AN ACT

To repeal sections 8.010, 8.170, 8.172, 8.177, 8.178, 32.056, 84.344, 94.900, 94.902, 160.665, 168.133, 190.092, 190.094, 190.100, 190.105, 190.142, 190.143, 190.196, 190.243, 217.735, 221.111, 270.400, 306.127, 307.179, 311.060, 311.293, 311.332, 311.660, 313.220, 320.091, 321.552, 544.170, 545.140, 556.061, 557.021, 562.014, 565.002, 571.015, 571.070, 575.150, 575.180, 575.270, 578.018, 578.030, 578.421, 578.423, 578.425, 579.040, 579.065, 579.068, 579.076, 589.400, 589.401, 589.404, 589.414, 590.207, 610.021, and 650.005, RSMo, and section 211.071 as enacted by senate bill no. 793 merged with senate bill no. 800, ninety-ninth general assembly, second regular session, and section 211.071 as enacted by house bill no. 215 merged with senate bill no. 36, ninety-seventh general assembly, first regular session, and to enact in lieu thereof ninety-two new sections relating to public safety, with penalty provisions, an emergency clause for a certain section, a delayed effective date for a certain section, and a contingent effective date for certain sections.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

8.010. 1. The governor, attorney general and lieutenant governor constitute the board of public buildings. The governor is chairman and the lieutenant governor, secretary. The speaker of the house of representatives and the president pro tempore of the senate shall serve as ex officio members of the board but shall not have the power to vote. The board shall constitute a body corporate and politic. Except as provided under [section] sections 8.007 and 8.111, the board has general supervision and charge of the public property of the state at the seat of government, including the building located at 105 West Capitol Avenue in Jefferson City, and other duties imposed on it by law.

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2. The commissioner of administration shall provide staff support to the board.

8.111. 1. There is hereby established the "Capitol Police Board" which shall be 2 composed of five members, as follows:

- 3 (1) The governor, or his or her designee;
 - (2) The speaker of the house of representatives, or his or her designee;
 - (3) The president pro tempore of the senate, or his or her designee;
- 5 6

- (5) The chair of the state capitol commission.
- 8
- 9 The lieutenant governor, the chief clerk of the house of representatives, and the secretary

(4) The chief justice of the Missouri supreme court, or his or her designee; and

- 10 of the senate, or their designees, shall serve as ex officio members of the board but shall not
- 11 have the power to vote. At the first meeting of the board and at yearly intervals thereafter,
- 12 the members shall select from among themselves a chair, a vice chair, and a secretary.

13 2. The board shall be assigned to the house of representatives with supervision by 14 the house of representatives only for budgeting and reporting. Such supervision shall not 15 extend to matters relating to policies, regulatory functions, or appeals from activities of the 16 board, and no member or employee of the house of representatives shall participate in or 17 interfere with the activities of the board in any manner not specifically provided by law, 18 or at the direction of the board, and no member or employee of the house of 19 representatives shall interfere in any manner with any budget request of or with respect 20 to the withholding of any moneys appropriated to the board by the general assembly.

3. The board shall provide for public safety at the seat of government and for the
 safety and security of elected officials, government employees, and their guests as needed
 outside the seat of government. The board shall hire police officers as described in section
 8.177.

4. The board shall hire a chief of police who shall be certified under chapter 590 and serve subject to the supervision of and at the pleasure of the board. The chief of police shall be responsible for the administrative operations of the capitol police and perform such other duties as may be delegated or assigned to the chief by law or by the board. The chief of police shall employ staff and retain such contract services as he or she deems necessary, within the limits authorized by appropriations of the general assembly.

31 5. The board may promulgate all necessary rules and regulations for the 32 administration of sections 8.111 to 8.178. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is 33 defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall 34 become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 35 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable, and 36 if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, 37 to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held 38 unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted 39 after August 28, 2020, shall be invalid and void.

8.170. The [director] Missouri capitol police shall prosecute, in the name of the state,
for all trespasses and injuries of every kind done to the public buildings and other property, and
shall attend to the suits relative to the same. The attorney general shall give counsel, or
prosecute suits, when required by the [director] chief.

8.172. The [commissioner of administration] capitol police board shall make rules and
regulations for the regulation of traffic and parking at all parking space upon the capitol grounds
and upon the grounds of other state buildings located within the capital city. The regulations
shall be enforced by the Missouri capitol police.

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8.177. 1. The [director of the department of public safety] capitol police board shall employ Missouri capitol police officers for public safety at the seat of state government. Each 2 Missouri capitol police officer, upon appointment, shall take and subscribe an oath of office to 3 4 support the constitution and laws of the United States and the state of Missouri and shall receive a certificate of appointment, a copy of which shall be filed with the secretary of state, granting 5 such police officers all the same powers of arrest held by other police officers to maintain order 6 and preserve the peace in all state-owned or leased buildings, and the grounds thereof, at the seat 7 of government and such buildings and grounds within the county which contains the seat of 8 9 government.

10 2. The [director of the department of public safety] capitol police board shall appoint a sufficient number of Missouri capitol police officers, with available appropriations, as 11 12 appropriated specifically for the purpose designated in this subsection, so that the capitol grounds may be patrolled at all times, and that traffic and parking upon the capitol grounds and the 13 14 grounds of other state buildings owned or leased within the capital city and the county which contains the seat of government may be properly controlled. Missouri capitol police officers may 15 16 make arrests for the violation of parking and traffic regulations promulgated by the loffice of 17 administration] capitol police board.

3. Missouri capitol police officers shall be authorized to arrest a person anywhere in the county that contains the state seat of government, when there is probable cause to believe the person committed a crime within capitol police jurisdiction or when a person commits a crime in the presence of an on-duty capitol police officer.

8.178. Any person who violates sections 8.172 to 8.174, or section 8.177, or any of the
traffic or parking regulations of the [commissioner] capitol police board shall be punished as
follows:

4 (1) Fines for traffic violations shall not, except as provided by section 301.143, exceed 5 five dollars for overparking, fifteen dollars for double parking and fifty dollars for speeding[,] 6 ; and

7 (2) The circuit court of Cole County has authority to enforce [this law] the traffic or 8 parking regulations of the capitol police board.

32.056. Except for uses permitted under 18 U.S.C. Section 2721(b)(1), the department of revenue shall not release the home address of or any information that identifies any vehicle owned or leased by any person who is a county, state or federal parole officer[$_{7}$]; a federal pretrial officer[$_{7}$]; a peace officer pursuant to section 590.010[$_{7}$]; a person employed by the **Missouri department of corrections; any jailer or corrections officer of the state or any** political subdivision of the state; a person vested by Article V, Section 1 of the Missouri Constitution with the judicial power of the state[$_{7}$]; a member of the federal judiciary[$_{7}$]; or a

member of such person's immediate family contained in the department's motor vehicle or driver 8 9 registration records, based on a specific request for such information from any person. Any such 10 person may notify the department of his or her status and the department shall protect the 11 confidentiality of the home address and vehicle records on such a person and his or her 12 immediate family as required by this section. This section shall not prohibit the department from 13 releasing information on a motor registration list pursuant to section 32.055 or from releasing 14 information on any officer who holds a class A, B or C commercial driver's license pursuant to 15 the Motor Carrier Safety Improvement Act of 1999, as amended, 49 U.S.C. 31309.

