HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 1

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rules of the House of Representatives of the Ninety-ninth General Assembly, and all amendments thereto, be the temporary Rules of the House of Representatives, One Hundredth General Assembly, until or unless otherwise ordered, with the following amendments:

The regular standing committees of the House shall be as 6 Rule 23. 7 follows: 8 (1) Administration and Accounts. 9 (2) Agriculture Policy. 10 (3) Budget. 11 (4) Children and Families. Consent and House Procedure. 12 (5) (6) Conservation and Natural Resources. 1.3 14 (7) Corrections and Public Institutions. 15 (8) Crime Prevention and Public Safety. 16 (9) Downsizing State Government. 17 (10) Economic Development. [(10)] (11) Elections and Elected Officials. 18 19 [(11)] (12) Elementary and Secondary Education. 20 [<u>(12)</u>] <u>(13)</u> Ethics. 21 [(13)] (14) Financial Institutions. 22 [(14)] (15) Fiscal Review. 23 [<u>(15)</u>] <u>(16)</u> General Laws. 24 [(16) Government Efficiency.] (17) Health and Mental Health Policy. 25 26 (18) Higher Education. 27 (19)Insurance Policy. 28 (20)Judiciary. 29 (21)Local Government. 30 Pensions. (27)36 (28)Veterans. 37 (29)Ways and Means. 38 (30)Workforce Development. 39 Duties of the Regular Standing Committees 40 Rule 24. (1) Duties Generally. Regular standing committees shall have 41 the authority to consider bills and resolutions that have been referred 42 to them and: 43 (a) Report the bill or resolution "Do Pass", "Without 44 Recommendation", or "Do Pass - Consent" to the Speaker. 45 (b) Report the bill or resolution "Do Pass with recommended 1 committee amendment" to the Speaker.

(c) Report the bill or resolution as a "House Committee Substitute - Do Pass" or "House Committee Substitute - Without Recommendation" to the Speaker.

(2) Administration and Accounts.

6 The Committee on Administration and Duties generally. (a) 7 Accounts shall superintend and have sole and complete control of all 8 financial obligations and business affairs of the House except those 9 employees appointed by or assigned to the Speaker, or assigned to the 10 Budget Committee Chair, the Speaker Pro Tem, the Majority Floor Leader, 11 the Minority Floor Leader, and the Officers of the House. The committee shall provide for the receiving and receipt of all supplies, equipment, 12 13 and furnishings purchased from the account of the House and shall 14 further provide for the use and distribution thereof.

(b) Funds for operation of member's individual offices. The committee shall also prescribe rules governing the expenditure of funds allotted to individual members for the operation of their offices. Such rules shall be applied equally to, and shall require the equal treatment of, all members with regard to the expenditure of such funds. Subject to such rules, each member shall have discretion to expend such funds, for the use of his or her office, without the approval of the committee.

22 (C) Allotment of offices, chamber seats, and parking spaces. 23 Each member shall be allotted his or her own office, chamber seat, and 24 parking assignment. The committee shall assign all offices, chamber 25 seats, and parking spaces under its control and reserved for members. The committee may make assignments to the party caucuses for those 26 27 caucuses to assign to their respective members. The House officers, the floor leaders and assistant floor leaders of each party, the Budget 28 29 Committee Chair, and the chair and ranking minority member of the 30 Administration and Accounts Committee, without respect to the seniority 31 of those members, shall have priority with respect to such assignments 32 within their respective caucuses.

33 (d) Duties of the Chief Clerk in Respect to Committee. The Chief 34 Clerk of the House may be authorized to act for the committee, but only 35 in the manner and to the extent as may have been previously authorized 36 by the committee. Such authorization shall be entered in the minutes of 37 the committee. The Chief Clerk shall maintain financial records for the 38 House in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The 39 Chief Clerk of the House shall keep a detailed accounting of all 40 transactions and shall furnish each member of the committee and the 41 Speaker with a copy of such account on a quarterly basis.

(e) Recognition of Caucuses. The committee may approve and prescribe for the recognition of caucuses. Any group of five or more House members may seek designation as a caucus for the purpose of identifying and collaborating on issues within a common sphere of public interest.

47 (3) The Committee on Agriculture Policy. The Committee on 48 Agriculture Policy may consider and report upon bills and matters 49 referred to it relating to the protection, promotion, and encouragement 50 of agriculture in this state.

