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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Agriculture (AGR)** state this is new legislation and is tied to newly created language in the Federal Agriculture Act 2014. Registration and certification would require a fee to cover the MDA costs. Due to the regulated nature of Cannibus, site inspections will be required in addition to random sampling of the plants to ensure the THC level is at the allowable level. A program coordinator will be needed to develop the program processes and procedures and an inspector would be needed monitoring and sampling registered sites of growers and handlers.

AGR requests 1 FTE Program Coordinator with an annual salary of \$44,712, 1 FTE Senior Office Support Assistant with an annual salary of \$28,620, and 1 FTE Plant Protection Specialist at an annual salary of \$38,544. AGR assumes a total cost of the 3 FTE of approximately \$275,000 per year.

AGR assumes they would not be able to collect enough fee revenue as stated in Section 195.603.11 to cover their expenses, and would need additional funding from the General Revenue Fund.

For the purpose of the fiscal note **Oversight** will show the additional salary and expense cost to General Revenue for the additional FTE requested by AGR.

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety - Missouri Highway Patrol (MHP)** state the Missouri Department of Agriculture was not able to determine the number of industrial hemp growers and handlers that would require a background check upon the passage of this legislation. The cost for each background check processed is \$44.80. Twenty dollars for the state fingerprint check, \$16.50 for the federal check, and an \$8.30 charge for the electronic fingerprint option used through a third-party vendor (\$20 + 16.50 + 8.30 = \$44.80). Of this amount, the state retains the \$20 fee and \$2 of the federal charge of \$16.50 for a pass-thru fee. The \$8.30 charge is paid directly to the vendor at the time of application.

However, since the total number of growers and handlers is not known, the potential revenue received from the background checks into the Criminal Records Fund is not able to be determined.

Oversight assumes the additional revenue into the Criminal Records Fund would be under \$100,000.

For Section 195.603.5, the **MHP** would develop an interface between the Patrol and the Department of Agriculture to receive this information and then development of a database to store and retrieve the information. The work will be completed by the state's computerized criminal history vendor, Computer Projects of Illinois (CPI), because the systems affected are components of a commercial system bought by the Patrol. CPI estimates a total of 600 (80 + 120 + 70 + 100 + 90 + 80 + 60) hours of combined work @ \$100 per hour for a total price of \$60,000 (600 x \$100) based on the following projections:

80 hours - Discovery and design
120 hours - Database modifications
70 hours - Store procedure codes
100 hours - Forms creation and redesign
90 hours - Switch routing and transactions
80 hours - Testing
60 hours - Project management

In addition, the Patrol estimates an annual maintenance cost of \$5,200, all to the General Revenue Fund.

Officials from the **Department of Corrections (DOC)** state in this bill, there are no blanket exceptions to the production, possession, or commerce therein of industrial hemp for persons in the custody or under the supervision of DOC. Similarly, there is no prohibition for public employees (but it would violate restrictions on the use of public facilities and public policy/) This could make it more difficult for the Board of Probation and Parole to carry out its supervisory functions, and may require modifications to the terms of probation, parole or conditional release. At least 9 states currently have industrial hemp laws on the books, so comparison with those states would help determine what will be the true effects on DOC if this bill passes. The fiscal impact for the DOC due to passage of this proposal is Unknown per each fiscal year.

Officials from the **Department of Health and Senior Services**, **Office of the State Public Defender**, **Office of the State Courts Administrator**, and **Office of Prosecution Services** each assume the proposal would not fiscally impact their respective agencies.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)**, assume many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The SOS is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for

this fiscal note to the SOS for Administrative Rules is less than \$2,500. The SOS recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, we also recognize that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what our office can sustain with our core budget. Therefore, we reserve the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

Oversight assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could request funding through the appropriation process.

Officials from the **Joint Committee on Administrative Rules** state this legislation is not anticipated to cause a fiscal impact beyond its current appropriation.
