AN ACT

To repeal sections 58.095, 58.451, 58.720, 192.067, 193.145, 193.265, 194.119, 210.192, 210.194, 210.195, and 333.011, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof fifteen new sections relating to the deceased.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 58.095, 58.451, 58.720, 192.067, 193.145, 193.265, 194.119, 210.192, 210.194, 210.195, and 333.011, RSMo, are repealed and fifteen new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 58.035, 58.095, 58.208, 58.451, 58.720, 192.067, 192.990, 193.145, 193.265, 194.119, 210.192, 210.194, 210.195, 333.011, and 333.072, to read 5 as follows:

58.035. 1. There is hereby established within the department of health and senior services a "Coroner Standards and Training Commission" which shall be composed of eight members, appointed by the governor, with the advice and consent of the senate. The governor shall take into account the diversity of the state when making the appointments to this commission. The commission shall consist of:

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- (1) Two coroners elected from counties of the third classification;(2) One coroner elected from a county of the first, second, or fourth classification;
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- 8 (3) One currently appointed medical examiner;
- 9 (4) One child death pathologist;
- 10 (5) One elected prosecuting attorney;

EXPLANATION — Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in **bold-face** type in the above bill is proposed language.

(6) One elected sheriff;

12 (7) The director of the department of health and senior services, or his or her 13 designee, who shall serve as a nonvoting member of the commission.

Each member of the coroner standards and training commission shall have been at the time of his appointment a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state for a period of at least one year, and members who are coroners shall be qualified as established by chapter 58.

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2. The members of the commission shall serve for the following terms:

19 (1) Every member of the commission who holds elected office shall serve an initial
 20 term of two years;

(2) Every member of the commission who does not hold elected office shall serve
 an initial term of four years;

23 (3) Every member of the commission shall serve for a term of four years after the24 initial term has been served.

25 **3.** Annually the commission shall elect one of the members as chairperson. The 26 coroner standards and training commission shall meet at least twice each year as 27 determined by the director of the department of health and senior services, the 28 chairperson, or a majority of the members to perform its duties. A majority of the 29 members of the coroner standards and training commission shall constitute a quorum.

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 4. No member of the coroner standards and training commission shall receive any
 31 compensation for the performance of his or her official duties.

5. The coroner standards and training commission shall establish training standards, by rule, relating to the office of county coroner. These standards shall relate to the operation of the office, the legal responsibilities of the office, and the technical skills and knowledge required of the office.

36 6. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is 37 created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it 38 complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536, and, if applicable, 39 section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable and if any of the powers 40 vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective 41 date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the 42 grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2019, 43 shall be invalid and void.

44 7. Once the commission has developed standards, the commission shall issue a 45 report detailing the standards. This report shall be submitted to the speaker of the house

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46 of representatives and the president pro tempore of the senate, and shall be published on
47 the website of the department of health and senior services.

58.095. 1. The county coroner in any county[, other than in a first classification chartered county,] not having a charter form of government shall receive an annual salary computed on a basis as set forth in the following schedule. The provisions of this section shall not permit or require a reduction in the amount of compensation being paid for the office of coroner on January 1, 1997:

18 2. One thousand dollars of the salary authorized in this section shall be payable to the 19 coroner only if the coroner has completed at least twenty hours of classroom instruction each 20 calendar year [relating to the operations of the coroner's office when approved by a professional 21 association of the county coroners of Missouri] as established by the coroner standards and 22 training commission unless exempted from the training by the [professional association] 23 Missouri Coroners' and Medical Examiners' Association for good cause. The professional 24 association approving the program] Missouri Coroners' and Medical Examiners' Association 25 shall provide a certificate of completion to each coroner who completes the training program and 26 shall send a list of certified coroners to the treasurer of each county and the department of 27 health and senior services. The coroner standards and training commission may certify 28 training programs that satisfy the requirements of this section in lieu of the training 29 provided by the Missouri Coroners' and Medical Examiners' Association. Certified 30 training completion shall be submitted to the Missouri Coroners' and Medical Examiners' 31 Association, which, upon validating the certified training, shall submit the individual's name to the county treasurer and department of health and senior services indicating the 32 33 individual is compliant with the training requirements. Expenses incurred for attending the 34 training session may be reimbursed to the county coroner in the same manner as other expenses

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35 as may be appropriated for that purpose. All elected or appointed coroners, deputy coroners, and 36 assistants to the coroner shall complete the annual training described in this subsection within 37 six months of election or appointment.

