropriate grade levels to emphasize that the 27 pupil has the power to control personal behavior. Pupils shall 28 be encouraged to base their actions on reasoning, 29 self-discipline, sense of responsibility, self-control, and 30 ethical considerations, such as respect for one's self and 31 others. Pupils shall be taught not to make unwanted physical and 32 verbal sexual advances or otherwise exploit another person. 33 Pupils shall be taught to resist unwanted sexual advances and 34 other negative peer pressure;

35 [(6)] (8) Advise pupils of the laws pertaining to their 36 financial responsibility to children born in and out of wedlock 37 and advise pupils of the provisions of chapter 566 pertaining to 1 statutory rape;

2 (9) Help pupils develop skills in critical thinking, 3 problem solving, decision making, and stress management in order 4 to make healthy decisions about sexuality and relationships; 5 (10) Teach pupils about the dangers of sexual predators, 6 including online predators when using electronic communication 7 methods such as the internet, cell phones, text messages, chat rooms, email, and instant messaging programs. Pupils shall be 8 9 taught how to behave responsibly and remain safe on the internet 10 and the importance of having open communication with responsible 11 adults and reporting any inappropriate situation, activity, or abuse to a responsible adult, and depending on intent and 12 13 content, to local law enforcement, the FBI, or the CyberTipLine; 14 (11) Teach pupils about the consequences, both personal and

15 legal, of inappropriate text messaging among friends.

16 2. Policies concerning referrals and parental notification 17 regarding contraception shall be determined by local school 18 boards or charter schools, consistent with the provisions of 19 section 167.611.

3. A school district or charter school which provides human
 sexuality instruction may separate students according to gender
 for instructional purposes.

4. The board of a school district or charter school shall
determine the specific content of the district's or school's
instruction in human sexuality, in accordance with subsections 1
to 3 of this section, and shall ensure that all instruction in
human sexuality is appropriate to the age of the students
receiving such instruction.

29 5. A school district or charter school shall notify the 30 parent or legal guardian of each student enrolled in the district 31 or school of:

32 (1) The basic content of the district's or school's human33 sexuality instruction to be provided to the student; and

34 (2) The parent's right to remove the student from any part35 of the district's or school's human sexuality instruction.

36 6. A school district or charter school shall make all
 37 curriculum materials <u>and names and affiliations of presenters</u>

1 used in the district's or school's human sexuality instruction 2 available for public inspection pursuant to chapter 610 prior to the use of such materials in actual instruction. 3

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[7. No school district or charter school, or its personnel 5 or agents, shall provide abortion services, or permit a person or 6 entity to offer, sponsor, or furnish in any manner any course 7 materials or instruction relating to human sexuality or sexually 8 transmitted diseases to its students if such person or entity is 9 a provider of abortion services.

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As used in this section, the following terms mean: 8.

11 (1)"Abortion", the same meaning as such term is defined in 12 section 188.015;

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"Abortion services": (2)

14 (a) Performing, inducing, or assisting in the performance 15 or inducing of an abortion which is not necessary to save the 16 life of the mother;

17 Encouraging a patient to have an abortion or referring (b) a patient for an abortion, which is not necessary to save the 18 19 life of the mother; or

20 (c) Developing or dispensing drugs, chemicals, or devices 21 intended to be used to induce an abortion which is not necessary 22 to save the life of the mother.]"; and
