AN ACT

To amend chapter 170, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to bleeding control training in schools.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 170, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be known as section 170.309, to read as follows:

- 170.309. 1. For school year 2020-21 and each school year thereafter, upon graduation from high school, students in public schools and charter schools shall have received sixty minutes of bleeding control training given any time in the four years before high school graduation.
- 2. Beginning in school year 2020-21, any public school or charter school serving students in grades nine through twelve shall provide enrolled students instruction and training in life-threatening bleeding control. The training shall include proper techniques in direct manual pressure, wound packing, and tourniquet application to stop life-threatening bleeding. The instructor of the training shall use instructional materials developed or endorsed by:
- 11 (1) The American College of Surgeons;
- 12 (2) The National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians;
- 13 (3) The department of health and senior services; or
- 14 (4) A nationally recognized program based on the most current evidence-based bleeding control care guidelines.
- 3. The training shall be included in the district's or charter school's existing health or physical education curriculum. The training shall include hands-on practice and skills

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testing to support cognitive learning. Students with disabilities may participate to the extent appropriate as determined by the provisions of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.

4. The instructor of the training shall meet instructor requirements as outlined by any entity or program described in subdivisions (1) to (4) of subsection 2 of this section. Schools may develop agreements with local hospitals, chapters of medical providers, or groups of medical volunteers who have the appropriate training to assist schools in providing students with the required hands-on practice.

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