38 3. The county coroner in any county, other than a first classification charter county, shall 39 not, except upon two-thirds vote of all the members of the salary commission, receive an annual 40 compensation in an amount less than the total compensation being received for the office of 41 county coroner in the particular county for services rendered or performed on the date the salary 42 commission votes.

43 4. For the term beginning in 1997, the compensation of the coroner, in counties in which 44 the salary commission has not voted to pay one hundred percent of the maximum allowable 45 salary, shall be a percentage of the maximum allowable salary established by this section. The percentage applied shall be the same percentage of the maximum allowable salary received or 46 47 allowed, whichever is greater, to the presiding commissioner or sheriff, whichever is greater, of 48 that county for the year beginning January 1, 1997. In those counties in which the salary 49 commission has voted to pay one hundred percent of the maximum allowable salary, the 50 compensation of the coroner shall be based on the maximum allowable salary in effect at each 51 time a coroner's term of office commences following the vote to pay one hundred percent of the 52 maximum allowable compensation. Subsequent compensation shall be determined as provided 53 in section 50.333.

54 5. Effective January 1, 1997, the county coroner in any county[, other than a county of 55 the first classification with a charter form of government,] not having a charter form of 56 government may, upon the approval of the county commission, receive additional compensation 57 for any month during which investigations or other services are performed for three or more 58 decedents in the same incident during such month. The additional compensation shall be an 59 amount that when added to the regular compensation the sum shall equal the monthly 60 compensation of the county sheriff.

58.208. 1. One dollar of the fee collected for any death certificate issued under 2 section 193.265 shall be deposited into the Missouri state coroners' training fund 3 established under subsection 2 of this section. Moneys in such fund shall be used by the 4 Missouri Coroners' and Medical Examiners' Association:

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(1) For in-state training, equipment, and necessary supplies; and

6 (2) To provide aid to training programs approved by the Missouri Coroners' and 7 Medical Examiners' Association.

8 2. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Missouri State Coroners' 9 Training Fund", which shall consist of moneys collected under subsection 1 of this section. 10 The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. In accordance with sections 30.170 and

11 30.180, the state treasurer may approve disbursements. The fund shall be a dedicated fund

and, upon appropriation, moneys in the fund shall be used solely for the administration ofsubsection 1 of this section.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary, any moneys
 remaining in the fund over the amount of five hundred thousand dollars shall revert to the
 credit of the general revenue fund.

(3) The state treasurer shall invest moneys in the fund in the same manner as other
 funds are invested. Any interest and moneys earned on such investments shall be credited
 to the fund.

20 **3.** Local registrars may, during states of emergency or disaster, request 21 reimbursement from the fund for copies of death certificates issued to individuals who are 22 unable to afford the associated fees.

58.451. 1. When any person, in any county in which a coroner is required by section 2 58.010, dies and there is reasonable ground to believe that such person died as a result of:

(1) Violence by homicide, suicide, or accident;

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(2) Criminal abortions, including those self-induced;

5 (3) Some unforeseen sudden occurrence and the deceased had not been attended by a 6 physician during the thirty-six-hour period preceding the death;

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(4) In any unusual or suspicious manner;

8 (5) Any injury or illness while in the custody of the law or while an inmate in a public 9 institution;

10 the police, sheriff, law enforcement officer or official, or any person having knowledge of such a death shall immediately notify the coroner of the known facts concerning the time, place, 11 12 manner and circumstances of the death. Immediately upon receipt of notification, the coroner 13 or deputy coroner shall take charge of the dead body and fully investigate the essential facts 14 concerning the medical causes of death, including whether by the act of man, and the manner of death. The coroner or deputy coroner may take the names and addresses of witnesses to the 15 death and shall file this information in the coroner's office. The coroner or deputy coroner shall 16 take possession of all property of value found on the body, making exact inventory of such 17 property on the report and shall direct the return of such property to the person entitled to its 18 19 custody or possession. The coroner or deputy coroner shall take possession of any object or article which, in the coroner's or the deputy coroner's opinion, may be useful in establishing the 20 21 cause of death, and deliver it to the prosecuting attorney of the county.

