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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials at the **Department of Elementary and Secondary Education** (**DESE**) assume there is no fiscal impact from this proposal.

Officials at the **Missouri House of Representatives** assume this would be no impact on the House. The Joint Committee expenses are typically covered by the Senate's Joint Contingent Expenses appropriation.

Officials at the **Joint Committee on Education** (**JCED**) assume the following provisions may have fiscal impact:

16-17	Provide the state board of education with input on any candidates for the office of the commissioner of education in the event of a vacancy in such office.	Provision does not provide specificity. If this is intended to be a full blown background investigation costs could be associated with such input, if just comments are required then the cost is assumed to be zero.
18-19	Review for alignment to Missouri Constitution and statutes, vote on, and monitor policies developed by the state board of education; "	At this time the JCED does not have a staff attorney to analyze the legality of policies adopted by the state board of education regarding alignment with the Missouri Constitution or existing statute. An attorney may be needed.
32-35	(8) Hold public hearings when the state board of education considers the establishment, revision, or modification of performance measures as required by [section] sections 160.518 and 173.1006 and report on their [establishment] findings to the governor and the general assembly;	"public hearings" imply more than one hearing which might be held at locations throughout the state in order to seek input from as many stakeholders as possible. If this is the case, the costs of travel, food and possible lodging for JCED members may be substantial. On the other hand, if the hearings where held in the capitol building the costs may be minimal or negligible.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This bill requires the Joint Committee on Education to undertake additional duties related to the oversight of the state educational system.

The committee must contain, as members, the chair of the Missouri Senate Budget and Education committees, respectively. The House of Representatives members must include the chairs of the Elementary and Secondary Education and Higher Education committees, respectively.

The committee must meet at least quarterly and perform certain duties. The board must provide the State Board of Education with input on any candidates for the Office of the Commissioner of Education in the event of a vacancy in such office. The board must review policies for alignment to the Missouri Constitution and statutes and vote on and monitor policies developed by the board. It must also review the progress of education in the state's public schools and reports from the Commissioner of Education.

The committee must hold public hearings when the board considers the revision or modification of performance measures. The joint committee must also maintain a standing committee. Such standing committee will review and evaluate grant applications and financial commitments made

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FISCAL DESCRIPTION (continued)

on behalf of the state while also developing a comprehensive methodology for auditing and monitoring, as specified in the bill.

The joint committee must also maintain an independent or commercial Institutional Review Board (IRB) to protect the rights and personal privacy of individuals, and maintain other interests of the public, including reviewing research proposals, as specified in the bill. The IRB board will be composed of at least five members. Such members must not be of the same profession and must have a diversity of experience and expertise.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
