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FISCAL ANALYSIS

ASSUMPTION

§306.220 - Personal flotation devices for children

For the purpose of this proposed legislation, officials from the **Office of State Public Defender (SPD)** state they cannot assume that existing staff will provide effective representation for any new cases arising where indigent persons are charged with the expanded crimes of failure to cause a child under 12 to wear a personal flotation device, a class C misdemeanor. The Missouri State Public Defender System is currently providing legal representation in caseloads in excess of recognized standards.

In FY 2019, SPD's Trial Division did not open any cases under charge code 306.220.

While the number of new cases (or cases with increased penalties) may be too few or uncertain to request additional funding for this specific bill, the SPD will continue to request sufficient appropriations to provide effective representation in all cases where the right to counsel attaches.

Oversight notes over the last three fiscal years, the SPD has lapsed a total of \$153 of General Revenue appropriations (\$2 out of \$28.0 million in FY 2017; \$150 out of \$42.5 million in FY 2018; and \$1 out of \$46.0 million in FY 2019). Therefore, Oversight assumes the SPD is at maximum capacity, and the increase in workload resulting from this bill cannot be absorbed with SPD's current resources.

Adding one additional Assistant Public Defender 1 (APD) with a starting salary of \$47,000, will cost approximately \$74,500 per year in personal service and fringe benefit costs. One additional APD II (\$52,000 per year; eligible for consideration after 1 year of successful performance at APD I) will cost the state approximately \$81,000 per year in personal service and fringe benefit costs. When expense and equipment costs such as travel, training, furniture, equipment and supplies are included, Oversight assumes the cost for a new APD could approach \$100,000 per year.

Oversight assumes the SPD cannot absorb the additional caseload that may result from this proposal within their existing resources and, therefore, will reflect a potential additional cost of (Less than \$100,000) per year to the General Revenue Fund.

Officials from the **Missouri Office of Prosecution Services (MOPS)** assume the proposal will have no measurable fiscal impact on MOPS.

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ASSUMPTION (continued)

Oversight notes the **Department of Public Safety - Missouri State Highway Patrol** and **Office of State Courts Administrator** have each stated the proposal would not have a direct fiscal impact on their respective organizations.

Oversight contacted the Missouri State Highway Patrol (MHP) and Office of State Courts Administrator (OSCA) to determine the number of tickets issued in the last two years and fines and costs for violations. The MHP states 52 tickets and 46 warnings were issued in 2018, and 28 tickets and 34 warnings were issued in 2019 under charge code 306.220. OSCA indicates the fine for this violation is \$20.50; additional individual county fees range from \$2 to \$24 and/or additional court costs of \$44.50. OSCA states the fine revenue for the ticket goes to local school funds and courts costs go to various state and local funds. Oversight assumes the amount of fine revenue received by schools will increase because the age which children required to wear a personal flotation devices increases from age 7 to 12. However, it is hard to estimate the impact based on the existing age limit. Therefore, the impact to local governments will be presented as less than \$100,000.

Of the eight states that border Missouri, seven states require children 12 and younger and one state requires children 11 and younger, to wear an approved life jacket while onboard or being towed behind a vessel.

Oversight only reflects the responses that we have received from state agencies and political subdivisions; however, other counties were requested to respond to this proposed legislation but did not. A general listing of political subdivisions included in our database is available upon request.

FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

No direct fiscal impact to small businesses would be expected as a result of this proposal.

FISCAL DESCRIPTION

Currently, children under the age of seven years old are required to wear a personal flotation device when on board any watercraft on the waters of Missouri. This act names the provision "Hannah's Law" and raises the age until which a child is required to wear a personal flotation device to twelve. This act also requires a child who is wading or swimming in navigable public waters more than three feet in depth to wear a personal flotation device. This act exempts children from the personal flotation device requirement if supervised by a lifeguard. (§306.220)

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