22 2. When a death occurs outside a licensed health care facility, the first licensed medical 23 professional or law enforcement official learning of such death shall immediately contact the 24 county coroner. Immediately upon receipt of such notification, the coroner or the coroner's

deputy shall make the determination if further investigation is necessary, based on information provided by the individual contacting the coroner, and immediately advise such individual of the coroner's intentions.

3. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 2 of this section to the contrary, when a death occurs under the care of a hospice, no investigation shall be required if the death is certified by the treating physician of the deceased or the medical director of the hospice as a natural death due to disease or diagnosed illness. The hospice shall provide written notice to the coroner within twenty-four hours of the death.

33 4. Upon taking charge of the dead body and before moving the body the coroner shall 34 notify the police department of any city in which the dead body is found, or if the dead body is 35 found in the unincorporated area of a county governed by the provisions of sections 58.451 to 36 58.457, the coroner shall notify the county sheriff or the highway patrol and cause the body to 37 remain unmoved until the police department, sheriff or the highway patrol has inspected the body 38 and the surrounding circumstances and carefully noted the appearance, the condition and position 39 of the body and recorded every fact and circumstance tending to show the cause and manner of 40 death, with the names and addresses of all known witnesses, and shall subscribe the same and 41 make such record a part of the coroner's report.

42 [4.] 5. In any case of sudden, violent or suspicious death after which the body was 43 buried without any investigation or autopsy, the coroner, upon being advised of such facts, may 44 at the coroner's own discretion request that the prosecuting attorney apply for a court order 45 requiring the body to be exhumed.

46 [5.] 6. The coroner may certify the cause of death in any case where death occurred 47 without medical attendance or where an attending physician refuses to sign a certificate of death 48 or when a physician is unavailable to sign a certificate of death.

49 [6.] 7. When the cause of death is established by the coroner, the coroner shall file a 50 copy of the findings in the coroner's office within thirty days.

51 [7-] 8. If on view of the dead body and after personal inquiry into the cause and manner 52 of death, the coroner determines that a further examination is necessary in the public interest, the 53 coroner on the coroner's own authority may make or cause to be made an autopsy on the body. 54 The coroner may on the coroner's own authority employ the services of a pathologist, chemist, 55 or other expert to aid in the examination of the body or of substances supposed to have caused 56 or contributed to death, and if the pathologist, chemist, or other expert is not already employed 57 by the city or county for the discharge of such services, the pathologist, chemist, or other expert 58 shall, upon written authorization of the coroner, be allowed reasonable compensation, payable 59 by the city or county, in the manner provided in section 58.530. The coroner shall, at the time

60 of the autopsy, record or cause to be recorded each fact and circumstance tending to show the 61 condition of the body and the cause and manner of death.

62 [8.] 9. If on view of the dead body and after personal inquiry into the cause and manner 63 of death, the coroner considers a further inquiry and examination necessary in the public interest, 64 the coroner shall make out the coroner's warrant directed to the sheriff of the city or county 65 requiring the sheriff forthwith to summon six good and lawful citizens of the county to appear 66 before the coroner, at the time and place expressed in the warrant, and to inquire how and by 67 whom the deceased died.

[9.] 10. (1) When a person is being transferred from one county to another county for medical treatment and such person dies while being transferred, or dies while being treated in the emergency room of the receiving facility the place which the person is determined to be dead shall be considered the place of death and the county coroner or medical examiner of the county from which the person was originally being transferred shall be responsible for determining the cause and manner of death for the Missouri certificate of death.

(2) The coroner or medical examiner in the county in which the person is determined to be dead may with authorization of the coroner or medical examiner from the original transferring county, investigate and conduct postmortem examinations at the expense of the coroner or medical examiner from the original transferring county. The coroner or medical examiner from the original transferring county shall be responsible for investigating the circumstances of such and completing the Missouri certificate of death. The certificate of death shall be filed in the county where the deceased was pronounced dead.

