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To: Missouri House Emerging Issues Committee Re: Written Testimony in Support, Missouri HB 1335 Date: April 6, 2021 Jackson County CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) supports House Bill 1335, which temporarily extends and expands foster care for young adults beyond 21 and allows reentry into foster for those who have "aged-out" during this COVID-19 pandemic and public health emergency. Jackson County CASA is a legal and social service advocacy organization that represents children, birth to 21, in foster care under the jurisdiction of the 16th Circuit Court of Jackson County, Family Court Division. Recognizing the unique vulnerability of our older youth, especially those youth who "age out" not having achieved permanency in a family-based setting, we also offer extended support services for our former youth up to age 26. The COVID-19 pandemic has disproportionately impacted young people who are in or have experienced foster care. These youth have faced disruptions in their access to basic income, continuing their education, safe and stable housing, and health care services. In response to this crisis, Congress passed and President Trump signed on December 27, 2020, the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, Public Law 116-94, which contains H.R. 7947, the Supporting Foster Youth and Families Through the Pandemic Act. This law provides an incredible opportunity to meet the urgent needs of young people, as well as providing child welfare agencies the increased capacity and funding to do so. It provides a moratorium on aging out, a requirement for re-entry and \$400 million in Chafee funds, including \$50 million for Education and Training Vouchers or Grants (ETV). Missouri is likely to receive \$10 million in additional Chafee funds. This federal law has been in effect for over three months and Missouri has yet to implement its provisions. Accordingly, Missouri House Bill 1335 is a much needed step toward fulfilling the intent of the law and meeting the immediate and urgent needs of current and former foster youth during this pandemic—youth who are/were entrusted to the State's care and who cannot reasonably rely on the support of family. Like so many, our current and former older foster youth have struggled tremendously during this pandemic. Unlike many, however, the State has or had been the only or at least primary source of stability and support for many years. These young people, therefore, need Missouri to respond quickly to fulfill its obligations and meet their needs. Several surveys have been conducted nation-wide illuminating their struggles. One study found that half of the participants reported COVID-19 negatively impacted their living situation; three-quarters reported that their financial situation would be stable for no more than one month; fifty-five percent reported food insecurity; another almost half reported a negative impact on their employment; two-thirds reported a negative impact on their educational progress or attainment; and over half reported symptoms of depression and anxiety. https://fieldcenteratpenn.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/10/Foster-Youth-COVID-19-

Similar findings certainly hold true in Missouri.More specifically, all three of our CASA youth who "aged-out" after April 1, 2020, have experienced significant hardships during the pandemic. One of those individuals, a young mother, said "it could not have been a worse time to age out of care." All three lost their jobs during the initial round of shutdowns and business closures. One lost opportunities to further her education and training as a medical assistant due to the lack of externships and job placement opportunities. Two of the three struggled with childcare issues, which consequently impacted job opportunities. All three faced food insecurity and had to borrow money or otherwise rely on friends to pay their rent and other expenses. This opportunity to assist these young people could be life-changing. They need this relief now. Neighboring states like Illinois, Kentucky, and Nebraska have implemented the aging-out moratorium, re-entry, and Chafee provisions, and have or will soon begin distributing financial assistance. States as diverse as Pennsylvania, Minnesota, and Arizona have also implemented provisions or are quickly moving forward. These are examples that Missouri can easily follow without having to reinvent the wheel or wait for more guidance. Moreover, while the law was intended to encourage and allow states to be as responsive as possible during the pandemic and reach the largest number of young people, it does allow the state to use allotted Chafee funds without a state match in many circumstances, including direct payments to youth. I urge this committee, and the Missouri Legislature more broadly, to take action now by compelling the Children's Division to act through the passage of this House Bill 1335. 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Our office (Office of the Guardian ad Litem, Jackson County Family Court) represents approximately half of the children in foster care in Jackson County. We have almost 50 youth that would benefit from this law. Many of our older youth have struggled as a result of the co-vid pandemic. This bill would help them in this time by allowing them to remain in foster care or to return to foster care. No state funds will be required to implement this bill because the federal government provided additional money through The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021, Public Law 116-94 to fund youth's needs. It is my understanding that the Department of Social Services believes that it cannot comply with this law or access any of the available dollars because of Missouri law that say that foster care ends no later than the youth's 21st birthday. As a result youth are facing homelessness and other challenges. In addition, this bill is needed because at least one division of the Jackson County Family Court has recently released several individuals turning 21 years old from the Court's jurisdiction. Although the Court ordered Children's Division to comply with the federal law in its orders releasing jurisdiction, the lack of continued court jurisdiction means that Children's Division is not held accountable for its compliance with the federal law, or lack thereof. As Children's Division has not offered to continue providing needed services to these young people, many individuals are currently without needed services and financial support, with no plan in place by Children's Division to ensure compliance with the federal law. This has tangible, detrimental effects on the young people who are cut off from supportive services. This bill would provide a clear directive to Children's Division to comply with the federal law and continue to provide much needed support to young people.
