# FIRST REGULAR SESSION HOUSE BILL NO. 1069

## **100TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

INTRODUCED BY REPRESENTATIVE MACKEY.

### AN ACT

To repeal sections 160.261, 167.161, and 167.171, RSMo, and to enact in lieu thereof three new sections relating to suspension of students.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Sections 160.261, 167.161, and 167.171, RSMo, are repealed and three new sections enacted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 160.261, 167.161, and 167.171, to read as follows:

160.261. 1. The local board of education of each school district shall clearly establish a written policy of discipline, including the district's determination on the use of corporal 2 punishment and the procedures in which punishment will be applied. Each district's discipline 3 policy shall prohibit the suspension of students in kindergarten or in any grade not higher 4 than the third grade. A written copy of the district's discipline policy and corporal punishment 5 procedures, if applicable, shall be provided to the pupil and parent or legal guardian of every 6 7 pupil enrolled in the district at the beginning of each school year and also made available in the office of the superintendent of such district, during normal business hours, for public inspection. 8 9 All employees of the district shall annually receive instruction related to the specific contents of the policy of discipline and any interpretations necessary to implement the provisions of the 10 11 policy in the course of their duties, including but not limited to approved methods of dealing with 12 acts of school violence, disciplining students with disabilities and instruction in the necessity and 13 requirements for confidentiality. 14 2. The policy shall require school administrators to report acts of school violence to all 15 teachers at the attendance center and, in addition, to other school district employees with a need

16 to know. For the purposes of this chapter or chapter 167, "need to know" is defined as school

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personnel who are directly responsible for the student's education or who otherwise interact with 17 the student on a professional basis while acting within the scope of their assigned duties. As 18 19 used in this section, the phrase "act of school violence" or "violent behavior" means the exertion 20 of physical force by a student with the intent to do serious physical injury as defined in section 21 556.061 to another person while on school property, including a school bus in service on behalf 22 of the district, or while involved in school activities. The policy shall at a minimum require school administrators to report, as soon as reasonably practical, to the appropriate law 23 24 enforcement agency any of the following crimes, or any act which if committed by an adult 25 would be one of the following crimes: 26 (1) First degree murder under section 565.020; 27 (2) Second degree murder under section 565.021; 28 (3) Kidnapping under section 565.110 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or kidnapping in the first degree under section 565.110; 29 30 (4) First degree assault under section 565.050; 31 (5) Rape in the first degree under section 566.030; 32 (6) Sodomy in the first degree under section 566.060; 33 (7) Burglary in the first degree under section 569.160; 34 (8) Burglary in the second degree under section 569.170; 35 (9) Robbery in the first degree under section 569.020 as it existed prior to January 1, 36 2017, or robbery in the first degree under section 570.023; 37 (10) Distribution of drugs under section 195.211 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, 38 or manufacture of a controlled substance under section 579.055; 39 (11) Distribution of drugs to a minor under section 195.212 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or delivery of a controlled substance under section 579.020; 40 41 (12) Arson in the first degree under section 569.040; 42 (13) Voluntary manslaughter under section 565.023; 43 (14) Involuntary manslaughter under section 565.024 as it existed prior to January 1, 44 2017, involuntary manslaughter in the first degree under section 565.024, or involuntary 45 manslaughter in the second degree under section 565.027; 46 (15) Second degree assault under section 565.060 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, 47 or second degree assault under section 565.052; 48 (16) Rape in the second degree under section 566.031; 49 (17) Felonious restraint under section 565.120 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or 50 kidnapping in the second degree under section 565.120; 51 (18) Property damage in the first degree under section 569.100; 52 (19) The possession of a weapon under chapter 571;

(20) Child molestation in the first degree pursuant to section 566.067 as it existed prior
to January 1, 2017, or child molestation in the first, second, or third degree pursuant to section
566.067, 566.068, or 566.069;

56 (21) Sodomy in the second degree pursuant to section 566.061;