81 (3) Such coroner or medical examiner of the county where a person is determined to be 82 dead shall immediately notify the coroner or medical examiner of the county from which the 83 person was originally being transferred of the death of such person, and shall make available 84 information and records obtained for investigation of the death.

85 (4) If a person does not die while being transferred and is institutionalized as a regularly 86 admitted patient after such transfer and subsequently dies while in such institution, the coroner 87 or medical examiner of the county in which the person is determined to be dead shall 88 immediately notify the coroner or medical examiner of the county from which such person was 89 originally transferred of the death of such person. In such cases, the county in which the 90 deceased was institutionalized shall be considered the place of death. If the manner of death is 91 by homicide, suicide, accident, criminal abortion including those that are self-induced, child 92 fatality, or any unusual or suspicious manner, the investigation of the cause and manner of death 93 shall revert to the county of origin, and this coroner or medical examiner shall be responsible for 94 the Missouri certificate of death. The certificate of death shall be filed in the county where the 95 deceased was pronounced dead.

96 [10.] 11. There shall not be any statute of limitations or time limits on the cause of death 97 when death is the final result or determined to be caused by homicide, suicide, accident, child 98 fatality, criminal abortion including those self-induced, or any unusual or suspicious manner. 99 The place of death shall be the place in which the person is determined to be dead. The final 100 investigation of death in determining the cause and matter of death shall revert to the county of 101 origin, and the coroner or medical examiner of such county shall be responsible for the Missouri 102 certificate of death. The certificate of death shall be filed in the county where the deceased was 103 pronounced dead.

104 [11.] 12. Except as provided in subsection [9] 10 of this section, if a person dies in one 105 county and the body is subsequently transferred to another county, for burial or other reasons, 106 the county coroner or medical examiner where the death occurred shall be responsible for the 107 certificate of death and for investigating the cause and manner of the death.

108 [12.] 13. In performing the duties, the coroner or medical examiner shall comply with 109 sections 58.775 to 58.785 with respect to organ donation.

58.720. 1. When any person dies within a county having a medical examiner as a result of:

3 (1) Violence by homicide, suicide, or accident;

(2) Thermal, chemical, electrical, or radiation injury;

(3) Criminal abortions, including those self-induced;

6 (4) Disease thought to be of a hazardous and contagious nature or which might constitute 7 a threat to public health; or when any person dies:

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(a) Suddenly when in apparent good health;

9 (b) When unattended by a physician, chiropractor, or an accredited Christian Science 10 practitioner, during the period of thirty-six hours immediately preceding his death;

11 12 (c) While in the custody of the law, or while an inmate in a public institution;

(d) In any unusual or suspicious manner;

13 the police, sheriff, law enforcement officer or official, or any person having knowledge of such 14 a death shall immediately notify the office of the medical examiner of the known facts 15 concerning the time, place, manner and circumstances of the death. Immediately upon receipt 16 of notification, the medical examiner or his designated assistant shall take charge of the dead 17 body and fully investigate the essential facts concerning the medical causes of death. He may 18 take the names and addresses of witnesses to the death and shall file this information in his 19 office. The medical examiner or his designated assistant shall take possession of all property of 20 value found on the body, making exact inventory thereof on his report and shall direct the return 21 of such property to the person entitled to its custody or possession. The medical examiner or his 22 designated assistant examiner shall take possession of any object or article which, in his opinion,

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may be useful in establishing the cause of death, and deliver it to the prosecuting attorney of the county.

25 2. When a death occurs outside a licensed health care facility, the first licensed medical 26 professional or law enforcement official learning of such death shall contact the county medical 27 examiner. Immediately upon receipt of such notification, the medical examiner or the medical 28 examiner's deputy shall make a determination if further investigation is necessary, based on 29 information provided by the individual contacting the medical examiner, and immediately advise 30 such individual of the medical examiner's intentions.

31 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 2 of this section to the contrary, 32 when a death occurs under the care of a hospice, no investigation shall be required if the 33 death is certified by the treating physician of the deceased or the medical director of the 34 hospice as a natural death due to disease or diagnosed illness. The hospice shall provide 35 written notice to the medical examiner within twenty-four hours of the death.