40.003. As of December 31, 2020, the powers, duties, and functions vested in the 2 office of the state judge advocate are transferred by type I transfer to the department of 3 defense established under chapter 45.

41.005. As of December 31, 2020, the powers, duties, and functions vested in the office of adjutant general and the state militia are transferred by type I transfer to the department of defense established under chapter 45; provided, however, nothing herein shall be construed to interfere with the powers and duties of the governor as provided in Article IV, Section 6 of the Constitution of Missouri or this chapter.

45.010. There is hereby created a "Department of Defense" to be headed by the adjutant general appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the senate. All of the general provisions, definitions, and powers enumerated in section 1 of the Omnibus State Reorganization Act of 1974 shall apply to this department and its divisions, agencies, and personnel.

45.020. As of December 31, 2020, the powers, duties, and functions vested in the office of adjutant general and the state militia are transferred by type I transfer to the department of defense; provided, however, nothing herein shall be construed to interfere with the powers and duties of the governor as provided in Article IV, Section 6 of the Constitution of Missouri or chapter 41.

45.030. As of December 31, 2020, the powers, duties, and functions vested in the 2 office of the state judge advocate are transferred by type I transfer to the department of 3 defense.

67.142. 1. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to limit in any manner the authority of any village; town; city, including home rule city; or county to prohibit dogs from running at large or to further control or regulate dogs within its boundaries, provided that no such ordinance, order, policy, or regulation is specific to breed.

5 2. The general assembly hereby occupies and preempts the entire field of legislation 6 regarding in any way the control or regulation of specific breeds of dogs to the complete 7 exclusion of any order, ordinance, policy, or regulation by any village; town; city, including 8 any home rule city; or county in this state. Any existing or future order, ordinance, policy,
9 or regulation in this field shall be null and void.

3. Nothing in this chapter shall infringe the ability of any village; town; city, including any home rule city; or county to enact and enforce a vicious dog order, ordinance, policy, or regulation if the order, ordinance, policy, or regulation is not specific to breed.

71.201. 1. For purposes of this section, the term "local governmental unit" shall
mean any city, village, town, county, township, or the board of police established by section
84.020, or the board of police commissioners established by section 84.350.

4 2. (1) No local governmental unit shall require, as a condition of employment, that 5 any currently employed or prospective law enforcement officer reside within any 6 jurisdictional limit.

7 (2) If a local governmental unit has a residency rule or requirement for law 8 enforcement officers that is in effect on or before August 28, 2020, the residency rule or 9 requirement shall not apply and shall not be enforced.

3. A local governmental unit may impose a residency rule or requirement on law
 enforcement officers, but the rule or requirement shall be no more restrictive than
 requiring such personnel to reside within a one-hour response time.

4. The provisions of this section shall not apply to the Missouri state highwaypatrol.

84.344. 1. Notwithstanding any provisions of this chapter to the contrary, any city not within a county may establish a municipal police force on or after July 1, 2013, according to the procedures and requirements of this section. The purpose of these procedures and requirements is to provide for an orderly and appropriate transition in the governance of the police force and provide for an equitable employment transition for commissioned and civilian personnel.

6 2. Upon the establishment of a municipal police force by a city under sections 84.343 7 to 84.346, the board of police commissioners shall convey, assign, and otherwise transfer to the 8 city title and ownership of all indebtedness and assets, including, but not limited to, all funds and 9 real and personal property held in the name of or controlled by the board of police 10 commissioners created under sections 84.010 to 84.340. The board of police commissioners 11 shall execute all documents reasonably required to accomplish such transfer of ownership and 12 obligations.

3. If the city establishes a municipal police force and completes the transfer described
in subsection 2 of this section, the city shall provide the necessary funds for the maintenance of
the municipal police force.

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4. Before a city not within a county may establish a municipal police force under this section, the city shall adopt an ordinance accepting responsibility, ownership, and liability as successor-in-interest for contractual obligations, indebtedness, and other lawful obligations of the board of police commissioners subject to the provisions of subsection 2 of section 84.345.

20 5. A city not within a county that establishes a municipal police force shall initially employ, without a reduction in rank, salary, or benefits, all commissioned and civilian personnel 21 22 of the board of police commissioners created under sections 84.010 to 84.340 that were 23 employed by the board immediately prior to the date the municipal police force was established. 24 Such commissioned personnel who previously were employed by the board may only be 25 involuntarily terminated by the city not within a county for cause. The city shall also recognize 26 all accrued years of service that such commissioned and civilian personnel had with the board 27 of police commissioners. Such personnel shall be entitled to the same holidays, vacation, and 28 sick leave they were entitled to as employees of the board of police commissioners.

6. Commissioned and civilian personnel who [were previously employed by the board] are employed by a municipal police force established under this section shall [continue to] not be subject, throughout their employment for the city not within a county, to a residency [rule no more restrictive than a] requirement of retaining a primary residence in a city not within a county [for a total of seven years and of then allowing them to maintain a primary residence outside the city not within a county] so long as the primary residence is located within a one-hour response time.

36 7. The commissioned and civilian personnel who retire from service with the board of 37 police commissioners before the establishment of a municipal police force under subsection 1 38 of this section shall continue to be entitled to the same pension benefits provided under chapter 39 86 and the same benefits set forth in subsection 5 of this section.

40 8. If the city not within a county elects to establish a municipal police force under this 41 section, the city shall establish a separate division for the operation of its municipal police force. 42 The civil service commission of the city may adopt rules and regulations appropriate for the 43 unique operation of a police department. Such rules and regulations shall reserve exclusive 44 authority over the disciplinary process and procedures affecting commissioned officers to the 45 civil service commission; however, until such time as the city adopts such rules and regulations, 46 the commissioned personnel shall continue to be governed by the board of police commissioner's 47 rules and regulations in effect immediately prior to the establishment of the municipal police 48 force, with the police chief acting in place of the board of police commissioners for purposes of 49 applying the rules and regulations. Unless otherwise provided for, existing civil service 50 commission rules and regulations governing the appeal of disciplinary decisions to the civil service commission shall apply to all commissioned and civilian personnel. The civil service 51

52 commission's rules and regulations shall provide that records prepared for disciplinary purposes 53 shall be confidential, closed records available solely to the civil service commission and those 54 who possess authority to conduct investigations regarding disciplinary matters pursuant to the 55 civil service commission's rules and regulations. A hearing officer shall be appointed by the civil 56 service commission to hear any such appeals that involve discipline resulting in a suspension of 57 greater than fifteen days, demotion, or termination, but the civil service commission shall make 58 the final findings of fact, conclusions of law, and decision which shall be subject to any right of 59 appeal under chapter 536.

60 9. A city not within a county that establishes and maintains a municipal police force 61 under this section:

62 (1) Shall provide or contract for life insurance coverage and for insurance benefits 63 providing health, medical, and disability coverage for commissioned and civilian personnel of 64 the municipal police force to the same extent as was provided by the board of police 65 commissioners under section 84.160;

66 (2) Shall provide or contract for medical and life insurance coverage for any 67 commissioned or civilian personnel who retired from service with the board of police 68 commissioners or who were employed by the board of police commissioners and retire from the 69 municipal police force of a city not within a county to the same extent such medical and life 70 insurance coverage was provided by the board of police commissioners under section 84.160;

(3) Shall make available medical and life insurance coverage for purchase to the spouses or dependents of commissioned and civilian personnel who retire from service with the board of police commissioners or the municipal police force and deceased commissioned and civilian personnel who receive pension benefits under sections 86.200 to 86.366 at the rate that such dependent's or spouse's coverage would cost under the appropriate plan if the deceased were living; and

May pay an additional shift differential compensation to commissioned and civilian
 personnel for evening and night tours of duty in an amount not to exceed ten percent of the
 officer's base hourly rate.