51 (4) The Committee on Budget.(a) The Chair of the Committee on 52 Budget shall have the sole responsibility of filing all appropriations 53 bills. The Committee on Budget shall have the responsibility for any other bills, measures, or questions referred to it pertaining to the appropriation and disbursement of public moneys.

3 (b) Other duties. The committee may consider and report upon any 4 bill or resolution referred to it which, in the opinion of the Speaker, 5 merits special consideration. The committee may also consider and 6 report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to the 7 reorganization, consolidation, and abolition of boards, bureaus, commissions, and other offices and buildings of the state, including the 8 9 Division of Facilities Management, Design and Construction, the capitol 10 grounds, and the state and legislative libraries. The committee is 11 empowered to study and investigate the efficiency and economy of all 12 branches of government, including the possible existence of fraud, 13 misfeasance, malfeasance, collusion, mismanagement, incompetence, 14 corruption, waste, conflicts of interest, and the improper expenditure 15 of government funds in transactions, contracts, and activities of the 16 government or government officials and employees. The committee is 17 authorized to hold hearings, sit, and act at any time or place within 18 the state of Missouri during the recess and adjournment periods of the 19 House, administer oaths, and take testimony, either orally or by sworn 20 written statement. If the committee, after hearing and upon findings 21 incorporated in a report, deems that a particular activity, bureau, 22 agency, committee, commission, department, or any other entity of state 23 government should be discontinued, it shall report such finding to the 24 House for further action by the House.

25 (c) The Committee on Budget shall have the following 26 subcommittees:

a. The Subcommittee on Appropriations - Agriculture, Conservation,
Natural Resources, and Economic Development.

b. The Subcommittee on Appropriations - Education.

c. The Subcommittee on Appropriations - General Administration.

d. The Subcommittee on Appropriations - Health, Mental Health, and
Social Services.

e. The Subcommittee on Appropriations - Public Safety,
Corrections, Transportation, and Revenue.

(5) The Committee on Consent and House Procedure.

36 (a) The Committee on Consent and House Procedure may consider and 37 report upon bills and matters referred to it which, in the opinion of 38 the Speaker, merit special consideration.

39 If a bill is automatically referred to the Committee on (b) 40 Consent and House Procedure with a recommendation that it "Do Pass -41 Consent", the committee shall review the bill for the purpose of 42 determining whether it should have consent status. The committee may 43 decide, by a majority of those present, whether to place the bill on the 44 appropriate consent calendar. If the committee declines to place the 45 bill on the appropriate consent calendar, it may consider whether to report the bill to the House with a "Do Pass" recommendation without 46 47 consent status.

(c) <u>The Committee on Consent and House Procedure may perform all</u> duties relating to the issuance of courtesy resolutions. A courtesy resolution is a noncontroversial resolution in the nature of congratulations on the birth of a child, celebration of a wedding anniversary, congratulations on an outstanding citizen achievement, or a similar event which is in the practice and procedure of the House to 1 consider as a courtesy resolution and shall require action by the House 2 as provided for by the House Rules. The Chief Clerk, under the 3 direction of the committee, shall maintain a list of all courtesy 4 resolutions issued under this rule for inspection. Any resolution that 5 is not a courtesy resolution shall require action by the House as 6 provided for by the House Rules.

7 <u>(d)</u> The Committee on Consent and House Procedure shall formulate 8 and present for consideration the rules of the House and shall consider 9 and report upon all propositions to amend or change the rules, which 10 propositions shall stand referred without reading or consideration and 11 without discussion, explanation, or debate to the Committee on Consent 12 and House Procedure.

[(d)] (e) The Chief Clerk, under the direction of the committee, 13 14 shall supervise the printing of all bills ordered perfected and printed, 15 assuring that procedures are followed in which all amendments to every 16 such bill are incorporated therein before the bill is printed and that 17 the printed copies of the bill on the designated desks of the members 18 are true and accurate copies of the bill as ordered perfected and 19 printed. The committee shall also supervise the printing of all bills 20 which are truly agreed to and finally passed, assuring that procedures 21 are followed in which every bill is a true copy of the bill as passed 22 with clerical errors corrected.

(6) The Committee on Children and Families. The Committee on Children and Families may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to the Department of Social Services, the Department of Health and Senior Services, and other matters relating to the fostering and promotion of children, families, and persons with disabilities in this state.