57 (22) Sexual misconduct involving a child pursuant to section 566.083;

58 (23) Sexual abuse in the first degree pursuant to section 566.100;

59 (24) Harassment under section 565.090 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or 60 harassment in the first degree under section 565.090; or

(25) Stalking under section 565.225 as it existed prior to January 1, 2017, or stalking in
the first degree under section 565.225;

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64 committed on school property, including but not limited to actions on any school bus in service on behalf of the district or while involved in school activities. The policy shall require that any 65 66 portion of a student's individualized education program that is related to demonstrated or potentially violent behavior shall be provided to any teacher and other school district employees 67 68 who are directly responsible for the student's education or who otherwise interact with the student on an educational basis while acting within the scope of their assigned duties. The policy 69 70 shall also contain the consequences of failure to obey standards of conduct set by the local board of education, and the importance of the standards to the maintenance of an atmosphere where 71 72 orderly learning is possible and encouraged. 73 3. The policy shall provide that any student who is on suspension for any of the offenses

13. The policy shall provide that any student who is on suspension for any of the orienses 14 listed in subsection 2 of this section or any act of violence or drug-related activity defined by 15 school district policy as a serious violation of school discipline pursuant to subsection 9 of this 16 section shall have as a condition of his or her suspension the requirement that such student is not 17 allowed, while on such suspension, to be within one thousand feet of any school property in the 17 school district where such student attended school or any activity of that district, regardless of 17 whether or not the activity takes place on district property unless:

(1) Such student is under the direct supervision of the student's parent, legal guardian,
or custodian and the superintendent or the superintendent's designee has authorized the student
to be on school property;

(2) Such student is under the direct supervision of another adult designated by the
student's parent, legal guardian, or custodian, in advance, in writing, to the principal of the school
which suspended the student and the superintendent or the superintendent's designee has
authorized the student to be on school property;

87 (3) Such student is enrolled in and attending an alternative school that is located within
88 one thousand feet of a public school in the school district where such student attended school;
89 or

90 (4) Such student resides within one thousand feet of any public school in the school
91 district where such student attended school in which case such student may be on the property
92 of his or her residence without direct adult supervision.

93 4. Any student who violates the condition of suspension required pursuant to subsection 94 3 of this section may be subject to expulsion or further suspension pursuant to the provisions of 95 sections 167.161, 167.164, and 167.171. In making this determination consideration shall be given to whether the student poses a threat to the safety of any child or school employee and 96 97 whether such student's unsupervised presence within one thousand feet of the school is disruptive 98 to the educational process or undermines the effectiveness of the school's disciplinary policy. 99 Removal of any pupil who is a student with a disability is subject to state and federal procedural 100 rights. This section shall not limit a school district's ability to:

101 (1) Prohibit all students who are suspended from being on school property or attending102 an activity while on suspension;

103 (2) Discipline students for off-campus conduct that negatively affects the educational104 environment to the extent allowed by law.

5. The policy shall provide for a suspension for a period of not less than one year, or expulsion, for a student who is determined to have brought a weapon to school, including but not limited to the school playground or the school parking lot, brought a weapon on a school bus or brought a weapon to a school activity whether on or off of the school property in violation of district policy, except that:

(1) The superintendent or, in a school district with no high school, the principal of the
school which such child attends may modify such suspension on a case-by-case basis; [and]
(2) This section shall not prevent the school district from providing educational services

(2) This section shall not prevent the school district from providing educational services
in an alternative setting to a student suspended under the provisions of this section; and

(3) The policy shall prohibit the suspension of students in kindergarten or in anygrade not higher than the third grade.

6. For the purpose of this section, the term "weapon" shall mean a firearm as defined under 18 U.S.C. Section 921 and the following items, as defined in section 571.010: a blackjack, a concealable firearm, an explosive weapon, a firearm, a firearm silencer, a gas gun, a knife, knuckles, a machine gun, a projectile weapon, a rifle, a shotgun, a spring gun or a switchblade knife; except that this section shall not be construed to prohibit a school board from adopting a policy to allow a Civil War reenactor to carry a Civil War era weapon on school property for educational purposes so long as the firearm is unloaded. The local board of education shall

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define weapon in the discipline policy. Such definition shall include the weapons defined in thissubsection but may also include other weapons.