80 10. A city not within a county that establishes a municipal police force under sections 81 84.343 to 84.346 shall establish a transition committee of five members for the purpose of: 82 coordinating and implementing the transition of authority, operations, assets, and obligations 83 from the board of police commissioners to the city; winding down the affairs of the board; 84 making nonbinding recommendations for the transition of the police force from the board to the 85 city; and other related duties, if any, established by executive order of the city's mayor. Once the 86 ordinance referenced in this section is enacted, the city shall provide written notice to the board 87 of police commissioners and the governor of the state of Missouri. Within thirty days of such

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88 notice, the mayor shall appoint three members to the committee, two of whom shall be members 89 of a statewide law enforcement association that represents at least five thousand law enforcement 90 officers. The remaining members of the committee shall include the police chief of the 91 municipal police force and a person who currently or previously served as a commissioner on 92 the board of police commissioners, who shall be appointed to the committee by the mayor of 93 such city.

94.900. 1. (1) The governing body of the following cities may impose a tax as provided 2 in this section:

3 (a) Any city of the third classification with more than ten thousand eight hundred but less 4 than ten thousand nine hundred inhabitants located at least partly within a county of the first 5 classification with more than one hundred eighty-four thousand but less than one hundred eighty-6 eight thousand inhabitants;

7 (b) Any city of the fourth classification with more than four thousand five hundred but 8 fewer than five thousand inhabitants;

9 (c) Any city of the fourth classification with more than eight thousand nine hundred but 10 fewer than nine thousand inhabitants;

11 (d) Any home rule city with more than forty-eight thousand but fewer than forty-nine 12 thousand inhabitants;

(e) Any home rule city with more than seventy-three thousand but fewer than seventy-five thousand inhabitants;

15 (f) Any city of the fourth classification with more than thirteen thousand five hundred 16 but fewer than sixteen thousand inhabitants;

17 (g) Any city of the fourth classification with more than seven thousand but fewer than 18 eight thousand inhabitants;

(h) Any city of the fourth classification with more than four thousand but fewer than four
thousand five hundred inhabitants and located in any county of the first classification with more
than one hundred fifty thousand but fewer than two hundred thousand inhabitants;

(i) Any city of the third classification with more than thirteen thousand but fewer than fifteen thousand inhabitants and located in any county of the third classification without a township form of government and with more than thirty-three thousand but fewer than thirtyseven thousand inhabitants; [or]

(j) Any city of the fourth classification with more than three thousand but fewer than three thousand three hundred inhabitants and located in any county of the third classification without a township form of government and with more than eighteen thousand but fewer than twenty thousand inhabitants and that is not the county seat of such county; 30 (k) Any city of the fourth classification with more than four hundred fifty but fewer 31 than five hundred inhabitants and located in any county of the third classification without 32 a township form of government and with more than twenty-nine thous and but fewer than 33 thirty-three thousand inhabitants and with a city of the fourth classification with more 34 than four hundred but fewer than four hundred fifty inhabitants as the county seat;

(1) Any city of the fourth classification with more than eight thousand but fewer
 than twelve thousand inhabitants and located in any county of the first classification with
 more than two hundred thousand but fewer than two hundred sixty thousand inhabitants;
 or

39 (m) Any city of the fourth classification with more than one thousand three 40 hundred fifty but fewer than one thousand five hundred inhabitants and located in any 41 county of the first classification with more than one hundred fifty thousand but fewer than 42 two hundred thousand inhabitants.

43 (2) The governing body of any city listed in subdivision (1) of this subsection is hereby 44 authorized to impose, by ordinance or order, a sales tax in the amount of up to one-half of one 45 percent on all retail sales made in such city which are subject to taxation under the provisions 46 of sections 144.010 to 144.525 for the purpose of improving the public safety for such $\operatorname{city}_{[7]}$ 47 including, but not limited to, expenditures on equipment, city employee salaries and benefits, and facilities for police, fire and emergency medical providers. The tax authorized by this section 48 49 shall be in addition to any and all other sales taxes allowed by law, except that no ordinance or 50 order imposing a sales tax pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be effective unless the 51 governing body of the city submits to the voters of the city, at a county or state general, primary, 52 or special election, a proposal to authorize the governing body of the city to impose a tax.

53 2. If the proposal submitted involves only authorization to impose the tax authorized by 54 this section, the ballot of submission shall contain, but need not be limited to, the following 55 language:

Shall the city of _____ (city's name) impose a citywide sales tax of _____
(insert amount) for the purpose of improving the public safety of the city?
□ YES □ NO
If you are in favor of the question, place an "X" in the box opposite "YES". If you are opposed to the question, place an "X" in the box opposite "NO".

If a majority of the votes cast on the proposal by the qualified voters voting thereon are in favor of the proposal submitted pursuant to this subsection, then the ordinance or order and any amendments thereto shall be in effect on the first day of the second calendar quarter after the director of revenue receives notification of adoption of the local sales tax. If a proposal receives 66 less than the required majority, then the governing body of the city shall have no power to 67 impose the sales tax herein authorized unless and until the governing body of the city shall again 68 have submitted another proposal to authorize the governing body of the city to impose the sales 69 tax authorized by this section and such proposal is approved by the required majority of the 70 qualified voters voting thereon. However, in no event shall a proposal pursuant to this section 71 be submitted to the voters sooner than twelve months from the date of the last proposal pursuant 72 to this section.

73 3. All revenue received by a city from the tax authorized under the provisions of this 74 section shall be deposited in a special trust fund and shall be used solely for improving the public 75 safety for such city for so long as the tax shall remain in effect.

76 4. Once the tax authorized by this section is abolished or is terminated by any means, all 77 funds remaining in the special trust fund shall be used solely for improving the public safety for 78 the city. Any funds in such special trust fund which are not needed for current expenditures may 79 be invested by the governing body in accordance with applicable laws relating to the investment 80 of other city funds.

81 5. All sales taxes collected by the director of [the department of] revenue under this 82 section on behalf of any city, less one percent for cost of collection which shall be deposited in the state's general revenue fund after payment of premiums for surety bonds as provided in 83 84 section 32.087, shall be deposited in a special trust fund, which is hereby created, to be known 85 as the "City Public Safety Sales Tax Trust Fund". The moneys in the trust fund shall not be 86 deemed to be state funds and shall not be commingled with any funds of the state. The 87 provisions of section 33.080 to the contrary notwithstanding, money in this fund shall not be 88 transferred and placed to the credit of the general revenue fund. The director of [the department 89 of revenue shall keep accurate records of the amount of money in the trust and which was 90 collected in each city imposing a sales tax pursuant to this section, and the records shall be open 91 to the inspection of officers of the city and the public. The fingerprints shall be used by the highway patrol to search the criminal 42 history repository and shall be forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for searching the 43 federal criminal history files.