40 [4.] 5. The medical examiner shall certify the cause of death in any case where death 41 occurred without medical attendance or where an attending physician refuses to sign a certificate 42 of death, and may sign a certificate of death in the case of any death.

43 [5.] 6. When the cause of death is established by the medical examiner, he shall file a 44 copy of his findings in his office within thirty days after notification of the death.

45 [6.] 7. (1) When a person is being transferred from one county to another county for 46 medical treatment and such person dies while being transferred, or dies while being treated in 47 the emergency room of the receiving facility, the place which the person is determined to be dead 48 shall be considered the place of death and the county coroner or the medical examiner of the 49 county from which the person was originally being transferred shall be responsible for 50 determining the cause and manner of death for the Missouri certificate of death.

(2) The coroner or medical examiner in the county in which the person is determined to be dead may, with authorization of the coroner or medical examiner from the transferring county, investigate and conduct postmortem examinations at the expense of the coroner or medical examiner from the transferring county. The coroner or medical examiner from the transferring county shall be responsible for investigating the circumstances of such and completing the Missouri certificate of death. The certificate of death shall be filed in the county where the deceased was pronounced dead. 58 (3) Such coroner or medical examiner, or the county where a person is determined to be 59 dead, shall immediately notify the coroner or medical examiner of the county from which the 60 person was originally being transferred of the death of such person and shall make available 61 information and records obtained for investigation of death.

62 (4) If a person does not die while being transferred and is institutionalized as a regularly 63 admitted patient after such transfer and subsequently dies while in such institution, the coroner 64 or medical examiner of the county in which the person is determined to be dead shall 65 immediately notify the coroner or medical examiner of the county from which such person was 66 originally transferred of the death of such person. In such cases, the county in which the deceased was institutionalized shall be considered the place of death. If the manner of death is 67 68 by homicide, suicide, accident, criminal abortion including those that are self-induced, child fatality, or any unusual or suspicious manner, the investigation of the cause and manner of death 69 70 shall revert to the county of origin, and this coroner or medical examiner shall be responsible for 71 the Missouri certificate of death. The certificate of death shall be filed in the county where the 72 deceased was pronounced dead.

73 [7.] 8. There shall not be any statute of limitations or time limits on cause of death when 74 death is the final result or determined to be caused by homicide, suicide, accident, criminal abortion including those self-induced, child fatality, or any unusual or suspicious manner. The 75 76 place of death shall be the place in which the person is determined to be dead, but the final 77 investigation of death determining the cause and manner of death shall revert to the county of 78 origin, and this coroner or medical examiner shall be responsible for the Missouri certificate of 79 death. The certificate of death shall be filed in the county where the deceased was pronounced 80 dead.

[8.] 9. Except as provided in subsection [6] 7 of this section, if a person dies in one county and the body is subsequently transferred to another county, for burial or other reasons, the county coroner or medical examiner where the death occurred shall be responsible for the certificate of death and for investigating the cause and manner of the death.

85 [9.] 10. In performing the duties, the coroner or medical examiner shall comply with 86 sections 58.775 to 58.785 with respect to organ donation.

192.067. 1. The department of health and senior services, for purposes of conducting epidemiological studies to be used in promoting and safeguarding the health of the citizens of Missouri under the authority of this chapter is authorized to receive information from patient medical records. The provisions of this section shall also apply to the collection, analysis, and disclosure of nosocomial infection data from patient records collected pursuant to section 192.667 and to the collection of data under section 192.990.

7 2. The department shall maintain the confidentiality of all medical record information 8 abstracted by or reported to the department. Medical information secured pursuant to the 9 provisions of subsection 1 of this section may be released by the department only in a statistical aggregate form that precludes and prevents the identification of patient, physician, or medical 10 facility except that medical information may be shared with other public health authorities and 11 12 coinvestigators of a health study if they abide by the same confidentiality restrictions required 13 of the department of health and senior services and except as otherwise authorized by the 14 provisions of sections 192.665 to 192.667, or section 192.990. The department of health and 15 senior services, public health authorities and coinvestigators shall use the information collected only for the purposes provided for in this section [and], section 192.667, or section 192.990. 16

17 3. No individual or organization providing information to the department in accordance 18 with this section shall be deemed to be or be held liable, either civilly or criminally, for divulging 19 confidential information unless such individual organization acted in bad faith or with malicious 20 purpose.