7. All school district personnel responsible for the care and supervision of students are
authorized to hold every pupil strictly accountable for any disorderly conduct in school or on any
property of the school, on any school bus going to or returning from school, during
school-sponsored activities, or during intermission or recess periods.

129 8. Teachers and other authorized district personnel in public schools responsible for the 130 care, supervision, and discipline of schoolchildren, including volunteers selected with reasonable 131 care by the school district, shall not be civilly liable when acting in conformity with the 132 established policies developed by each board, including but not limited to policies of student 133 discipline or when reporting to his or her supervisor or other person as mandated by state law 134 acts of school violence or threatened acts of school violence, within the course and scope of the 135 duties of the teacher, authorized district personnel or volunteer, when such individual is acting 136 in conformity with the established policies developed by the board. Nothing in this section shall 137 be construed to create a new cause of action against such school district, or to relieve the school 138 district from liability for the negligent acts of such persons.

139 9. Each school board shall define in its discipline policy acts of violence and any other 140 acts that constitute a serious violation of that policy. "Acts of violence" as defined by school 141 boards shall include but not be limited to exertion of physical force by a student with the intent 142 to do serious bodily harm to another person while on school property, including a school bus in 143 service on behalf of the district, or while involved in school activities. School districts shall for 144 each student enrolled in the school district compile and maintain records of any serious violation 145 of the district's discipline policy. Such records shall be made available to teachers and other 146 school district employees with a need to know while acting within the scope of their assigned 147 duties, and shall be provided as required in section 167.020 to any school district in which the 148 student subsequently attempts to enroll.

149 10. Spanking, when administered by certificated personnel and in the presence of a 150 witness who is an employee of the school district, or the use of reasonable force to protect 151 persons or property, when administered by personnel of a school district in a reasonable manner 152 in accordance with the local board of education's written policy of discipline, is not abuse within 153 the meaning of chapter 210. The provisions of sections 210.110 to 210.165 notwithstanding, the 154 children's division shall not have jurisdiction over or investigate any report of alleged child abuse 155 arising out of or related to the use of reasonable force to protect persons or property when 156 administered by personnel of a school district or any spanking administered in a reasonable 157 manner by any certificated school personnel in the presence of a witness who is an employee of 158 the school district pursuant to a written policy of discipline established by the board of education

of the school district, as long as no allegation of sexual misconduct arises from the spanking oruse of force.

161 11. If a student reports alleged sexual misconduct on the part of a teacher or other school 162 employee to a person employed in a school facility who is required to report such misconduct 163 to the children's division under section 210.115, such person and the superintendent of the school 164 district shall report the allegation to the children's division as set forth in section 210.115. 165 Reports made to the children's division under this subsection shall be investigated by the division 166 in accordance with the provisions of sections 210.145 to 210.153 and shall not be investigated 167 by the school district under subsections 12 to 20 of this section for purposes of determining whether the allegations should or should not be substantiated. The district may investigate the 168 169 allegations for the purpose of making any decision regarding the employment of the accused 170 employee.

171 12. Upon receipt of any reports of child abuse by the children's division other than 172 reports provided under subsection 11 of this section, pursuant to sections 210.110 to 210.165 173 which allegedly involve personnel of a school district, the children's division shall notify the 174 superintendent of schools of the district or, if the person named in the alleged incident is the 175 superintendent of schools, the president of the school board of the school district where the 176 alleged incident occurred.