173.2703. 1. The private college or private university police officers, before they enter upon their duties, shall take and subscribe an oath of office, before an officer authorized to administer oaths, to faithfully and impartially discharge the duties thereof, which oath shall be filed in the office of the board, and the secretary of the board shall give e ach college police officer so appointed and qualified a certificate of appointment, under the seal of the board, which certificate shall empower him or her with the same authority to maintain order, preserve peace, and make arrests as is now held by peace officers.

8 2. The private college or private university police officers shall have the authority 9 to enforce the regulations established in section 173.2709 and general motor vehicle laws 10 in accordance with section 173.2712 on the campus as prescribed in chapter 304. The 11 private college or private university police officer may, in addition, expel from the 12 buildings, campuses, and grounds persons violating the rules and regulations that may be 13 prescribed by the board or others under the authority of the board.

3. Such officer or employee of the private college or private university as may be designated by the board shall have immediate charge, control, and supervision of police officers appointed by authority of this section. Such college or university police officers shall have satisfactorily completed before appointment a training course for police officers as prescribed by chapter 590 for state peace officers or, by virtue of previous experience or training, have met the requirements of chapter 590 and have been licensed under that chapter.

4. Records created by the private college or private university police officers shall
 be accessible as other law enforcement agency records are accessible under chapter 610.

173.2706. Nothing in sections 173.2700 to 173.2712 shall be construed as denying 2 the board the right to appoint guards or watchmen who shall not be given the authority 3 and powers authorized by sections 173.2700 to 173.2712.

173.2709. 1. For the purpose of promoting public safety, health, and general welfare and to protect life and property, the governing board of any private college or private university may establish regulations to control vehicular traffic, including speed regulations, on any thoroughfare owned or maintained by the college or university and located within any of its campuses. Such regulations shall be consistent with the provisions of the general motor vehicle laws of this state. Upon adoption of such regulations, the private college or private university shall have the authority to place official traffic control signals, as defined in section 300.010, on campus property.

9 2. The regulations established by the governing board of the private college or 10 private university under subsection 1 of this section shall be codified, printed, and

distributed for public use. Adequate signs displaying the speed limit shall be posted along
such thoroughfares.

3. Violation of any regulation established under this section shall have the same effect as a violation of municipal ordinances adopted under section 304.120, with penalty provisions as provided in section 304.570. Points assessed against any person under section 302.302 for a violation of this section shall be the same as provided for a violation of a county or municipal ordinance.

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4. The provisions of this section shall apply only to moving violations.

173.2712. 1. All motor vehicles operated upon any thoroughfare owned or maintained by a private college or private university and located within any of its campuses shall be subject to the provisions of the general motor vehicle laws of this state, including chapters 301, 302, 303, 304, 307, and 577. Violations shall have the same effect as though such violations had occurred on public roads, streets, or highways of this state.

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2. Under section 23.253 of the Missouri sunset act:

7 (1) The provisions of the program authorized under sections 173.2700 to 173.2712
8 shall automatically sunset five years after the effective date of this section unless
9 reauthorized by an act of the general assembly; and

10 (2) If the program is reauthorized, the program authorized under sections 173.2700 11 to 173.2712 shall automatically sunset five years after the effective date of the 12 reauthorization of sections 173.2700 to 173.2712; and

(3) Sections 173.2700 to 173.2712 shall terminate on September first of the calendar
 year immediately following the calendar year in which the program authorized under
 sections 173.2700 to 173.2712 is sunset.

190.092. 1. This section shall be known and may be cited as the "Public Access to 2 Automated External Defibrillator Act".

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2. A person or entity that acquires an automated external defibrillator shall:

4 (1) Comply with all regulations governing the placement of an automated external
5 defibrillator;

6 (2) Notify an agent of the local EMS agency of the existence, location, and type of 7 all automated external defibrillators on the premises, including any changes in location of 8 or removal of an automated external defibrillator;

9 (3) Ensure that the automated external defibrillator is maintained and tested 10 according to the operation and maintenance guidelines set forth by the manufacturer;

(4) Ensure that the automated external defibrillator is tested at least biannually and
 after each use; and

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(5) Ensure that an inspection is made of all automated external defibrillators on the premises at least every ninety days for potential issues related to operation of the device, including a blinking light or other obvious defect that may suggest tampering or that another problem has arisen with the functionality of the automated external defibrillator. A person or entity who acquires an automated external defibrillator shall ensure that: (1) Expected defibrillator users receive training by the American Red Cross or American Heart Association in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of automated external defibrillators, or an equivalent nationally recognized course in defibrillator use and cardiopulmonary resuscitation; (2) The defibrillator is maintained and tested according to the manufacturer's operational guidelines; (3) Any person who renders emergency care or treatment on a person in cardiac arrest by using an automated external defibrillator activates the emergency medical services system as soon as possible; and (4) Any person or entity that owns an automated external defibrillator that is for use outside of a health care facility shall have a physician review and approve the clinical protocol for the use of the defibrillator, review and advise regarding the training and skill maintenance of the intended users of the defibrillator and assure proper review of all situations when the defibrillator is used to render emergency care. 3. Any person or entity who acquires an automated external defibrillator shall notify the emergency communications district or the ambulance dispatch center of the primary provider of emergency medical services where the automated external defibrillator is to be located. 4.] 3. Any person who gratuitously and in good faith renders emergency care by use of

35 or provision of an automated external defibrillator shall not be held liable for any civil damages 36 37 or subject to a criminal penalty as a result of such care or treatment, unless the person acts in a willful and wanton or reckless manner in providing the care, advice, or assistance. The person 38 39 or entity [who] that provides [appropriate] training to the person using an automated external defibrillator, the person or entity responsible for the site where the automated external 40 defibrillator is located, and the person or entity that owns the automated external defibrillator[-41 42 the person or entity that provided elinical protocol for automated external defibrillator sites or programs, and the licensed physician who reviews and approves the clinical protocol] shall 43 likewise not be held liable for civil damages or subject to a criminal penalty resulting from the 44 45 use of an automated external defibrillator. [Nothing in this section shall affect any claims brought 46 pursuant to chapter 537 or 538.]

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47 [5.] 4. All basic life support ambulances and stretcher vans operated in the state of 48 Missouri shall be equipped with an automated external defibrillator and be staffed by at least one 49 individual trained in the use of an automated external defibrillator.

50 [6.] 5. The provisions of this section shall apply in all counties within the state and any 51 city not within a county.

190.094. 1. Any ambulance licensed in this state, when used as an ambulance and staffed with volunteer staff, shall be staffed with a minimum of one emergency medical technician and one other crew member who may be a licensed emergency medical technician, registered nurse, **physician assistant, assistant physician**, physician, or someone who has an emergency medical responder certification.

6 2. When transporting a patient, at least one licensed emergency medical technician, 7 registered nurse, **physician assistant, assistant physician**, or physician shall be in attendance 8 with the patient in the patient compartment at all times.

Proof of financial responsibility shall be used as proof of self-insurance;

Sections 190.001 to 190.245 shall not preclude the adoption of any law, ordinance or regulation not in conflict with such sections by any city not within a county, or at least as strict as such sections by any county, municipality or political subdivision except that no such regulations or ordinances shall be adopted by a political subdivision in a county with a population of over nine hundred thousand inhabitants except by the county's governing body.

6. In a county with a population of over nine hundred thousand inhabitants, the governing body of the county shall set the standards for all ambulance services which shall comply with subsection 5 of this section. All such ambulance services must be licensed by the department. The governing body of such county shall not prohibit a licensed ambulance service from operating in the county, as long as the ambulance service meets county standards.