(7) The Committee on Conservation and Natural Resources. The Committee on Conservation and Natural Resources may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to the functions and operations of the Department of Conservation and the Department of Natural Resources and all powers thereto conferred upon by the Missouri constitution and statutes.

(8) The Committee on Corrections and Public Institutions. The Committee on Corrections and Public Institutions may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to adult and juvenile penal and correctional problems, the administration of correctional institutions, and the state penitentiary.

40 (9) The Committee on Crime Prevention and Public Safety. The 41 Committee on Crime Prevention and Public Safety may consider and report 42 upon bills and matters referred to it relating to criminal laws, law 43 enforcement, and public safety matters.

(10) <u>The Committee on Downsizing State Government</u>. The Committee
on Downsizing State Government may consider and report upon bills and
matters referred to it relating to reducing the size of state government
and its programs.

48 (11) The Committee on Economic Development. The Committee on 49 Economic Development may consider and report upon bills and matters 50 referred to it relating to commerce, industrial growth, expansion, and 51 development.

52 [(11)] (12) The Committee on Elections and Elected Officials. The 53 Committee on Elections and Elected Officials may consider and report 1 upon bills and matters referred to it relating to elections and election 2 contests involving members of the House and on the qualifications and 3 terms of elected officials.

[(12)] (13) The Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education. The Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to elementary and secondary education and life-long learning in this state, including teachers, financing, property, indebtedness, and curriculum.

9 [(13)] (14) The Committee on Ethics. The Committee on Ethics may 10 consider and report upon complaints referred to it relating to a member 11 of the House involving the commission of a crime, misconduct, willful 12 neglect of duty, corruption in office, or other complaints relating to 13 the ethical conduct of a member. The committee is authorized to sit and 14 act at any time or place within the State of Missouri during the recess 15 and adjournment periods of the House, administer oaths, and take 16 testimony, either orally or by sworn written statement.

17 [(14)] (15) The Committee on Financial Institutions. The 18 Committee on Financial Institutions may consider and report upon bills 19 and matters referred to it relating to banks, banking, savings and 20 loans, credit unions, and other financial institutions.

[(15)] <u>(16)</u> The Committee on Fiscal Review.

21

22 (a) The Committee on Fiscal Review shall consider any bill which 23 requires net additional expenditures of state money in excess of 24 \$100,000 or which reduces net state revenue by more than \$100,000 in any 25 of the three fiscal years immediately following the effective date or at 26 full implementation of the bill. Any such House bill, after having been 27 perfected and ordered printed by the House, shall be referred to the 28 Committee on Fiscal Review for its consideration prior to the bill's 29 submission to the House for third reading and final passage.

Any House bill with Senate amendments or any House bill with a 30 Senate substitute, except for appropriations bills, shall be referred to 31 32 the Committee on Fiscal Review for its consideration prior to the bill's submission to the House. Any such Senate bill, after having been 33 34 approved by the regular standing or special committee to which it was 35 referred, shall be referred to the Committee on Fiscal Review for its 36 consideration prior to its submission to the House for third reading and 37 final passage.

38 Any Senate or House bill amended so as to increase net expenditures or reduce net revenues shall, upon timely motion adopted by the members, 39 40 be referred to the Committee on Fiscal Review. Such motion shall only be 41 timely for a House bill when the sponsor or handler of the House bill 42 moves that the bill be third read and passed and before the Speaker 43 restates that motion. The primary sponsor or, in the case of a Senate bill, the floor handler of a bill referred to the Committee on Fiscal 44 45 Review shall be entitled to a hearing on the bill but such hearing shall 46 be limited to the reception of testimony by the primary sponsor or floor 47 handler, as the case may be, in person and none other, without leave of 48 the committee chair.

For the purposes of this rule, "net" is defined as the sum of revenues and expenditures, after reductions and increases brought about by a bill have been calculated.

52 The Committee on Fiscal Review may, with the consent of the House 53 sponsor or floor handler, amend an effective date onto any bill referred

to the Committee except for a House bill with Senate amendments, House bill with a Senate substitute, or a bill in conference. The Committee on Fiscal Review shall have the authority to amend any emergency clause on a bill referred to it.

