AN ACT

To amend chapter 568, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to the offense of unlawful harboring of a minor, with a penalty provision.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 568, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be 2 known as section 568.150, to read as follows:

568.150. 1. (1) A person commits the offense of unlawful harboring of a minor if the person provides shelter to a minor without the consent of a parent of the minor and after the person knows that the minor is away from the home of the parent, without the parent's permission, and if the person intentionally:

5 (a) Fails to release the minor to a law enforcement officer after being requested to 6 do so by the officer;

7 (b) Fails to disclose the location of the minor to a law enforcement officer after 8 being requested to do so by the officer if the person knows the location of the minor and 9 had either taken the minor to that location or had assisted the minor in reaching that 10 location;

(c) Obstructs a law enforcement officer from taking the minor into custody; or

12 (d) Assists the minor in avoiding or attempting to avoid the custody of the law 13 enforcement officer.

(2) It is a defense to a prosecution under this section that the defendant had custody
 of the minor under a court order.

2. The offense of unlawful harboring of a minor is a class A misdemeanor.
