HB 1088 -- MULTIJURISDICTIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

SPONSOR: Hovis

COMMITTEE ACTION: Voted "Do Pass" by the Standing Committee on Crime Prevention by a vote of 9 to 0. Voted "Do Pass" by the Standing Committee on Rules- Administrative Oversight by a vote of 13 to 0.

This bill establishes the "Task Force on Multijurisdictional Data Sharing", which will, among other tasks and objectives specified in the bill, explore secure and efficient methods for sharing data with law enforcement agencies in multiple jurisdictions. The bill specifies of which individuals the Task Force will be composed and requires the Task Force to first meet within 30 days of its creation. Thereafter, it can meet as frequently as is necessary to accomplish its goals. The Task Force must develop recommendations for the development and implementation of an effective mechanism for statewide data sharing. The Task Force will expire on December 31, 2023.

PROPONENTS: Supporters say that this is not meant to change what is already being done but this is an important step for the legislature to take.

Testifying for the bill were Representative Hovis; Arnie C. Dienoff Tiffany Marler, Nomoretears 21:4, and Special Forces of Liberty.

OPPONENTS: There was no opposition voiced to the committee.
