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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

Officials from the **Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DOLIR)** assume the proposal would allow municipalities to opt out of the provisions of 290.210 through 290.340, and would therefore reduce the number of public works projects that are subject to the prevailing wage requirement. The department assumes this would reduce the number of complaints received regarding prevailing wage issues.

Current statute requires the DOLIR to issue prevailing wage orders and to investigate complaints relating to prevailing wage. However, funding for these activities was eliminated in the FY 2018 budget. In order to assure that employers are able to comply with the law, the DOLIR has redirected some existing resources so that a new prevailing wage order can be issued by the March 2018 deadline.

Though the number of prevailing wage complaints is expected to decrease as a result of this legislation, current resources are inadequate to address any complaints received. DOLIR anticipates that, should this bill be approved, it would pursue additional resources via the appropriations process.

Officials from the **City of Columbia** assume unless mandated to pay prevailing wage by federal law, the ability to opt out could have a positive fiscal impact.

Oversight assumes this proposal allows any municipality to opt out of the provisions regarding prevailing wages for the construction of public works. Oversight assumes there will be a cost savings to municipalities of greater than \$100,000.

Officials from the **Office of Administration-Personnel** and **Office of Administration-Facilities Management, Design and Construction** assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.

Officials from the Jackson County Board of Election Commissioners, St. Louis County Board of Election Commissioners, Boone County, St. Louis County, and City of Kansas City assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.