5 (b) Every conference report for a House bill or a Senate bill, 6 except appropriations bills, shall be referred to the Committee on 7 Fiscal Review for its consideration prior to the submission of the 8 report and any amendments, bill, or substitute the report recommends for 9 passage by the House

10 [(16)] (17) The Committee on General Laws. The Committee on 11 General Laws may consider matters referred to it relating to general or 12 miscellaneous issues as determined by the Speaker.

13 [(17) The Committee on Government Efficiency. The Committee on 14 Government Efficiency may consider matters referred to it relating to 15 reducing the size of state government and its programs.]

16 (18)The Committee on Health and Mental Health Policy. The 17 Committee on Health and Mental Health Policy may consider and report 18 upon bills and matters referred to it relating to the health care of the 19 citizens of the State, including mental health, the Department of Health 20 and Senior Services, and the Department of Mental Health. The committee may also consider and report on bills and matters referred to it 21 22 relating to Medicaid and related matters.

(19) The Committee on Higher Education. The Committee on Higher
Education may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it
related to higher education, including matters relating to financing,
facilities, staff, curriculum, and related matters.

(20) The Committee on Insurance Policy. The Committee on
Insurance Policy may consider and report upon bills and matters referred
to it relating to insurance, insurance companies, and the Department of
Insurance, Financial Institutions and Professional Registration.

31 (21) The Committee on Judiciary. The Committee on Judiciary may 32 consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to 33 the judicial branch of the state and the practices and procedures of the 34 courts of this state, on matters pertaining to civil and administrative 35 laws and procedures, and on matters relating to the ethics of public 36 officials.

37 (22) The Committee on Local Government. The Committee on Local 38 Government may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it 39 relating to counties, cities, towns, villages, other political 40 subdivisions of the state, and local government generally.

41 (23) The Committee on Pensions. The Committee on Pensions may 42 consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to 43 the regulation and administration of state policies conferred upon any 44 agency or governmental unit pursuant to the Missouri constitution and 45 statutes of publicly financed or publicly supported pension systems.

46 (24) The Committee on Professional Registration and Licensing.
47 The Committee on Professional Registration and Licensing may consider
48 and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to the
49 licensing of professionals in this state.

50

(25) The Committees on Rules.

(a) There shall be a Committee on Rules - Administrative Oversight
and a Committee on Rules - Legislative Oversight. Each Committee on
Rules shall have the same duties and shall consider and report upon all

1 matters referred to it by any of its regular standing committees. The 2 Speaker may assign special standing committees to either Committee on 3 Rules.

4 (b) The Committee on Rules - Administrative Oversight shall have 5 the following regular standing committees report to it: [Committee on 6 Conservation and Natural Resources; Committee on Elections and Elected 7 Officials; Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education; Committee on Health and Mental Health Policy; Committee on Higher Education; 8 Committee on Local Government; Committee on Pensions; Committee on 9 Professional Registration and Licensing; Committee on Transportation; 10 11 Committee on Utilities; Committee on Ways and Means; and Committee on 12 Workforce Development] Committee on Agriculture Policy; Committee on 13 Children and Families; Committee on Conservation and Natural Resources; Committee on Corrections and Public Institutions; Committee on 14 15 Elementary and Secondary Education; Committee on Insurance Policy; 16 Committee on Judiciary; Committee on Pensions; Committee on Professional 17 Registration and Licensing; Committee on Transportation; and Committee on Veterans. 18

19 (c) The Committee on Rules - Legislative Oversight shall have the 20 following regular standing committees report to it: [Committee on 21 Agriculture Policy; Committee on Budget; Committee on Children and 22 Families; Committee on Corrections and Public Institutions; Committee on 23 Crime Prevention and Public Safety; Committee on Economic Development; 24 Committee on Financial Institutions; Committee on General Laws; 25 Committee on Government Efficiency; Committee on Insurance Policy; 26 Committee on Judiciary; and Committee on Veterans] Committee on Budget; 27 Committee on Crime Prevention and Public Safety; Committee on Downsizing State Government; Committee on Economic Development; Committee on 28 29 Elections and Elected Officials; Committee on Financial Institutions; Committee on General Laws; Committee on Health and Mental Health Policy; 30 Committee on Higher Education; Committee on Local Government; Committee 31 32 on Utilities; Committee on Ways and Means; and Committee on Workforce 33 Development. 34

(d) Duties generally.