No provider of ambulance service within the state of Missouri which is licensed by the department to provide such service shall discriminate regarding treatment or transportation of emergency patients on the basis of race, sex, age, color, religion, sexual preference, national origin, ancestry, handicap, medical condition or ability to pay.

13. No provision of this section, other than subsections 5, 6, 10 and 11 of this section, is intended to limit or supersede the powers given to ambulance districts pursuant to this chapter or to fire protection districts pursuant to chapter 321, or to counties, cities, towns and villages pursuant to chapter 67.

14. Upon the sale or transfer of any ground ambulance service ownership, the owner of such service shall notify the department of the change in ownership within thirty days of such sale or transfer. After receipt of such notice, the department shall conduct an inspection of the ambulance service to verify compliance with the licensure standards of sections 190.001 to 190.245.

190.142. 1. (1) For applications submitted before the recognition of EMS personnel
licensure interstate compact under sections 190.900 to 190.939 takes effect, the department shall,
within a reasonable time after receipt of an application, cause such investigation as it deems

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(5) Any two-way telecommunications device or the component parts thereof.

2. The violation of subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of this section shall be a class D felony; the violation of subdivision (2) or (5) of subsection 1 of this section shall be a class E felony; the violation of subdivision (3) of subsection 1 of this section shall be a class A misdemeanor; and the violation of subdivision (4) of subsection 1 of this section shall be a class B felony.

21 3. The chief operating officer of a county or city jail or other correctional facility or the 22 administrator of a private jail may deny visitation privileges to or refer to the county prosecuting 23 attorney for prosecution any person who knowingly delivers, attempts to deliver, possesses, 24 deposits, or conceals in or about the premises of such jail or facility any personal item which is prohibited by rule or regulation of such jail or facility. Such rules or regulations, including a list 25 26 of personal items allowed in the jail or facility, shall be prominently posted for viewing both 27 inside and outside such jail or facility in an area accessible to any visitor, and shall be made 28 available to any person requesting such rule or regulation. Violation of this subsection shall be 29 an infraction if not covered by other statutes.

4. Any person who has been found guilty of a violation of subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of this section involving any alkaloid shall be entitled to expungement of the record of the violation. The procedure to expunge the record shall be pursuant to section 610.123. The record of any person shall not be expunged if such person has been found guilty of knowingly delivering, attempting to deliver, possessing, depositing, or concealing any alkaloid of any controlled substance in or about the premises of any correctional center, or city or county jail, or private prison or jail.

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5. Subdivision (5) of subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to:

(1) Any law enforcement officer employed by a state agency, federal agency, or
 political subdivision lawfully engaged in his or her duties as a law enforcement officer;

40 (2) Any person authorized by the correctional center or city, county, or private jail
 41 to possess or use a two-way telecommunications device in the correctional center or city,
 42 county, or private jail; or

43 (3) Any person who is not an inmate possessing a two-way telecommunications 44 device or the component parts thereof in a correctional center or city, county, or private 45 jail if such person lawfully acts without intent to conceal and without intent to deliver to 46 another person or deposit for the use of another person; however, if such person refuses 47 to comply with orders to surrender such device or its component parts, he or she shall be 48 guilty of a class A misdemeanor.

270.400. 1. For purposes of this section, the following terms mean:

2 (1) "Feral hog", any hog, including Russian and European wild boar, that is not 3 conspicuously identified by ear tags or other forms of identification and is roaming freely upon 4 public or private lands without the landowner's permission;

5 (2) "Landowner's agent", any person who has permission from a landowner to be present 6 on the landowner's property;

7 (3) "Verifiable consent", consent received in any form including, but not limited 8 to, voice mail, telephone call, or text message from the landowner that an agent of the 9 conservation commission is able to substantiate within seven calendar days after contact 10 with the landowner's agent.

11 2. A person may kill a feral hog roaming freely upon such person's land and shall not be 12 liable to the owner of the hog for the loss of the hog.

3. Any person may take or kill a feral hog on public land or private land with the consent of the landowner[; except that, during the firearms deer and turkey hunting season, the regulations of the Missouri wildlife code shall apply]. Such person shall not be liable to the owner of the hog for the loss of such hog.

4. No person except a landowner or such landowner's agent with verifiable consent of the landowner on such landowner's property shall take, attempt to take, or kill a feral hog with the use of an artificial light. No provision of this section shall be construed to prohibit a landowner or the landowner's agent from using a night vision, infrared, or thermal imaging device.

5. The director of the department of agriculture shall promulgate rules for fencing and health standards for Russian and European wild boar and wild-caught swine held alive on private land. Any person holding Russian or European wild boar or wild-caught swine on private land shall annually submit an application to the department for a permit. Any applicant that successfully meets the requirements under this section as determined by the department and pays an application fee shall be issued a permit. 6. Russian and European wild boar and wild-caught swine may move only from a farm for a farm or directly to slaughter or to a slaughter-only market. The department shall promulgate rules for exemption permits and a fee structure to offset the actual and necessary costs incurred to enforce the provisions of this section.

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32 7. (1) There is hereby created in the state treasury the "Animal Health Fund", which 33 shall consist of all fees and administrative penalties collected by the department of agriculture 34 under this section and section 270.260. The state treasurer shall be custodian of the fund. Any person who is assessed an administrative penalty under this section shall be notified in writing of the right to appeal. Such person may request a hearing before the director of the department of agriculture. Such request shall be made in writing no later than thirty days after the date on which the person was notified of the violation of section 270.260.

9. Any rule or portion of a rule, as that term is defined in section 536.010, that is created under the authority delegated in this section shall become effective only if it complies with and is subject to all of the provisions of chapter 536 and, if applicable, section 536.028. This section and chapter 536 are nonseverable, and if any of the powers vested with the general assembly pursuant to chapter 536 to review, to delay the effective date, or to disapprove and annul a rule are subsequently held unconstitutional, then the grant of rulemaking authority and any rule proposed or adopted after August 28, 2010, shall be invalid and void.

10. Nothing in this section shall be construed to apply to domestic swine.

306.127. 1. Beginning January 1, 2005, every person born after January 1, 1984, or as required pursuant to section 306.128, who operates a vessel on the lakes of this state shall possess, on the vessel, a boating safety identification card issued by the water patrol division or its agent which shows that he or she has:

5 (1) Successfully completed a boating safety course approved by the National Association 6 of State Boating Law Administrators and certified by the water patrol division. The boating

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7 safety course may include a course sponsored by the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary or the 8 United States Power Squadron. The water patrol division may appoint agents to administer a 9 boater education course or course equivalency examination and issue boater identification cards 10 under guidelines established by the water patrol. The water patrol division shall maintain a list 11 of approved courses; or

12 (2) Successfully passed an equivalency examination prepared by the water patrol division 13 and administered by the water patrol division or its agent. The equivalency examination shall 14 have a degree of difficulty equal to, or greater than, that of the examinations given at the 15 conclusion of an approved boating safety course; or

16 (3) A valid master's, mate's, or operator's license issued by the United States Coast 17 Guard.

18 2. The water patrol division or its agent shall issue a permanent boating safety 19 identification card to each person who complies with the requirements of this section which is 20 valid for life unless invalidated pursuant to law.