177 13. If, after an initial investigation, the superintendent of schools or the president of the 178 school board finds that the report involves an alleged incident of child abuse other than the 179 administration of a spanking by certificated school personnel or the use of reasonable force to 180 protect persons or property when administered by school personnel pursuant to a written policy 181 of discipline or that the report was made for the sole purpose of harassing a public school 182 employee, the superintendent of schools or the president of the school board shall immediately 183 refer the matter back to the children's division and take no further action. In all matters referred 184 back to the children's division, the division shall treat the report in the same manner as other 185 reports of alleged child abuse received by the division.

14. If the report pertains to an alleged incident which arose out of or is related to a spanking administered by certificated personnel or the use of reasonable force to protect persons or property when administered by personnel of a school district pursuant to a written policy of discipline or a report made for the sole purpose of harassing a public school employee, a notification of the reported child abuse shall be sent by the superintendent of schools or the president of the school board to the law enforcement in the county in which the alleged incident occurred.

193 15. The report shall be jointly investigated by the law enforcement officer and the 194 superintendent of schools or, if the subject of the report is the superintendent of schools, by a law 195 enforcement officer and the president of the school board or such president's designee.

196 16. The investigation shall begin no later than forty-eight hours after notification from 197 the children's division is received, and shall consist of, but need not be limited to, interviewing 198 and recording statements of the child and the child's parents or guardian within two working days 199 after the start of the investigation, of the school district personnel allegedly involved in the 200 report, and of any witnesses to the alleged incident.

201 17. The law enforcement officer and the investigating school district personnel shall 202 issue separate reports of their findings and recommendations after the conclusion of the 203 investigation to the school board of the school district within seven days after receiving notice 204 from the children's division.

18. The reports shall contain a statement of conclusion as to whether the report of allegedchild abuse is substantiated or is unsubstantiated.

19. The school board shall consider the separate reports referred to in subsection 17 of this section and shall issue its findings and conclusions and the action to be taken, if any, within seven days after receiving the last of the two reports. The findings and conclusions shall be made in substantially the following form:

(1) The report of the alleged child abuse is unsubstantiated. The law enforcement officer
and the investigating school board personnel agree that there was not a preponderance of
evidence to substantiate that abuse occurred;

(2) The report of the alleged child abuse is substantiated. The law enforcement officer
and the investigating school district personnel agree that the preponderance of evidence is
sufficient to support a finding that the alleged incident of child abuse did occur;

(3) The issue involved in the alleged incident of child abuse is unresolved. The law
enforcement officer and the investigating school personnel are unable to agree on their findings
and conclusions on the alleged incident.

220 20. The findings and conclusions of the school board under subsection 19 of this section 221 shall be sent to the children's division. If the findings and conclusions of the school board are 222 that the report of the alleged child abuse is unsubstantiated, the investigation shall be terminated, 223 the case closed, and no record shall be entered in the children's division central registry. If the 224 findings and conclusions of the school board are that the report of the alleged child abuse is 225 substantiated, the children's division shall report the incident to the prosecuting attorney of the 226 appropriate county along with the findings and conclusions of the school district and shall 227 include the information in the division's central registry. If the findings and conclusions of the 228 school board are that the issue involved in the alleged incident of child abuse is unresolved, the

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229 children's division shall report the incident to the prosecuting attorney of the appropriate county

along with the findings and conclusions of the school board, however, the incident and the names
of the parties allegedly involved shall not be entered into the central registry of the children's
division unless and until the alleged child abuse is substantiated by a court of competent
jurisdiction.

234 21. Any superintendent of schools, president of a school board or such person's designee 235 or law enforcement officer who knowingly falsifies any report of any matter pursuant to this 236 section or who knowingly withholds any information relative to any investigation or report 237 pursuant to this section is guilty of a class A misdemeanor.

238 22. In order to ensure the safety of all students, should a student be expelled for bringing 239 a weapon to school, violent behavior, or for an act of school violence, that student shall not, for 240 the purposes of the accreditation process of the Missouri school improvement plan, be 241 considered a dropout or be included in the calculation of that district's educational persistence 242 ratio.