35 a. If a committee reports a bill, except an appropriations bill, 36 with a recommendation that it "Do Pass" or "Without Recommendation", the 37 bill shall stand automatically referred to its Committee on Rules. The 38 committee is hereby authorized to:

39 (i) Report the bill "Do Pass" to the House without a limitation on 40 time of debate on the bill or amendments.

41 (ii) Report the bill "Do Pass" to the House with a limitation on 42 the time of debate.

43 (iii) Send the bill back to the originating committee in the form 44 as originally referred by the Speaker. If a Committee on Rules sends 45 the bill back to the originating committee, that committee may amend the 46 bill and report the bill again without the need to reconsider the 47 initial vote by which the committee voted the bill "Do Pass".

48 b. If a bill is automatically referred to a Committee on Rules 49 with a recommendation that it "Do Pass - Federal Mandate", the committee 50 shall review the bill for the purpose of determining whether it should 51 have federal mandate status. The committee may decide, by a majority of 52 those present, whether to place the bill on the appropriate federal mandate calendar. If the committee declines to place the bill on the 53

appropriate federal mandate calendar, it may consider whether to report the bill to the House with a "Do Pass" recommendation without federal mandate status. The authority of the committee with respect to limiting debate shall apply to bills reported by it as "Do Pass - Federal Mandate".

6 c. If a Committee on Rules shall place a limitation on the time of 7 floor debate on a bill or on amendments, such time shall be divided 8 equally between and controlled by the floor handler of the bill and the 9 floor leader of the political party other than that of the floor handler or their respective designees. The floor handler shall have the right 10 11 to have the final one minute of designated time. If time has been 12 allocated and unused by either side and no member from that side is seeking recognition, the Speaker may declare additional time waived and 13 14 recognize the members of the other side to complete the use of their time. Nothing in this rule shall entitle any member to speak longer 15 16 than the House Rules otherwise allow.

d. In reviewing bills automatically referred to it from another committee, a Committee on Rules may, but is not required to, take such testimony as it deems appropriate to make its decisions. The committee shall not amend any bill that was not initially referred to a Committee on Rules.

e. If a committee has reported a bill "Do Pass" with committee amendments, a Committee on Rules shall take such action as it deems proper on the entire package of the bill with committee amendments as though the committee amendments were already incorporated into the bill.

f. If a Committee on Rules is the original committee to which a bill is referred, when the committee reports such bill as "Do Pass" or "Without Recommendation", such bill shall not be subject to the automatic referral referenced in Rule 24 [(25)](26)(d)a. above. However, in reporting such bill, the committee may take any action on such bill as though the bill were referred to it after a "Do Pass" or "Without Recommendation" report from another committee.

33 (26)The Committee on Transportation. The Committee on 34 Transportation may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to the Department of Transportation, all means of 35 36 transportation, including roads, highways, bridges, ferries, airports, 37 railroads, and other means of transportation. The committee may also consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to 38 39 motor vehicles and traffic regulations.

40 (27) The Committee on Utilities. The Committee on Utilities may 41 consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to 42 the development, use, and regulation of utilities, communications, and 43 technology and the development, use, and conservation of energy and 44 other energy-related concerns, environmental impact, pollution, and 45 public health and safety as it relates to the issue of energy.

46 (28) The Committee on Veterans. The Committee on Veterans may 47 consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it relating to 48 terrorism and security against terrorism, veterans affairs, the 49 promotion and strengthening of states' rights, and military and naval 50 affairs of the State.

51 (29) The Committee on Ways and Means. The Committee on Ways and 52 Means may consider and report upon bills and matters referred to it 53 relating to the taxes of the state, tax credits, revenue and public debt

of the state, and the interest thereon, and the administration of 1 2 taxation and revenue laws. The committee may also inquire into and suggest to the House such changes, if any, that should be made in 3 respect to existing sources of revenue and such new sources of revenue, 4 5 if any, that in the judgment of the committee should be considered by 6 the House. The committee may also inquire into and suggest to the House 7 such changes, if any, that should be made in respect to eliminating any existing sources of revenue, if any, that in the judgment of the 8 9 committee should be considered by the House.

10 (30) The Committee on Workforce Development. The Committee on 11 Workforce Development may consider and report upon bills and matters 12 referred to it relating to the regulation and administration of state 13 policies by the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations regarding 14 the attraction, training, retention, and safety of the workforce.