3. The water patrol division may charge a fee for such card or any replacement card that does not substantially exceed the costs of administrating this section. The water patrol division or its designated agent shall collect such fees. These funds shall be forwarded to general revenue.

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4. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any person who:

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(1) Is licensed by the United States Coast Guard to serve as master of a vessel;

- (2) Operates a vessel only on a private lake or pond that is not classified as waters of thestate;

(3) Until January 1, 2006, is a nonresident who is visiting the state for sixty days or less;(4) Is participating in an event or regatta approved by the water patrol;

(5) Is a nonresident who has proof of a valid boating certificate or license issued by
another state if the boating course is approved by the National Association of State Boating Law
Administrators (NASBLA);

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(6) Is exempted by rule of the water patrol;

35 (7) Is currently serving in any branch of the United States Armed Forces, reserves, or
 36 Missouri National Guard, or any spouse of a person currently in such service; or

37 (8) Has previously successfully completed a boating safety education course approved38 by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA).

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5. The water patrol division shall inform other states of the requirements of this section.

6. No individual shall be detained or stopped strictly for the purpose of checking whether
the individual possesses a boating safety identification card or a temporary boater education
permit.

43 7. Any person or company that rents or sells vessels may issue a temporary boating 44 safety identification card to an individual to operate a rented vessel or a vessel being considered 45 for sale, for a period of up to seven days, provided that the individual meets the minimum age 46 requirements for operating a vessel in this state. In order to qualify for the temporary boating 47 safety identification card, the applicant shall provide a valid driver's license and shall sign an 48 affidavit that he or she has reviewed the Missouri state highway patrol handbook of Missouri 49 boating laws and responsibilities. Any individual holding a valid temporary boating safety 50 identification card shall be deemed in compliance with the requirements of this section. The electronic online process developed and 62 provided by the Missouri state highway patrol shall allow the applicant to pay the temporary 63 boating safety identification card fee by credit card or debit card. Notwithstanding any provision in section 306.185 to the contrary, all fees collected under the authority of this subsection shall 64 65 be deposited in the water patrol division fund. The Missouri state highway patrol shall 66 promulgate rules for developing the temporary boating safety identification card and any 67 requirements necessary to the issuance, processing, and payment of the temporary boating safety 68 identification card. The Missouri state highway patrol shall, by rule, develop a boating safety 69 checklist for each applicant seeking a temporary boating safety identification card. Nothing in 70 this subsection shall allow a holder of a temporary boating safety identification card to receive 71 a notation on the person's driver's license or nondriver identification under section 302.184. The 72 provisions of this subsection shall expire on December 31, [2022] 2032.

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307.179. 1. As used in this section, the following terms shall mean:

2 (1) "Child booster seat", a seating system which meets the Federal Motor Vehicle Safety
3 Standards set forth in 49 C.F.R. 571.213, as amended, that is designed to elevate a child to
4 properly sit in a federally approved safety belt system;

5 (2) "Child passenger restraint system", a seating system which meets the Federal Motor 6 Vehicle Safety Standards set forth in 49 C.F.R. 571.213, as amended, and which is either

7 permanently affixed to a motor vehicle or is affixed to such vehicle by a safety belt or a universal

- 8 attachment system;
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(3) "Driver", a person who is in actual physical control of a motor vehicle.

2. Every driver transporting a child under the age of sixteen years shall be responsible,
when transporting such child in a motor vehicle operated by that driver on the streets or
highways of this state, for providing for the protection of such child as follows:

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(1) Children shall be secured in a rear-facing child passenger restraint system until the child reaches two years of age;

15 (2) Children less than four years of age, regardless of weight, shall be secured in a child 16 passenger restraint system appropriate for that child;

17 [(2)] (3) Children weighing less than forty pounds, regardless of age, shall be secured 18 in a child passenger restraint system appropriate for that child;

19 [(3)] (4) Children at least four years of age but less than eight years of age, who also 20 weigh at least forty pounds but less than eighty pounds, and who are also less than four feet, nine 21 inches tall, shall be secured in a child passenger restraint system or booster seat appropriate for 22 that child;

[(4)] (5) Children at least eighty pounds or children more than four feet, nine inches in
 height shall be secured by a vehicle safety belt or booster seat appropriate for that child;

[(5)] (6) A child who otherwise would be required to be secured in a booster seat may be transported in the back seat of a motor vehicle while wearing only a lap belt if the back seat of the motor vehicle is not equipped with a combination lap and shoulder belt for booster seat installation;

[(6)] (7) When transporting children in the immediate family when there are more children than there are seating positions in the enclosed area of a motor vehicle, the children who are not able to be restrained by a child safety restraint device appropriate for the child shall sit in the area behind the front seat of the motor vehicle unless the motor vehicle is designed only for a front seat area. The driver transporting children referred to in this subsection is not in violation of this section.

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This subsection shall only apply to the use of a child passenger restraint system or vehicle safetybelt for children less than sixteen years of age being transported in a motor vehicle.

3. Any driver who violates subdivision (1), (2), $[\Theta r]$ (3), or (4) of subsection 2 of this 39 section is guilty of an infraction and, upon conviction, may be punished by a fine of not more 40 than fifty dollars and court costs. Any driver who violates subdivision [(4)] (5) of subsection 2 41 of this section shall be subject to the penalty in subsection 6 of section 307.178. No person shall be granted a license hereunder unless such person is of good moral character and a qualified legal voter and a taxpaying citizen of the county, town, city or 2 3 village, nor shall any corporation be granted a license hereunder unless the managing officer of 4 such corporation is of good moral character and a qualified legal voter and taxpaying citizen of 5 the county, town, city or village; and, except as otherwise provided under subsection 7 of this section, no person shall be granted a license or permit hereunder whose license as such dealer 6 7 has been revoked, or who has been convicted, since the ratification of the twenty-first 8 amendment to the Constitution of the United States, of a violation of the provisions of any law 9 applicable to the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquor, or who employs in his or her 10 business as such dealer any person whose license has been revoked unless five years have passed since the revocation as provided under subsection 6 of this section, or who has been convicted 11 12 of violating such law since the date aforesaid; provided, that nothing in this section contained 13 shall prevent the issuance of licenses to nonresidents of Missouri or foreign corporations for the 14 privilege of selling to duly licensed wholesalers and soliciting orders for the sale of intoxicating 15 liquors to, by or through a duly licensed wholesaler, within this state.

2. (1) No person, partnership or corporation shall be qualified for a license under this 16 17 law if such person, any member of such partnership, or such corporation, or any officer, director, 18 or any stockholder owning, legally or beneficially, directly or indirectly, ten percent or more of 19 the stock of such corporation, or other financial interest therein, or ten percent or more of the 20 interest in the business for which the person, partnership or corporation is licensed, or any person 21 employed in the business licensed under this law shall have had a license revoked under this law 22 except as otherwise provided under subsections 6 and 7 of this section, or shall have been 23 convicted of violating the provisions of any law applicable to the manufacture or sale of 24 intoxicating liquor since the ratification of the twenty-first amendment to the Constitution of the 25 United States, or shall not be a person of good moral character.

