4	"161.1080. Sections 161.1080 to 161.1130 shall be known and may be cited as the "School
5	Turnaround Act".
6	161.1085. For purposes of sections 161.1080 to 161.1130, the following terms mean:
7	(1) "Department", the department of elementary and secondary education;
8	(2) "Governing board", the board of education of a district or the governing board of a
9	charter school that has declared itself a local educational agency;
10	(3) "Initial remedial year", the year in which a district school or charter school is designated
11	as a school in need of intervention under section 161.1090;
12	(4) "Local educational agency", any school district and any charter school that has declared
13	itself a local educational agency;
14	(5) "School", a public school under the control of a local educational agency;
15	(6) "School in need of intervention", a school that has been designated as in need of
16	intervention by the department according to an outcome-based measure as determined by the
17	department under section 161.1090, which may include, but shall not be required to include, schools
18	identified for intervention under the state's Every Student Succeeds Act plan;
19	(7) "Statewide assessment", any test of student achievement in English language arts,
20	mathematics, or science, including any such test administered in a computer-adaptive format, that is
21	administered statewide under section 160.518.
22	161.1090. 1. Subject to appropriation, the department shall establish a school turnaround
23	program to assist schools designated by the department as in need of intervention in accordance with
24	the provisions of sections 161.1080 to 161.1130.
25	2. The department shall use an outcome-based measure to set criteria for the designation of
26	schools in need of intervention.
27	3. No more than one month after statewide assessment results are made public, the
28	department shall designate specific schools as in need of intervention. The department shall
29	designate a school as in need of intervention only if sufficient funds are available in the school
30	turnaround fund established in section 161.1105 to pay an independent school turnaround expert.
31	4. The department shall determine the specific criteria that a school shall be required to meet
32	in order to exit the school turnaround program based on the same outcome-based measure that was
33	<u>used to designate the school as in need of intervention.</u>
34	5. The department shall not designate any school as in need of intervention before
35	September 1, 2020.
36	6. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the criteria established under this section from

2	161.1095. 1. Before October first of an initial remedial year, the governing board of any
3	local educational agency with a school in need of intervention shall establish a school turnaround
4	committee composed of the following members:
5	(1) One member of the governing board;
6	(2) The school principal;
7	(3) Three parents of students enrolled in the school, appointed by the local parent-teacher
8	association;
9	(4) Four teachers at the school, appointed by the principal; and
10	(5) The district's chief financial officer or equivalent.
11	2. Before October fifteenth of an initial remedial year, the governing board of any local
12	educational agency with a school in need of intervention shall partner with the school turnaround
13	committee to select an independent school turnaround expert from the experts identified by the
14	department under section 161.1100.
15	3. The governing board shall not select an independent school turnaround expert that is:
16	(1) The local educational agency with the school in need of intervention; or
17	(2) An employee of the local educational agency with the school in need of intervention.
18	4. A school turnaround committee shall partner with the independent school turnaround
19	expert selected under subsection 2 of this section to develop and implement a school turnaround
20	plan that includes:
21	(1) The findings of the analysis conducted by the independent school turnaround expert on
22	the data described in subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of section 161.1100;
23	(2) Recommendations regarding changes to the school's personnel, culture, curriculum,
24	assessments, instructional practices, digital tools and other methods for teaching and learning,
25	governance, leadership, finances, policies, or other areas that may be necessary to implement the
26	school turnaround plan;
27	(3) Measurable student achievement goals and objectives;
28	(4) A professional development plan that identifies a strategy to address problems of
29	instructional practice;
30	(5) A leadership development plan focused on proven strategies to turn around schools in
31	need of intervention that align with administrator standards developed under section 168.410;
32	(6) A detailed budget specifying how the school turnaround plan will be funded;
33	(7) A plan to assess and monitor progress;
34	(8) A plan to communicate and report data on progress to stakeholders; and
35	(9) A time line for implementation.
36	5. Any local educational agency with a school in need of intervention shall:
37	(1) Prioritize funding and resources to the school in need of intervention; and
38	(2) Grant the school in need of intervention streamlined authority over staff, schedule,
39	policies, budget, and academic programs to implement the school turnaround plan.