167.161. 1. The school board of any district, after notice to parents or others having 2 custodial care and a hearing upon charges preferred, may suspend or expel a pupil for conduct 3 which is prejudicial to good order and discipline in the schools or which tends to impair the 4 morale or good conduct of the pupils. In addition to the authority granted in section 167.171, a school board may authorize, by general rule, the immediate removal of a pupil upon a finding 5 6 by the principal, superintendent, or school board that the pupil poses a threat of harm to such pupil or others, as evidenced by the prior conduct of such pupil. Prior disciplinary actions shall 7 not be used as the sole basis for removal, suspension or expulsion of a pupil. Removal of any 8 pupil who is a student with a disability is subject to state and federal procedural rights. At the 9 hearing upon any such removal, suspension or expulsion, the board shall consider the evidence 10 and statements that the parties present and may consider records of past disciplinary actions, 11 12 criminal court records or juvenile court records consistent with other provisions of the law, or 13 the actions of the pupil which would constitute a criminal offense. The board may provide by 14 general rule not inconsistent with this section for the procedure and conduct of such hearings. 15 After meeting with the superintendent or his designee to discuss the expulsion, the parent, 16 custodian or the student, if at least eighteen years of age, may, in writing, waive any right to a hearing before the board of education. 17

2. The school board of any district, after notice to parents or others having custodial care and a hearing upon the matter, may suspend a pupil upon a finding that the pupil has been charged, convicted or pled guilty in a court of general jurisdiction for the commission of a felony criminal violation of state or federal law. At a hearing required by this subsection, the board shall consider statements that the parties present. The board may provide for the procedure andconduct of such hearings.

3. The school board shall make a good-faith effort to have the parents or others having custodial care present at any such hearing. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, student discipline hearings or proceedings related to the rights of students to attend school or to receive academic credit shall not be required to comply with the requirements applicable to contested case hearings as provided in chapter 536, provided that appropriate due process procedures shall be observed which shall include the right for a trial de novo by the circuit court.

4. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections 1 and 2 of this section, the school
board of a district shall not suspend any student in kindergarten or in any grade not higher
than the third grade.

167.171. 1. The school board in any district, by general rule and for the causes provided 2 in section 167.161, may authorize the summary suspension of pupils, other than pupils in kindergarten or in any grade not higher than the third grade, by principals of schools for 3 4 a period not to exceed ten school days and by the superintendent of schools for a period not to exceed one hundred and eighty school days. In case of a suspension by the superintendent for 5 more than ten school days, the pupil, the pupil's parents or others having such pupil's custodial 6 7 care may appeal the decision of the superintendent to the board or to a committee of board members appointed by the president of the board which shall have full authority to act in lieu of 8 the board. Any suspension by a principal shall be immediately reported to the superintendent 9 who may revoke the suspension at any time. In event of an appeal to the board, the 10 superintendent shall promptly transmit to it a full report in writing of the facts relating to the 11 12 suspension, the action taken by the superintendent and the reasons therefor and the board, upon 13 request, shall grant a hearing to the appealing party to be conducted as provided in section 14 167.161.

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2. No pupil shall be suspended unless:

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(1) The pupil shall be given oral or written notice of the charges against such pupil;

17 (2) If the pupil denies the charges, such pupil shall be given an oral or written 18 explanation of the facts which form the basis of the proposed suspension;

19 (3) The pupil shall be given an opportunity to present such pupil's version of the 20 incident; and

(4) In the event of a suspension for more than ten school days, where the pupil gives notice that such pupil wishes to appeal the suspension to the board, the suspension shall be stayed until the board renders its decision, unless in the judgment of the superintendent of schools, or of the district superintendent, the pupil's presence poses a continuing danger to

persons or property or an ongoing threat of disrupting the academic process, in which case the pupil may be immediately removed from school, and the notice and hearing shall follow as soon as practicable.