4. The department of health and senior services is authorized to reimburse medical care facilities, within the limits of appropriations made for that purpose, for the costs associated with abstracting data for special studies.

5. Any department of health and senior services employee, public health authority or coinvestigator of a study who knowingly releases information which violates the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a class A misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be punished as provided by law.

192.990. 1. There is hereby established within the department of health and senior services the "Pregnancy-Associated Mortality Review Board" to improve data collection and reporting with respect to maternal deaths. The department may collaborate with localities and with other states to meet the goals of the initiative.

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2. For purposes of this section, the following terms shall mean:

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(1) "Department", the Missouri department of health and senior services;

7 (2) "Maternal death", the death of a woman while pregnant or during the one-year 8 period following the date of the end of pregnancy, regardless of the cause of death and 9 regardless of whether a delivery, miscarriage, or death occurs inside or outside of a 10 hospital.

3. The board shall be composed of no more than eighteen members, with a chair elected from among its membership. The board shall meet at least twice per year and shall approve the strategic priorities, funding allocations, work processes, and products of the board. Members of the board shall be appointed by the director of the department.

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Members shall serve four-year terms, except that the initial terms shall be staggered so that approximately one-third serve three, four, and five-year terms.

4. The board shall have a multidisciplinary and diverse membership that represents a variety of medical and nursing specialties, including, but not limited to, obstetrics and maternal-fetal care, as well as state or local public health officials, epidemiologists, statisticians, community organizations, geographic regions, and other individuals or organizations that are most affected by maternal deaths and lack of access to maternal health care services.

5. The duties of the board shall include, but not be limited to:

(1) Conducting ongoing comprehensive, multidisciplinary reviews of all maternaldeaths;

26 (2) Identifying factors associated with maternal deaths;

27 (3) Reviewing medical records and other relevant data, which shall include, to the
 28 extent available:

(a) A description of the maternal deaths determined by matching each death record
of a maternal death to a birth certificate of an infant or fetal death record, as applicable,
and an indication of whether the delivery, miscarriage, or death occurred inside or outside
of a hospital;

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(b) Data collected from medical examiner and coroner reports, as appropriate; and

34 (c) Using other appropriate methods or information to identify maternal deaths,
 35 including deaths from pregnancy outcomes not identified under paragraph (a) of this
 36 subdivision;

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(4) Consulting with relevant experts, as needed;

38 (5) Analyzing cases to produce recommendations for reducing maternal mortality;

39 (6) Disseminating recommendations to policy makers, health care providers and
 40 facilities, and the general public;

41 (7) Recommending and promoting preventative strategies and making 42 recommendations for systems changes;

A certificate of death for each death which occurs in this state shall be filed 2 with the local registrar, or as otherwise directed by the state registrar, within five days after death 3 and shall be registered if such certificate has been completed and filed pursuant to this section. 4 All data providers in the death registration process, including, but not limited to, the state 5 registrar, local registrars, the state medical examiner, county medical examiners, coroners, funeral directors or persons acting as such, embalmers, sheriffs, attending physicians and resident 6 physicians, physician assistants, assistant physicians, advanced practice registered nurses, and 7 8 the chief medical officers of licensed health care facilities, and other public or private institutions 9 providing medical care, treatment, or confinement to persons, shall be required to use and utilize 10 any electronic death registration system required and adopted under subsection 1 of section 11 193.265 within six months of the system being certified by the director of the department of 12 health and senior services, or the director's designee, to be operational and available to all data 13 providers in the death registration process. registered in this state but the certificate shall show the actual place of death if such place maybe determined.