40	6. Before March first of an initial remedial year, a school turnaround committee shall submit
41	the school turnaround plan to the governing board for approval.
42	7. Except as provided in subsection 8 of this section, before April first of an initial remedial
43	year, the governing board shall submit the school turnaround plan to the department for approval.
44	8. If the governing board does not approve the school turnaround plan submitted under
45	subsection 6 of this section, the school turnaround committee may submit a new or revised school
46	turnaround plan to the governing board for approval. In order to allow additional time for the
47	governing board to consider a new or revised school turnaround plan, the rules may extend the April
48	first deadline for the governing board to submit the school turnaround plan to the department. The
49	department shall not approve a school turnaround plan unless such plan has been approved by the

1	governing board of the school in need of intervention.
2	<u>161.1100.</u> <u>1.</u> Before August 30, 2020, the department shall identify two or more approved
3	independent school turnaround experts, through a request for proposals process, that a school in
4	<u>need of intervention may select from to partner with, to:</u>
5	(1) Collect and analyze data on the school's student achievement, personnel, culture,
6	curriculum, assessments, instructional practices, digital tools and other methods for teaching and
7	learning, governance, leadership, finances, and policies;
8	(2) Recommend changes to the school's culture, curriculum, assessments, instructional
9 10	practices, governance, finances, policies, or other areas based on data collected under subdivision (1) of this subsection;
11	(3) Develop and implement, in partnership with the school turnaround committee, a school
12	turnaround plan that meets the criteria described in section 161.1095;
13	(4) Monitor the effectiveness of a school turnaround plan through reliable means of
14	evaluation including, but not limited to, on-site visits, observations, surveys, analysis of student
15	achievement data, and interviews;
16	(5) Provide ongoing implementation support and project management for a school
17	turnaround plan;
18	(6) Provide high-quality professional development and coaching personalized for school
19	staff that is designed to build:
20	(a) The leadership capacity of the school principal;
20	(b) The instructional capacity of school staff; and
22	(c) The collaborative practices of teacher and leadership teams;
23	(7) Provide job-embedded professional learning and coaching for all instructional staff on a
24	weekly basis, at a minimum;
24	(8) Provide job-embedded professional learning and coaching for the school principal at
23 26	least twice monthly, focused on proven strategies to turn around schools in need of intervention that
20	are aligned with administrator standards developed under section 168.410; and
28	(9) Leverage support from community partners to coordinate an efficient delivery of
29	supports to students both inside and outside the classroom.
30	2. In identifying independent school turnaround experts under subsection 1 of this section,
31	the department shall identify experts who:
32	(1) Have a credible track record of improving student academic achievement in public
33	schools with various demographic characteristics, as measured by statewide assessments;
34	(2) Have experience designing, implementing, and evaluating data-driven instructional
35	systems in public schools;
36	(3) Have experience coaching public school administrators and teachers on designing and
37	implementing data-driven school improvement plans; (4) Users are active as the particle south the available dependence of the second plans in the
38	(4) Have experience collaborating with the various education entities that govern public
39	schools;
40	(5) Have experience delivering high-quality professional development and coaching in
41	instructional effectiveness to public school administrators and teachers;
42	(6) Are willing to be compensated for professional services based on performance as
43	described in section 161.1105; and
44	(7) Are willing to partner with any school in need of intervention in the state, regardless of
45	location.
46	<u>161.1105. 1. The department shall award contracts to independent school turnaround</u>
47	experts. Governing boards shall not be required to pay independent school turnaround experts.
48	2. When awarding a contract to an independent school turnaround expert selected by the
49	governing board under section 161.1095, the department shall ensure that a contract between the

1	governing board and the independent school turnaround expert specifies that the department shall:
2	(1) Pay an independent school turnaround expert no more than fifty percent of the expert's
3	professional fees during the time period the school turnaround expert is providing services to the
4	school in need of intervention; and
5	(2) Pay the remainder of the independent school turnaround expert's professional fees upon
6	the independent school turnaround expert successfully helping a school in need of intervention meet
7	exit criteria as determined by the department under section 161.1090 within four school years after a
8	school is designated as needing intervention.
