## **FISCAL ANALYSIS**

#### **ASSUMPTION**

Officials from the **Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC)** assume the proposal will have an unknown negative impact.

**Oversight** notes currently, a resident landowner must be a resident of Missouri who does not claim any resident privileges (e.g. hunting, fishing, trapping, driver's license, registered voter, etc.) in another state or country; and whose legal residence or domicile have been in the state of Missouri for at least 30 days prior to obtaining a landowner permit.

If a person meets one of the following conditions below, that person is eligible to receive <u>no-cost</u> resident landowner permits:

- Must own at least 20 contiguous acres of land.
- Must be an immediate household member of a resident landowner who owns at least 20 contiguous acres of land.
- Must be a general partner of a resident limited liability partnership, limited partnership, or limited liability limited partnership, or a general partner of a general partnership formed by written agreement and the partnership must own at least 20 contiguous acres of land.
- Must be an officer of a resident or foreign corporation and the corporation must own at least 20 contiguous acres of land.
- Must be a managing member of a resident limited liability company and the company must own at least 20 contiguous acres of land.
- Must be an officer of a benevolent association organized pursuant to Chapter 352 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri and the association must own at least 20 contiguous acres of land.
- Must be an immediate household member of general partner of a partnership, an officer of a resident or foreign corporation, an officer or managing member of a resident limited liability company, or an officer of a benevolent association organized pursuant to Chapter 352 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri when the before mentioned organization owns at least 20 contiguous acres of land.

Currently, a landowner must complete a Landowner Permit Application to submit the property before obtaining landowner permits.

**Oversight** notes this proposal removes this provision; therefore, Oversight assumes MDC will incur savings from not having to process and verify these applications. Oversight will reflect an "Unknown" savings to the Conservation Commission Fund.

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**Oversight** notes this proposal directs MDC to issue any landowner hunting permit requested by a resident or nonresident landowner who owns at least five acres of real property. Currently, a resident landowner must own 20 acres of contiguous acres of land and a nonresident landowner must own at least 75 contiguous acres of land. Nonresident landowners who qualify are eligible to receive <u>reduced-cost</u> nonresident landowner permits.

**Oversight** is not able to determine how many resident and nonresident landowner hunting permits were issued in 2020.

Until Oversight can get additional information from the MDC, Oversight will utilize their Unknown negative fiscal impact response.

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## FISCAL IMPACT - Small Business

## FISCAL DESCRIPTION

This bill prohibits the Department of Conservation from requiring a landowner to register his or her property before receiving any landowner hunting permit or possess a permit to take wildlife on his or her property. The Conservation Commission must issue landowner hunting permits requested by any resident or nonresident landowner who owns at least five acres of real property.

This legislation is not federally mandated, would not duplicate any other program and would not require additional capital improvements or rental space.