4. The funeral director or person in charge of final disposition of the dead body shall file

For purposes of this chapter and chapters 193, 333, and 436, and in all cases relating 4 to the custody, control, and disposition of deceased human remains, including the common law right of sepulcher, where not otherwise defined, the term "next-of-kin" means the following 5 6 persons in the priority listed if such person is eighteen years of age or older, is mentally 7 competent, and is willing to assume responsibility for the costs of disposition:

8 (1) An attorney in fact designated in a durable power of attorney wherein the deceased 9 specifically granted the right of sepulcher over his or her body to such attorney in fact;

10 (2) For a decedent who was on active duty in the United States military at the time of 11 death, the person designated by such decedent in the written instrument known as the United 12 States Department of Defense Form 93, Record of Emergency Data, in accordance with [P.L. 109-163, Section 564, 10 U.S.C. Section 1482; 13

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(3) The surviving spouse, unless an action for the dissolution of the marriage has 15 been filed and is pending in a court of competent jurisdiction;

16 (4) Any surviving child of the deceased. If a surviving child is less than eighteen years 17 of age and has a legal or natural guardian, such child shall not be disqualified on the basis of the child's age and such child's legal or natural guardian, if any, shall be entitled to serve in the place 18 19 of the child unless such child's legal or natural guardian was subject to an action in dissolution 20 from the deceased. In such event the person or persons who may serve as next-of-kin shall serve 21 in the order provided in subdivisions (5) to (9) of this subsection;

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- (5) (a) Any surviving parent of the deceased; or
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(b) If the deceased is a minor, a surviving parent who has custody of the minor; or

24 (c) If the deceased is a minor and the deceased's parents have joint custody, the parent 25 whose residence is the minor child's residence for purposes of mailing and education;

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- (6) Any surviving sibling of the deceased;
- 27 (7) The next nearest surviving relative of the deceased by consanguinity or affinity;

(8) Any person or friend who assumes financial responsibility for the disposition of the
 deceased's remains if no next-of-kin assumes such responsibility;

30 (9) The county coroner or medical examiner; provided however that such assumption 31 of responsibility shall not make the coroner, medical examiner, the county, or the state 32 financially responsible for the cost of disposition.

33 3. The next-of-kin of the deceased shall be entitled to control the final disposition of the 34 remains of any dead human being consistent with all applicable laws, including all applicable 35 health codes. The next-of-kin may delegate the control of the final disposition of the 36 remains of any dead human being to an agent through either a specific or general grant of 37 power in accordance with section 404.710 if, at the time of delegation, the next-of-kin was 38 eighteen years of age or older and mentally competent and the principal or agent is taking 39 financial responsibility for the disposition.

A funeral director or establishment is entitled to rely on and act according to the 41 lawful instructions of any person claiming to be the next-of-kin of the deceased; provided 42 however, in any civil cause of action against a funeral director or establishment licensed pursuant 43 to this chapter for actions taken regarding the funeral arrangements for a deceased person in the 44 director's or establishment's care, the relative fault, if any, of such funeral director or 45 establishment may be reduced if such actions are taken in reliance upon a person's claim to be 46 the deceased person's next-of-kin.

5. Any person who desires to exercise the right of sepulcher and who has knowledge of an individual or individuals with a superior right to control disposition shall notify such individual or individuals prior to making final arrangements.

6. If an individual with a superior claim is [personally served with written notice from] notified in person or by written notice with delivery confirmation to such person's last known address by a person with an inferior claim that such person desires to exercise the right of sepulcher and the individual so served does not object within forty-eight hours of [receipt] such notice, such individual shall be deemed to have waived such right. An individual with a superior right may also waive such right at any time if such waiver is in writing and dated.

56 7. If there is more than one person in a class who are equal in priority and the funeral 57 director has no knowledge of any objection by other members of such class, the funeral director 58 or establishment shall be entitled to rely on and act according to the instructions of the first such 59 person in the class to make arrangements; provided that such person assumes responsibility for 60 the costs of disposition and no other person in such class provides written notice of his or her 61 objection. If the funeral director has knowledge that there is more than one person in a class who 62 are equal in priority and who do not agree on the disposition, the decision of the majority of the 63 members of such class shall control the disposition.