9	3. In negotiating a contract with an independent school turnaround expert, the department
10	shall offer:
11	(1) An average of six hundred fifty thousand dollars for the entirety of the project;
12	(2) Differentiated amounts of funding based on student enrollment; and
13	(3) A higher amount of funding for schools that are in the lowest-performing one percent of
14	schools statewide according to the outcome-based measure determined by the department under
15	section 161.1090.
16	4. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "School Turnaround Fund". The fund
17	shall consist of all moneys that may be appropriated to it by the general assembly and any gifts,
18	contributions, grants, or bequests received from federal, private, or other sources. The state
19	treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state
20	treasurer may approve disbursements of public moneys in accordance with distribution requirements
21	and procedures developed by the department of elementary and secondary education. The fund
22	shall be a dedicated fund and, upon appropriation, moneys in the fund shall be used solely for
23	payments to independent school turnaround experts and for administrative expenses for the school
24	turnaround program. Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys
25	remaining in the fund at the end of the biennium shall not revert to the credit of the general revenue
26	fund. The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other funds are
27	invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be credited to the fund.
28	<u>161.1110.</u> 1. The department shall review a school turnaround plan submitted for approval
29	under section 161.1095 within thirty days of submission.
30	2. The department shall approve a school turnaround plan that:
31	$\underbrace{(1) Is timely;}_{(2)}$
32	(2) Is well-developed; and
33	(3) Meets the criteria described in section 161.1095.
34	3. The department shall promulgate rules to establish an appeals process for a governing
35	board that does not receive approval of its school turnaround plan from the department under section
36	<u>161.1095.</u>
37	4. The department shall ensure that the rules require the appeals process, described in
38	subsection 3 of this section, be resolved before May fifteenth of the initial remedial year.
39	5. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "School Intervention Fund". The fund
40	shall consist of all moneys that may be appropriated to it by the general assembly and any gifts,
41	contributions, grants, or bequests received from federal, private, or other sources for the purpose of
42	distributing grants to local educational agencies as described in this section. The state treasurer
43	shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and 30.180, the state treasurer
44	may approve disbursements of public moneys in accordance with distribution requirements and
45	procedures developed by the department of elementary and secondary education. The fund shall be

7	department.
8	161.1115. 1. A school in need of intervention that does not meet the exit criteria determined
9	by the department under section 161.1090 within three school years after the day on which the
10	school is designated a school in need of intervention may petition the department for an extension to
11	continue school improvement efforts for up to two years.
12	2. The department shall grant an extension under subsection 1 of this section only if the
13	school in need of intervention:
14	(1) Has demonstrated at least fifty percent of the improvement necessary to exit the
15	turnaround process; or
16	(2) Submits an appeal to the department.
17	3. The department may extend the contract of an independent school turnaround expert for a
18	school in need of intervention that is granted an extension under this section.
19	4. A school that has been granted an extension under this section is eligible for continued
20	funding under subsection 3 of this section.
21	5. The department shall promulgate rules establishing additional interventions for:
22	(1) A school in need of intervention that:
23	(a) Does not meet the predetermined exit criteria within three school years after the day on
24	which the school is designated in need of intervention; and
25	(b) Is not granted an extension under this section; and (2) A school in product intervention that
26 27	(2) A school in need of intervention that: (a) Is granted an extension under this section; and
27 28	(a) Is granted an extension under this section; and(b) Does not meet the predetermined exit criteria within three school years after the day on
28 29	which the school in need of intervention is granted an extension.
30	<u>161.1120. 1. For purposes of this section, the term "eligible school" means a school in need</u>
31	of intervention that:
32	(1) Meets predetermined exit criteria within three school years after the day on which the
33	school is designated a school in need of intervention; or
34	(2) If granted an extension under section 161.1115, meets predetermined exit criteria within
35	the extension period.
36	2. Subject to appropriation, the department shall establish a statewide program to be known
37	as the "School Recognition and Reward Program" to provide incentives to schools and teachers to
38	improve schools in need of intervention.
39	3. There is hereby created in the state treasury the "School Recognition and Reward Fund".
40	The fund shall consist of all moneys that may be appropriated to it by the general assembly and any