28 3. No school board shall readmit or enroll a pupil properly suspended for more than ten 29 consecutive school days for an act of school violence as defined in subsection 2 of section 30 160.261 regardless of whether or not such act was committed at a public school or at a private 31 school in this state, provided that such act shall have resulted in the suspension or expulsion of 32 such pupil in the case of a private school, or otherwise permit such pupil to attend school without 33 first holding a conference to review the conduct that resulted in the expulsion or suspension and 34 any remedial actions needed to prevent any future occurrences of such or related conduct. The 35 conference shall include the appropriate school officials including any teacher employed in that school or district directly involved with the conduct that resulted in the suspension or expulsion, 36 the pupil, the parent or guardian of the pupil or any agency having legal jurisdiction, care, 37 custody or control of the pupil. The school board shall notify in writing the parents or guardians 38 and all other parties of the time, place, and agenda of any such conference. Failure of any party 39 40 to attend this conference shall not preclude holding the conference. Notwithstanding any 41 provision of this subsection to the contrary, no pupil shall be readmitted or enrolled to a regular 42 program of instruction if:

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(1) Such pupil has been convicted of; or

44 (2) An indictment or information has been filed alleging that the pupil has committed
45 one of the acts enumerated in subdivision (4) of this subsection to which there has been no final
46 judgment; or

47 (3) A petition has been filed pursuant to section 211.091 alleging that the pupil has
48 committed one of the acts enumerated in subdivision (4) of this subsection to which there has
49 been no final judgment; or

50 (4) The pupil has been adjudicated to have committed an act which if committed by an 51 adult would be one of the following:

52 (a) First degree murder under section 565.020;

53 (b) Second degree murder under section 565.021;

54 (c) First degree assault under section 565.050;

55 (d) Forcible rape under section 566.030 as it existed prior to August 28, 2013, or rape 56 in the first degree under section 566.030;

57 (e) Forcible sodomy under section 566.060 as it existed prior to August 28, 2013, or 58 sodomy in the first degree under section 566.060;

59 (f) Statutory rape under section 566.032;

60 (g) Statutory sodomy under section 566.062;

(h) Robbery in the first degree under section 569.020 as it existed prior to January 1,
2017, or robbery in the first degree under section 570.023;

(i) Distribution of drugs to a minor under section 195.212 as it existed prior to January
1, 2017, or delivery of a controlled substance under section 579.020;

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(j) Arson in the first degree under section 569.040;

66 (k) Kidnapping or kidnapping in the first degree, when classified as a class A felony

67 under section 565.110.

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Nothing in this subsection shall prohibit the readmittance or enrollment of any pupil if a petition has been dismissed, or when a pupil has been acquitted or adjudicated not to have committed any of the above acts. This subsection shall not apply to a student with a disability, as identified under state eligibility criteria, who is convicted or adjudicated guilty as a result of an action related to the student's disability. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to prohibit a school district which provides an alternative education program from enrolling a pupil in an alternative education program if the district determines such enrollment is appropriate.

76 4. If a pupil is attempting to enroll in a school district during a suspension or expulsion 77 from another in-state or out-of-state school district including a private, charter or parochial 78 school or school district, a conference with the superintendent or the superintendent's designee 79 may be held at the request of the parent, court-appointed legal guardian, someone acting as a 80 parent as defined by rule in the case of a special education student, or the pupil to consider if the 81 conduct of the pupil would have resulted in a suspension or expulsion in the district in which the pupil is enrolling. Upon a determination by the superintendent or the superintendent's designee 82 that such conduct would have resulted in a suspension or expulsion in the district in which the 83 pupil is enrolling or attempting to enroll, the school district may make such suspension or 84 85 expulsion from another school or district effective in the district in which the pupil is enrolling 86 or attempting to enroll. Upon a determination by the superintendent or the superintendent's designee that such conduct would not have resulted in a suspension or expulsion in the district 87 in which the student is enrolling or attempting to enroll, the school district shall not make such 88 89 suspension or expulsion effective in its district in which the student is enrolling or attempting to enroll. 90

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