The term "financial interest" as used in this chapter is defined to mean all interest, legal or beneficial, direct or indirect, in the capital devoted to the licensed enterprise and all such 51 52 interest in the net profits of the enterprise, after the payment of reasonable and necessary 53 operating business expenses and taxes, including interest in dividends, preferred dividends, 54 interest and profits, directly or indirectly paid as compensation for, or in consideration of interest 55 in, or for use of, the capital devoted to the enterprise, or for property or money advanced, loaned 56 or otherwise made available to the enterprise, except by way of ordinary commercial credit or 57 bona fide bank credit not in excess of credit customarily granted by banking institutions, whether 58 paid as dividends, interest or profits, or in the guise of royalties, commissions, salaries, or any 59 other form whatsoever.

60 5. The supervisor shall by regulation require all applicants for licenses to file written statements, under oath, containing the information reasonably required to administer this section. 61

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62 Statements by applicants for licenses as wholesalers and retailers shall set out, with other 63 information required, full information concerning the residence of all persons financially 64 interested in the business to be licensed as required by regulation. All material changes in the 65 information filed shall be promptly reported to the supervisor.

66 6. Any person whose license or permit issued under this chapter has been revoked shall 67 be automatically eligible to work as an employee of an establishment holding a license or permit 68 under this chapter five years after the date of the revocation.

5 (1) The intoxicating liquor is in a durable, leakproof, and sealable container that 6 contains one or more standard bottles, pouches, or cans of malt liquor; fifty milliliters or 7 more of spirituous liquors; or one hundred milliliters or more of wine. 311.293. 1. Except for any establishment that may apply for a license under section 311.089, any person possessing the qualifications and meeting the requirements of this chapter, who is licensed to sell intoxicating liquor at retail, may apply to the supervisor of alcohol and tobacco control for a special license to sell intoxicating liquor at retail between the hours of

5 [9:00] 6:00 a.m. [and midnight] on Sundays and 1:30 a.m. on Mondays. A licensee under this 6 section shall pay to the director of revenue an additional fee of two hundred dollars a year 7 payable at the same time and in the same manner as its other license fees.

3. The provisions of this section regarding the time of closing shall not apply to any person who possesses a special permit issued under section 311.174, 311.176, or 311.178.

311.332. 1. It shall be unlawful for any wholesaler licensed to sell intoxicating liquor and wine containing alcohol in excess of five percent by weight to persons duly licensed to sell 2 3 such intoxicating liquor and wine at retail, to discriminate between retailers or in favor of or against any retailer or group of retailers, directly or indirectly, in price, in discounts for time of 4 5 payment, or in discounts on quantity of merchandise sold, or to grant directly or indirectly any 6 discount, rebate, free goods, allowance or other inducement, excepting a discount not in excess 7 of one percent for quantity of liquor and wine, and a discount not in excess of one percent for payment on or before a certain date. The delivery of manufacturer rebate coupons by wholesalers 8 9 to retailers shall not be a violation of this subsection.

10 2. Manufacturers or wholesalers shall be permitted to donate or deliver or cause to be 11 delivered beer, wine, **distilled spirits**, or brandy for nonresale purposes to any unlicensed person 12 or any licensed retail dealer who is a charitable or religious organization as defined in section 13 313.005 or educational institution, at any location or licensed premises, provided, such beer, 14 wine, distilled spirits, or brandy is unrelated to the organization's or institution's licensed retail operation. A charge for admission to an event or activity at which beer, wine, distilled spirits, 15 16 or brandy is available without separate charge shall not constitute resale for the purposes of this 17 subsection. Wine used in religious ceremonies may be sold by wholesalers to a religious 18 organization as defined in section 313.005. Any manufacturer or wholesaler providing nonresale items shall keep a record of any deliveries made pursuant to this subsection. 19

3. Manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and unlicensed persons may donate wine in the original package to a charitable or religious organization as defined in section 313.005 or educational institution for the sole purpose of being auctioned by the organization or institution for fund-raising purposes, provided the auction takes place on a retail-licensed premises and all

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24 proceeds from the sale go into a fund of an organization or institution that is unrelated to any 25 licensed retail operation.

311.660. **1.** The supervisor of liquor control shall have the authority to suspend or 2 revoke for cause all such licenses; and to make the following regulations, without limiting the 3 generality of provisions empowering the supervisor of liquor control as in this chapter set forth 4 as to the following matters, acts and things:

5 (1) Fix and determine the nature, form and capacity of all packages used for containing 6 intoxicating liquor of any kind, to be kept or sold under this law;

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(4) Prescribe the terms and conditions of the licenses issued and granted under this law;

17 (5) Prescribe the nature of the proof to be furnished and conditions to be observed in the18 issuance of duplicate licenses, in lieu of those lost or destroyed;

(6) Establish rules and regulations for the conduct of the business carried on by each
specific licensee under the license, and such rules and regulations if not obeyed by every licensee
shall be grounds for the revocation or suspension of the license;

(7) The right to examine books, records and papers of each licensee and to hear anddetermine complaints against any licensee;

(8) To issue subpoenas and all necessary processes and require the production of papers,to administer oaths and to take testimony;

26 (9) Prescribe all forms of labels to be affixed to all packages containing intoxicating 27 liquor of any kind; and

Notwithstanding subsection 1 of this section, the supervisor of liquor control shall not prohibit persons from participating in the sale of intoxicating liquor within the scope of their employment solely on the basis of being found guilty of any felony offense, except for prohibitions set forth in sections 311.191 and 311.193. 313.220. 1. The commission shall promulgate such rules and regulations governing the establishment and operation of a state lottery as it deems necessary and desirable to fully implement the mandate of the people expressed in the approval of the lottery amendment to Article III of the Missouri Constitution. Such defendants may be charged in one or more counts together or separately and all of the defendants need not be charged in each count.

6 2. Notwithstanding the fact that reasonable bond may 33 be posted pursuant to this [subsection] subdivision, the authority having custody of the animal 34 may humanely dispose of the animal at the end of the time for which reasonable expenses are 35 covered by the bond or security, unless there is a court order prohibiting such disposition. Such 36 order shall provide for a **reasonable** bond or other security in the amount necessary to protect 37 the authority having custody of the animal from any cost of the care, keeping, or disposal of the 38 animal.

39 (3) The authority taking custody of an animal shall give notice of the provisions of this
40 section [by posting a copy of this section at the place where the animal was taken into custody
41 or] by delivering [it] a copy of this section to a person residing on the property.

3. The owner or custodian of any animal humanely killed pursuant to this section shall not be entitled to recover any damages related to nor the actual value of the animal if the animal was found by a licensed veterinarian to be diseased or disabled **beyond recovery for any useful purpose**, or if the owner or custodian failed to post bond or security for the care, keeping, and disposition of the animal after being notified of [impoundment] confiscation and after completion of the disposition hearing.

48 **4.** All animals confiscated under this section shall receive proper care as determined 49 by state law and regulations for each specific animal and facility or organization where the 50 animal is placed after such confiscation. Any such facility or organization shall be liable 51 to the owner for damages for any negligent acts or abuse of such animal that occurs while 52 the animal is in the care, custody, and control of the facility or organization.

53 5. In the event that the animal owner is not liable for the costs incurred for the 54 placement and care of an animal or animals while charges were pending, such costs relating to placement and care, as well as liability for the life or death of the animal and 55 for medical procedures performed while charges were pending, shall be the responsibility 56 57 of and shall be borne and paid by the confiscating agency. Such costs shall be consistent 58 with the fair market value of boarding an animal at a retail establishment and with the 59 usual and customary costs of veterinary medical services provided by a clinic licensed 60 under chapter 340.

