Bill Summary: This proposal prohibits drivers of non-commercial vehicles from text messaging while operating a moving vehicle unless the device being used is equipped with technology allowing for voice-recognition hands-free texting.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Revenue (DOR)** assume this legislation removes the 21 and under age limitation from the current texting while driving offense, and adds the provision that the offense occurred in a noncommercial moving motor vehicle. This offense requires assessment of points upon conviction pursuant to Section 302.302, RSMo.

Administrative Impact:

This proposal will require updates to forms, website information, internal procedures and training of staff to account for the changes in this proposal.

Administrative Analyst I - 40 hours@ \$21 per hour = \$840

The new law will result in an unknown increase in convictions. The increase in convictions will also increase the number of point warning and suspension/revocation notices issued for accumulation of points.

There are no statistics to determine how many additional conviction(s) the Department may be required to process; however, one FTE processes 320 convictions per day. The Department assumes that a minimum of one FTE (Revenue Processing Tech) will be needed to process the additional convictions resulting from this violation. If the volume of convictions received for processing exceeds 320 per day, then additional FTE will be required and will be requested through the appropriation process.

There are no statistics to determine the volume of telephone calls that may be received; however, a Telephone Information Operator (Revenue Processing Tech) is required to handle 100 calls per day. The Department assumes that a minimum of one FTE will be needed to answer the additional phone calls. If the calls received for this conviction exceed 100 calls per day, then additional FTE will be required and will be requested through the appropriation process.

Revenue Impact:

Additional reinstatement fees collected will be distributed 75% Highway Funds, 15% Cities, and 10% Counties.

ASSUMPTION (continued)

Since it is unknown how many additional convictions the proposal will result in, **Oversight** will assume a positive unknown increase in revenue to the Highway Fund, Cities and Counties. Oversight also assumes the DOR will request additional personnel through budget decision items if an increased workload justifies it.

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety - Missouri Highway Patrol**, **Department of Transportation**, **Office of State Courts Administrator** and **Office of Prosecution Services** each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

Currently, anyone 21 years of age or younger is prohibited from texting while operating a moving motor vehicle on any highway in Missouri. This proposal removes the age limit and prohibits anyone operating a noncommercial vehicle from texting while driving unless the device allows for voice-recognition hands-free texting and is being used in that manner.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
