	WHEREAS, seventy years ago the United States government hired Mallinckrodt
2	Chemical Works (MCW), near downtown St. Louis, to purify tons of uranium for the production
3	of nuclear weapons; and
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5	WHEREAS, exposure to radioactive particles and rays released by uranium and related
6	materials increases cancer and other life-shortening diseases and can cause genetic mutations and
7	birth defects; and
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9	WHEREAS, from 1946 until 1957, radioactive residues from the MCW uranium
10	processing were trucked to a 22-acre site at the St. Louis Airport on Brown Road (now
11	McDonnell Boulevard) on the banks of Coldwater Creek and were dumped there; and
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13	WHEREAS, some of those MCW residues at the airport site were later trucked nearby
14	to Latty Avenue in Hazelwood for drying and shipping to Colorado for reprocessing; and
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16	WHEREAS, in 1973 contractors who were hired to clean up Latty Avenue, after the
17	drying and shipping operation there had been abandoned, illegally dumped large amounts of the
18	Latty/Airport residues at West Lake Landfill in Bridgeton; and
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20	WHEREAS, West Lake Landfill was designated a Superfund site under the jurisdiction
21	of the United States Environmental Protection Agency in 1990; and
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23	WHEREAS, West Lake is in the Missouri River floodplain, and some of the buried
24	radioactive wastes are already in contact with the groundwater that flows into the Missouri River,
25	upstream from drinking water intakes for North Saint Louis County and the City of Saint Louis;
26	and
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28 WHEREAS, West Lake Landfill is adjacent to the Earth City levee, and since levees can fail, the radioactive materials at West Lake could be released in an uncontrolled manner into the 29 Missouri River; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, an underground fire at West Lake has remained uncontrolled since its 33 discovery in October, 2012; and 34 35 WHEREAS, some landfill fires elsewhere have been known to burn for years, the existing fire or a future fire at West Lake could reach the areas where the radioactive wastes were 36 37 dumped; and 38 39 **WHEREAS**, the landfill is located within the airshed of Missouri's largest population 40 center and the West Lake long-lived radioactive wastes will continue releasing radioactive 41 particles and gases into the environment literally for hundreds of thousands of years and beyond; 42 and 43 44 WHEREAS, in 1997 the United States Army Corps of Engineers was assigned 45 responsibility for the cleanup of the Formerly Utilized Sites Remedial Action Program (FUSRAP); and 46 47 48 WHEREAS, the radioactive wastes at West Lake were part of the same MCW wastes 49 that the Corps has been removing from Saint Louis City and County sites; and 50 51 WHEREAS, the Corps expects that the trained and experienced FUSRAP workers will 52 continue the MCW radioactive waste remediation and closure projects in St. Louis City and 53 County for at least another five years. 54 55 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of Representatives of the Ninety-seventh General Assembly, Second Regular Session, the Senate 56 57 concurring therein, hereby request the United States Congress to transfer the responsibility for the radioactive waste cleanup at West Lake Landfill from the EPA Superfund Program to the 58 59 Corps of Engineers Formerly Utilized Sites Remedial Action Program in order to assure and 60 expedite the removal of the radioactive wastes from the landfill to a federally licensed or state 61 permitted radioactive waste disposal facility away from water and away from people. 62

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63 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Chief Clerk of the Missouri House of 64 Representatives be instructed to prepare a properly inscribed copy of this resolution for the 65 Majority and Minority Leaders of the United States Senate and House of Representatives, and 66 each member of the Missouri Congressional delegation.

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