61 6. If the owner posted a sufficient bond and is acquitted or there is a final discharge 62 without conviction, unless there is a settlement agreement, consent judgment, or a 63 suspended imposition of sentence, the owner may demand the return of the animal held in 64 custody. Any entity with care, custody, and control of such animal shall immediately return such animal to the owner upon demand and proof of such acquittal or final 65 66 discharge without conviction. Upon acquittal or final discharge without conviction, unless 67 there is a settlement agreement, consent judgment, or a suspended imposition of sentence, 68 the owner shall not be liable for any costs incurred relating to the placement or care of the 69 animal during the pendency of the charges.

70 7. Any person or entity that intentionally euthanizes, other than as permissible 71 under this section, or intentionally sterilizes an animal prior to a disposition hearing or 72 during any period for which reasonable bond was secured for the animal's care is guilty 73 of a class B misdemeanor and shall be liable to the owner of the animal for damages, 74 including the actual value of the animal. Each individual animal for which a violation 75 occurs is a separate offense. Any second or subsequent violation is a class A misdemeanor, 76 and any entity licensed under state law shall be subject to licensure sanction by its 77 governing body.

578.030. 1. The provisions of section 43.200 notwithstanding, any member of the state highway patrol or other law enforcement officer may apply for and serve a search warrant, and shall have the power of search and seizure in order to enforce the provisions of sections 578.025 to 578.050. All requests for such warrants shall be signed, witnessed, and accompanied by an affidavit stating the probable cause to believe a violation of sections 578.025 to 578.050 has occurred.

2. Any member of the state highway patrol or other law enforcement officer making an
arrest under section 578.025 shall lawfully take possession of all dogs or other animals in

If the property includes animals, the placement of the animals shall be 27 28 handled in accordance with the provisions of section 578.018. Upon the conviction of the 29 person so charged, all property so seized shall be adjudged by the court to be forfeited and shall 30 thereupon be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the court may order. In the event of the 31 acquittal or final discharge without conviction of the person so charged, such court shall, on 32 demand, direct the delivery of such property so held in custody to the owner thereof.

578.419. Sections 578.419 to 578.437 shall be known and may be cited as the 2 "Missouri Criminal Street Gangs Prevention Act".

11 (a) Assault with a deadly weapon or by means of force likely to cause serious physical 12 injury, as provided in sections 565.050 and 565.052; 13 (b) Robbery, arson and those offenses under chapter 569 which are related to robbery 14 and arson: 15 (c) Murder or manslaughter, as provided in sections 565.020 to 565.024; 16 (d) Any violation of the provisions of chapter 579 which involves the distribution, 17 delivery or manufacture of a substance prohibited by chapter 579; 18 (e) Unlawful use of a weapon which is a felony pursuant to section 571.030; 19 (f) Tampering with witnesses and victims, as provided in section 575.270; 20 (g) Promoting online sexual solicitation, as provided in section 566.103; 21 (h) Sexual trafficking of a child in the first degree, as provided in section 566.210; 22 (i) Sexual trafficking of a child in the second degree, as provided in section 566.211; 23 (i) Patronizing prostitution, as provided in subsection 4 of section 567.030; 24 (k) Promoting prostitution in the first degree, as provided in section 567.050; 25 (I) Promoting prostitution in the second degree, as provided in section 567.060; 26 (m) Abuse or neglect of a child, as provided in subsection 6 of section 568.060; 27 (n) Sexual exploitation of a minor, as provided in section 573.023; 28 (o) Child used in sexual performance, as provided in section 573.200; [or] 29 (p) Promoting sexual performance by a child, as provided in section 573.205; or 30 (q) Any dangerous felony, as defined in section 556.061. Any person who actively participates in any criminal street gang with 578.423.

2 knowledge that its members engage in or have engaged in a pattern of criminal street gang 3 activity, and who willfully promotes, furthers, or assists in any felonious criminal conduct by 4 gang members shall be [punished by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed 5 one year, or by imprisonment in a state correctional facility for one, two, or three years] guilty 6 of a class B felony.

578.425. Any person who is convicted of a felony [or a misdemeanor] which is committed for the benefit of, at the direction of, or in association with, any criminal street gang, with the [specific intent] purpose to promote, further, or assist in any criminal conduct by gang members, shall be punished in the following manner:

Any person to whom sections 589.400 to 589.425 apply shall, within three business 46 days of adjudication, release from incarceration, or placement upon probation, register with the 47 chief law enforcement official of the county or city not within a county in which such person 48 resides unless such person has already registered in that county for the same offense. For any 49 juvenile under subdivision (6) of subsection 1 of this section, within three business days of 50 adjudication or release from commitment to the division of youth services, the department of 51 mental health, or other placement, such juvenile shall register with the chief law enforcement 52 official of the county or city not within a county in which he or she resides unless he or she has 53 already registered in such county or city not within a county for the same offense. Any person 54 to whom sections 589.400 to 589.425 apply if not currently registered in their county of

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55 residence shall register with the chief law enforcement official of such county or city not within 56 a county within three business days. The chief law enforcement official shall forward a copy of 57 the registration form required by section 589.407 to a city, town, village, or campus law 58 enforcement agency located within the county of the chief law enforcement official.

- 59 3. The registration requirements of sections 589.400 through 589.425 shall be as 60 provided under subsection 4 of this section unless:

Any nonresident worker, including work as a volunteer or intern, or nonresident 135 student shall register for the duration of such person's employment, including participation as a 136 volunteer or intern, or attendance at any school of higher education whether public or private, 137 including any secondary school, trade school, professional school, or institution of higher 138 education on a full-time or part-time basis in this state unless granted relief under section 139 589.401. Any registered offender shall provide information regarding any place in which the 140 offender is staying when away from his or her residence for seven or more days, including the 141 period of time the offender is staying in such place. Any registered offender from another state 142 who has a temporary residence in this state and resides more than seven days in a twelve-month 143 period shall register for the duration of such person's temporary residency unless granted relief 144 under section 589.401.

589.401. 1. A person on the sexual offender registry may file a petition in the division of the circuit court in the county or city not within a county in which the offense requiring 2 registration was committed to have his or her name removed from the sexual offender registry. 3 4 2. Because immediate action is necessary to ensure that all owners, officers, 2 managers, contractors, employees, and other support staff of medical marijuana facilities be 3 subjected to state and federal fingerprint-based criminal background checks to insure the 4 integrity of the Missouri medical marijuana industry, the enactment of section 195.815 of this 5 act is deemed necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, welfare, peace, and 6 safety, and the enactment of section 195.815 of this act is hereby declared to be an emergency 7 act within the meaning of the constitution, and the enactment of section 195.815 of this act shall 8 be in full force and effect on July 1, 2020, or upon its passage and approval, whichever occurs 9 later.

Section C. The repeal and reenactment of section 650.005 of section A and the enactment of sections 40.003, 41.005, 45.010, 45.020, and 45.030, of section A of this act shall become effective only upon the passage and approval by the voters of a constitutional amendment submitted to them by the general assembly regarding the creation of the department of defense.

Section D. The repeal and reenactment of the first occurrence of section 211.071 of this 2 act shall become effective on January 1, 2021, and the repeal and reenactment of the second 3 occurrence of section 211.071 of this act shall become effective on August 28, 2020.

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
