ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE)** provided the following assumptions regarding state aid for children ages three and four participating in certain early childhood education programs.

DESE assumes there is no way to know the number of students that would enroll in an early childhood education program under the terms of this proposal. Since the focus is on free and reduced lunch, the cost will be unknown, but in excess of the amounts presented here. It should be noted that if school districts can count early childhood education for state aid, the numbers could increase significantly from those presented here.

Subsection 2(5) indicates that the provisions of the section shall become applicable in any school year subsequent to a school year in which the formula is fully funded. DESE does not believe the formula can be fully funded within the scope of the fiscal note; therefore, the impact of this portion of the proposal appears to be zero for the term presented in the fiscal note.

Oversight will assume the formula could be fully funded in FY 16 and, for fiscal note purposes only, will show a range of: (Expected to exceed \$9,107,800 to \$72,705,230).

§§163.018.2(2) and (4) - These sections are targeted toward districts declared unaccredited and provisionally accredited after July 1, 2014.

DESE assumes costs going forward related to these sections are unknown.

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<u>ASSUMPTION</u> (continued)

Officials from the **Francis Howell School District (FHSD)** assume that if their district qualified for the full 4% of students eligible for free/reduced lunch, this bill could generate an additional \$306,000 for their district.

Officials from the **Kansas City Public School District** assume their district will see little to no fiscal impact resulting from this proposed legislation.

Officials from the following school districts: Blue Springs, Branson, Caruthersville, Charleston R-I, Cole R-I, Columbia, Fair Grove, Fulton, Harrison R-IX, Independence, Jefferson City, Johnson County R-VII, Kansas City, Kirksville, Kirbyville R-V, Lee's Summit, Malden R-I, Malta Bend, Mexico, Monroe City R-I, Nixa, Parkway, Pattonville, Raymore-Peculiar R-III, Raytown, Riverview Gardens, Sedalia, Sikeston, Silex, Special School District of St. Louis County, Spickard R-II, Springfield, St Joseph, St Louis, St. Charles, Sullivan, Warren County R-III, and Waynesville did not respond to **Oversight's** request for fiscal impact.

Officials from the following charter school sponsors: University of Central Missouri, University of Missouri System, Lindenwood University, Saint Louis University, Washington University, and the St. Louis Public School District did not respond to **Oversight's** request for fiscal impact.

Officials from **Allen Village School** (charter school) assume this proposal would have a negative impact on schools.

Officials from the Carondelet Leadership Academy (charter school) did not respond to **Oversight's** request for fiscal impact.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

Small child care businesses could be affected by a decrease in clients.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This bill changes the laws regarding early childhood education programs by:

- (1) Establishing an August 1 cutoff birth date for participation of three-year-olds in prekindergarten programs; and
- (2) Allowing the inclusion of pre-kindergarten pupils in the calculation of average daily attendance for school funding purposes when the pupils are eligible for free or reduced price lunch and attending a program operated by a school district or charter school that provides full-day kindergarten that meets the standards established by the State Board of Education, not to exceed 4% of the district's or charter school's total number of pupils who are eligible for free and reduced lunch.

These provisions become applicable:

- (1) For districts that have been declared unaccredited and remain unaccredited as of July 1, 2014, beginning in the 2014-15 school year; for those declared unaccredited after July 1, 2014, immediately upon such declaration;
- (2) For districts that have been declared provisionally accredited and remain unaccredited as of July 1, 2014, beginning in the 2015-16 school year; for those declared unaccredited after July 1,

2014, the later of the 2015-16 school year or the declaration of provisional accreditation; and

(3) For all other districts, in any school year subsequent to a school year when the school funding formula is fully funded. The provisions of the bill do not change mandatory school attendance laws.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
