AN ACT

To amend chapter 115, RSMo, by adding thereto one new section relating to voters who are visually impaired.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Missouri, as follows:

Section A. Chapter 115, RSMo, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be 2 known as section 115.1000, to read as follows:

115.1000. 1. (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an election authority with more than three hundred fifty thousand residents shall make available for all statewide elections, elections for the general assembly, or local elections at least one voting machine per polling location for use by voters who are blind or visually impaired.

5 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an election authority with fewer 6 than three hundred fifty thousand residents shall make available for all statewide elections, 7 elections for the general assembly, or local elections at least one voting machine for use by 8 voters who are blind or visually impaired.

9 (3) For purposes of this section, each election authority shall be presumed to possess 10 an accessible voting machine for purposes of compliance with the Help America Vote Act, 11 and such machine shall be made available at state and local elections in the same manner 12 as for federal elections.

Any additional election costs for the maintenance and use of such machines
during statewide and general assembly elections shall be paid by the state and subject to
appropriation.