The panel shall be formed and shall operate according to the rules, guidelines and protocols provided by the department of social services.
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2. The panel shall include, but shall not be limited to, the following:

- 7 (1) The prosecuting or circuit attorney;
- 8 (2) The coroner or medical examiner for the county or city not within a county;
- 9 (3) Law enforcement personnel in the county or city not within a county;
- 10 (4) A representative from the children's division;
- 11 (5) A provider of public health care services;
- 12 (6) A representative of the juvenile court;
- 13 (7) A provider of emergency medical services.
- 14 3. The prosecuting or circuit attorney shall organize the panel and shall call the first 15 organizational meeting of the panel. The panel shall elect a chairman who shall convene the 16 panel to meet to review all deaths of children under the age of eighteen years, who are eligible 17 to receive a certificate of live birth, which meet guidelines for review as set forth by the 18 department of social services. In addition, the panel may review at its own discretion any child 19 death reported to it by the medical examiner or coroner, even if it does not meet criteria for 20 review as set forth by the department. The panel shall issue a final report, which shall be a 21 public record, of each investigation to the department of social services, state technical assistance 22 team and to the director of the department of health and senior services. The final report shall 23 include a completed summary report form. The state technical assistance team shall make nonidentifiable, aggregate data on 20 child fatalities publicly available. Identifiable data shall be released at the discretion of the 21 director of the department of social services, except for any data that was obtained only 22 from birth or death certificate records provided by the department of health and senior 23 services. In those cases, the release of identifiable data shall be at the discretion of the state 24 registrar.

210.195. 1. The director of the department of social services shall establish a special 2 team which shall:

(1) Develop and implement protocols for the evaluation and review of child fatalities;

4 (2) Provide training, expertise and assistance to county child fatality review panels for 5 the review of child fatalities;

6 (3) When required and unanimously requested by the county fatality review panel, assist 7 in the review and prosecution of specific child fatalities; and

8 (4) The special team may be known as the department of social services, state technical 9 assistance team.

10 2. The director of the department of social services shall appoint regional coordinators 11 to serve as resources to child fatality review panels established pursuant to section 210.192.

12 3. The director of the department of social services shall appoint a state child fatality 13 review panel which shall meet at least biannually to provide oversight and make 14 recommendations to the department of social services, state technical assistance team. The

15 department of social services, state technical assistance team shall gather data from local child 16 fatality review panels to identify systemic problems and shall submit findings and 17 recommendations to the director of the department of social services, the governor, the speaker 18 of the house of representatives, the president pro tempore of the senate, the children's services 19 commission, juvenile officers, and the chairman of the local child fatality review panel, at least 20 once a year, on ways to prevent further child abuse and injury deaths. The report shall include a summary of compliance with the provisions of sections 210.192 to 210.196 for each county 21 22 or city not within a county.

333.011. 1. As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise, the following2 terms have the meanings indicated:

3 4 (1) "Board", the state board of embalmers and funeral directors created by this chapter;

(2) "Embalmer", any individual licensed to engage in the practice of embalming;

Practice of embalming includes all activities leading up to and including arterial and cavity embalming, including but not limited to raising of vessels and suturing of incisions of dead human bodies for funeral services, transportation, burial or cremation, or the holding of oneself out as being engaged in such work;

An outdoor cremation facility shall comply with all local, state, and federal laws to ensure public health and safety. 2 3 2. 4. The application for a permit shall be completed and filed at least three days prior
 to the date of the outdoor cremation.

5. The funeral establishment shall provide written notice to the applicable local law enforcement agency at least twenty-four hours in advance of any outdoor cremation. Such notice shall include the date, location, and approximate time of the outdoor cremation, the name and contact information of the funeral director performing the outdoor cremation, and a copy of the permit from the board to perform the outdoor cremation. The funeral establishment must maintain a copy of such written notice in its records.

6. The board may inspect any location proposed for an outdoor cremation facility
 to ensure compliance with the provisions of chapters 333 and 436 and their accompanying
 regulations.

37 7. A licensed funeral director, or his or her designee, shall be present to supervise
38 any cremation conducted at an outdoor cremation facility.

39 8. The board is hereby authorized to promulgate rules and regulations for 40 establishing and regulating outdoor human cremation facilities. Any rule or portion of a 41 rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010 that is created under the authority delegated 42 in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the 43 provisions of chapter 536, and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 44 are nonseverable and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to 45 chapter 536, to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are 46 subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule 47 proposed or adopted after August 28, 2019, shall be invalid and void.

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
