2	WHEREAS, vultures perform a vital role in preserving the state's ecosystem by scavenging for and eating carrion; and
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4 5	WHEREAS , one variety of vulture, the black vulture (<i>Coragyps atratus</i>), is a migratory bird commonly observed in all regions of this state; and
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7 8	WHEREAS, the black vulture employs more aggressive feeding behaviors than other vultures, preying on livestock in addition to scavenging carcasses; and
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10 11	WHEREAS, farmers in this state and others have suffered losses of livestock from black vulture attacks; and
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13 14	WHEREAS, the black vulture's predatory behavior extends to small native wildlife and pets; and
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16 17 18	WHEREAS, vultures tear at soft materials used for construction purposes such as rubber liners and seals, caulking, and shingles, and vultures can destroy pools, vehicles, and other outdoor equipment by pecking and scratching at paint, roofs, seats, and covers; and
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20 21 22	WHEREAS, roosting flocks of vultures foul buildings and other structures with their highly acidic and corrosive vomit, urine, and feces, creating considerable replacement costs for residents and businesses of this state; and

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24 25	WHEREAS, the growing population of black vultures in this state has increased the likelihood of contact and conflict with Missourians; and
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27 28	WHEREAS , black vultures are protected under the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C. 703 et seq.), as amended; and
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30 31 32	WHEREAS, the federal protection of black vultures prevents farmers from defending their livestock against a black vulture onslaught without a federal depredation permit issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS); and
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343536	WHEREAS, the necessary USFWS permit to capture or kill black vultures requires a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Wildlife Services recommendation that a permit be issued; and
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38 39 40	WHEREAS, neither the USDA Wildlife Services recommendation nor the USFWS permit will be issued without the farmer submitting information to both federal agencies showing the damages already inflicted on the farmer's livestock by black vultures; and
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42 43	WHEREAS , methods of resolving black vulture damage often favor dispersing vultures from the farmer's property rather than permanently removing the threat; and
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45 46	WHEREAS, farmers need at least one approved method of immediately addressing black vulture assaults against their livestock without first enduring property destruction and loss:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the members of the House of Representatives of the One Hundredth General Assembly, Second Regular Session, the Senate concurring therein, hereby create the Black Vulture Depredation Task Force; and HCR 102 3

51 52	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall consist of the following members:
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54 55	(1) One member of the majority party of the Senate and one member of the minority party of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
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57 58 59	(2) One member of the majority party of the House of Representatives and one member of the minority party of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
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61	(3) One representative from the Missouri Department of Agriculture;
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63	(4) One representative from the Missouri Department of Conservation;
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65 66	(5) One representative from the Division of State Parks of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources;
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68 69	(6) Two members from agricultural groups in the state, one appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives and one appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
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71	(7) One representative from the USDA Wildlife Services; and
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73	(8) One representative from the USFWS; and
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75 76	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the mission of the task force shall be, accounting for the black vulture's role in the state's ecosystem, to fully consider and study the damage that

77 black vultures effect on livestock, the costs incurred on Missouri's farmers by black vultures, and 78 all options for preventing such damages and mitigating such costs; and 79 80 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the task force shall elect a chair 81 and a vice chair from the members who are members of the General Assembly; and 82 83 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the chair or vice chair of the task force shall call a meeting within fifteen days of the adoption of this resolution; and 85 86 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the staff of Senate Research and House Research 87 shall provide such legal, research, clerical, technical, and bill drafting services as the task force 88 may require in the performance of its duties; and 89 90 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force, its members, and any staff assigned 91 to the committee shall be reimbursed for travel and other expenses actually and necessarily 92 included in the performance of their duties; and 93 94 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall report its findings and 95 recommendations to the General Assembly before January 1, 2021; and 96 97 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall terminate upon submission of 98 the report to the General Assembly; and 99 100 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Clerk of the Missouri House of

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Representatives be instructed to prepare properly inscribed copies of this resolution for the

Director of the Department of Agriculture, the Director of the Department of Conservation, the

Director of the Department of Natural Resources, the Deputy Administrator of the USDA

Wildlife Services, and the Director of the USFWS.
