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## **FISCAL ANALYSIS**

#### **ASSUMPTION**

Officials from the **Department of Public Safety - Missouri National Guard (MNG)** believe there is a potential fiscal impact of \$150,000 - \$200,000 to their personal services. This potential impact would cause reorganizing into a department structure which would create Division Directors, a Deputy Director and Department Director. The unknown at this time is the MNG's ability to pay a percentage of certain employees with federal money depending on their funding source and involvement with military missions.

**Oversight** notes the Department of Public Safety - Office of the Director currently provides some services to the MNG that the Department of Defense would be required to perform as their own department (budget, general counsel, human resources, etc.). Therefore, Oversight will reflect a cost of \$0 or (Could exceed \$200,000) to the DOD's budget for other department-specific personnel that may be required by creating another department.

Officials from the **Office of the Secretary of State (SOS)** note many bills considered by the General Assembly include provisions allowing or requiring agencies to submit rules and regulations to implement the act. The Secretary of State's office is provided with core funding to handle a certain amount of normal activity resulting from each year's legislative session. The fiscal impact for this fiscal note to Secretary of State's office for Administrative Rules is less than \$5,000. The Secretary of State's office recognizes that this is a small amount and does not expect that additional funding would be required to meet these costs. However, they also recognize that many such bills may be passed by the General Assembly in a given year and that collectively the costs may be in excess of what their office can sustain with their core budget. Therefore, they reserve the right to request funding for the cost of supporting administrative rules requirements should the need arise based on a review of the finally approved bills signed by the governor.

**Oversight** assumes the SOS could absorb the costs of printing and distributing regulations related to this proposal. If multiple bills pass which require the printing and distribution of regulations at substantial costs, the SOS could require additional resources.

In response to similar legislation from 2020 (HB 2209), officials from the **Governor's Office** stated this proposal creates the "Department of Defense" and grants authority to the Governor to appoint a director, by and with advice and consent of the senate. There should be no added cost to the Governor's Office as a result of this measure.

**Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact on the fiscal note for this agency.

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Officials from the **Department of Public Safety - Office of the Director**, the **Missouri Senate**, and the **Office of Administration** each assume the proposal will have no fiscal impact on their respective organizations.

**Oversight** does not have any information to the contrary. Therefore, Oversight will reflect a zero impact in the fiscal note for these agencies.

**Oversight** will range the fiscal impact of the transfer from \$0 (joint resolution is rejected by the voters) to the annual appropriation for the Department of Public Safety - Office of the Adjutant General being transferred out of the Department of Public Safety to the new department.

Since the transfer would be effective January 1, 2022, Oversight will reflect six months of impact in FY 2022.

## FISCAL DESCRIPTION

Beginning December 31, 2021, this bill creates a "Department of Defense" and transfers the powers, duties, and functions vested in the Office of Adjutant General, the state militia, and the Office of the State Judge Advocate from the Department of Public Safety, via Type I transfer.

This bill has an effective date contingent upon the passage and approval by the voters of an amendment to the Constitution creating a Department of Defense.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
