FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Attorney General's Office (AGO)** assume if this proposal were to pass, it will enable new cases of alleged discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity to come before the Human Rights Commission. As a result, the AGO anticipates additional work in representing the Commission. At this time, it is unknown how many new claims will be filed by individuals alleging discrimination based on sexual orientation. AGO assumes that the number of claims in the first few years will be less than 10 and that the AGO can absorb the costs of representing the Commission in its review of these claims. However, if there is a significant increase in claims over time, the AGO may seek additional appropriations to adequately represent the Human Rights Commission in handling these claims.

Officials from the **Department of Labor and Industrial Relations** assume that the Missouri Commission on Human Rights (MCHR) could absorb the increase in complaints with existing resources. However, if the number of cases is significantly higher than expected or additional legislation is enacted which increases other types of MCHR complaints, the cumulative impact could be enough that MCHR would require additional resources.

Officials from the **Office of Administration - Division of Personnel** and the **Office of the State Courts Administrator** each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.

In response to a similar proposal (HB 1858) from 2014, officials from the **Department of Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration** assumed the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their organization.
