## HOUSE BILL NO. 1583

## 98TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Reported from the Committee on Education, May 4, 2016, with recommendation that the Senate Committee Substitute do pass. ADRIANE D. CROUSE, Secretary.

## AN ACT

To repeal section 160.775, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof three new sections relating to student safety.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Section 160.775, RSMo, is repealed and three new sections 2 enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 160.775, 170.047, and 170.048, 3 to read as follows:

160.775. 1. Every district shall adopt an antibullying policy by September 2 1, 2007.

2. "Bullying" means intimidation, unwanted aggressive behavior, or 3 harassment that is repetitive or is substantially likely to be repeated and 4 causes a reasonable student to fear for his or her physical safety or property; 5 6 substantially interferes with the educational performance, 7 opportunities, or benefits of any student without exception; or 8 substantially disrupts the orderly operation of the school. Bullying may 9 consist of physical actions, including gestures, or oral, cyberbullying, electronic, 10 or written communication, and any threat of retaliation for reporting of such 11 acts. Bullying of students is prohibited on school property, at any 12 school function, or on a school bus. "Cyberbullying" means bullying as 13 defined in this subsection through the transmission of a communication 14 including, but not limited to, a message, text, sound, or image by means of an electronic device including, but not limited to, a telephone, 15wireless telephone, or other wireless communication device, computer, 16 or pager. 17

3. Each district's antibullying policy shall be founded on the assumption

19 that all students need a safe learning environment. Policies shall treat **all** 20 students equally and shall not contain specific lists of protected classes of 21 students who are to receive special treatment. Policies may include 22 age-appropriate differences for schools based on the grade levels at the 23 school. Each such policy shall contain a statement of the consequences of 24 bullying.

4. Each district's antibullying policy shall be included in the student
handbook and shall require, at a minimum, the following components:

(1) A statement prohibiting bullying, defined no less inclusivelythan in subsection 2 of this section;

29 (2) A statement requiring district employees to report any instance of 30 bullying of which the employee has firsthand knowledge[. The district policy 31 shall address training of employees in the requirements of the district 32 policy]. The policy shall require a district employee who witnesses an 33 incident of bullying to report the incident to the district's designated 34 individual at the school within two school days of the employee 35 witnessing the incident;

36 (3) A procedure for reporting an act of bullying. The policy shall
37 also include a statement requiring that the district designate an
38 individual at each school in the district to receive reports of incidents
39 of bullying. Such individual shall be a district employee who is teacher
40 level staff or above;

41 (4) A procedure for prompt investigation of reports of violations
42 and complaints, identifying one or more employees responsible for the
43 investigation including, at a minimum, the following requirements:

44 (a) Within two school days of a report of an incident of bullying
45 being received, the school principal, or his or her designee, shall
46 initiate an investigation of the incident;

47 (b) The school principal may appoint other school staff to assist48 with the investigation; and

49 (c) The investigation shall be completed within ten school days
50 from the date of the written report unless good cause exists to extend
51 the investigation;

52 (5) A statement that prohibits reprisal or retaliation against any 53 person who reports an act of bullying and the consequence and 54 appropriate remedial action for a person who engages in reprisal or 55 retaliation; 56

(6) A statement of how the policy is to be publicized; and

57 (7) A process for discussing the district's antibullying policy with 58 students and training school employees and volunteers who have 59 significant contact with students in the requirements of the policy, 60 including, at a minimum, the following statements:

(a) The school district shall provide information and appropriate
training to the school district staff who have significant contact with
students regarding the policy;

64 (b) The school district shall give annual notice of the policy to 65 students, parents or guardians, and staff;

66 (c) The school district shall provide education and information 67 to students regarding bullying, including information regarding the 68 school district policy prohibiting bullying, the harmful effects of 69 bullying, and other applicable initiatives to address bullying, including 70 student peer-to-peer initiatives to provide accountability and policy 71 enforcement for those found to have engaged in bullying, reprisal, or 72 retaliation against any person who reports an act of bullying;

73 (d) The administration of the school district shall instruct its school counselors, school social workers, licensed social workers, 7475 mental health professionals, and school psychologists to educate students who are victims of bullying on techniques for students to 7677overcome bullying's negative effects. Such techniques shall include, 78 but not be limited to, cultivating the student's self-worth and self-79 esteem; teaching the student to defend himself or herself assertively 80 and effectively; helping the student develop social skills; or 81 encouraging the student to develop an internal locus of control. The 82 provisions of this paragraph shall not be construed to contradict or limit any other provision of this section; and 83

(e) The administration of the school district shall implement programs and other initiatives to address bullying, to respond to such conduct in a manner that does not stigmatize the victim, and to make resources or referrals available to victims of bullying.

5. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, any school district shall have jurisdiction to prohibit cyberbullying that originates on a school's campus or at a district activity if the electronic communication was made using the school's technological resources, if there is a sufficient nexus to the educational environment,

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93 or if the electronic communication was made on the school's campus or
94 at a district activity using the student's own personal technological
95 resources. The school district may discipline any student for such
96 cyberbullying to the greatest extent allowed by law.

97 6. Each district shall review its antibullying policy and revise it 98 as needed. The district's school board shall receive input from school 99 personnel, students, and administrators when reviewing and revising 100 the policy.

170.047. 1. Beginning in the 2017-18 school year, any licensed 2 educator may annually complete up to two hours of training or 3 professional development in youth suicide awareness and prevention 4 as part of the professional development hours required for state board 5 of education certification.

6 2. The department of elementary and secondary education shall 7 develop guidelines suitable for training or professional development in 8 youth suicide awareness and prevention. The department shall develop 9 materials that may be used for such training or professional 10 development.

11 3. For purposes of this section, the term "licensed educator" 12 means any teacher with a certificate of license to teach issued by the 13 state board of education or any other educator or administrator 14 required to maintain a professional license issued by the state board of 15 education.

4. The department of elementary and secondary education may
promulgate rules and regulations to implement this section.

18 5. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 19 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section 20shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of 21 the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This 22 section and chapter 536 are nonseverable, and if any of the powers 23 vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are 24subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking 2526 authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2016, shall 27 be invalid and void.

170.048. 1. By July 1, 2018, each district shall adopt a policy for 2 youth suicide awareness and prevention, including the training and

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3 education of district employees.

4 2. Each district's policy shall address, but need not be limited to,
5 the following:

6 (1) Strategies that can help identify students who are at possible 7 risk of suicide;

8 (2) Strategies and protocols for helping students at possible risk
9 of suicide; and

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(3) Protocols for responding to a suicide death.

11 3. By July 1, 2017, the department of elementary and secondary education shall develop a model policy that districts may adopt. When 12developing the model policy, the department shall cooperate, consult 13with, and seek input from organizations that have expertise in youth 14 suicide awareness and prevention. By July 1, 2021, and at least every 15three years thereafter, the department shall request information and 16 seek feedback from districts on their experience with the policy for 17 youth suicide awareness and prevention. The department shall review 18 this information and may use it to adapt the department's model 19policy. The department shall post any information on its website that 20it has received from districts that it deems relevant. The department 21shall not post any confidential information or any information that 22personally identifies any student or school employee. 23

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
