and it was a great experience and something that we want our children to have the opportunity to compete in. We believe the MSHAA provides a great competitive environment for student athletes. We are writing to ask for support and passage of Bill SB 55. Our family has chosen to go the homeschool route, which we are fortunate to be able to homeschool our children. The removal of God from our schools is one of the leading factors in our decision to raise and educate our children from the safety and security of our own home. Thankfully, our school district allows for homeschool athletes to participate in varsity level athletics. That said, they do not allow Junior High participation which puts the student athlete at a disadvantage. One of the purposes of the bill is to standardize the requirements for participation across all Missouri School Districts and that is one reason we are writing to ask for support of SB55. The opportunity to compete at a high level and prepare for next level competition is a key reason we are seeking support for Bill SB 55. At this point in time home school athletic opportunities are not consistently available. There are opportunities however, they are limited and require major investments in time and financial commitments. Our family has participated in homeschool athletics for the past two seasons competing in Junior High and Varsity level basketball competitions. The first year our team was based locally, however some of the athletes were traveling close to an hour to and from for practice. This limited the amount of practice time the athletes could get together. Also, the competition in the area was very disappointing. The local league was comprised of 13-18 year olds. There is a big variance between a 13 year old and a 18 year old in athletic development and ability which it made for less than a desirable experience. The second year the team dissolved, and we located to another program in Northwest Arkansas that required a 90 minute commute one way. A great group, however numbers were an issue and again we found ourselves putting 13 and 14 olds against varsity athletes. We did find some good competition through the National Homeschool Basketball Association's District, Regional, and National Championships. The regular season competition and even the tournaments resembled more like traveling ball schedules with long road trips to find competition that entailed overnight stays. To join the Northwest Arkansas group we were traveling 100 miles each time we went to practice as well as participating in fundraisers. some in which we would begin at 7 pm and returning home at 6 in the morning. The fundraisers were to help with the costs of the tournaments, gym rentals, and other associated costs. With the limited numbers and long distance traveling, it limited the times the team could practice. Needless to say, there was a lot of investment in time and finances to provide a decent competitive environment for our student athlete to compete in. This year as we faced challenges with low numbers and thinking about the time commitment and financial commitment involved in playing another season in Northwest Arkansas and our family expecting a newborn in February, we reached out to our local school district

to see what their requirements were. Thankfully, Neosho Highs schools policy for Homes School participation is 2 credit hours, unlike some districts who require full or half time. This has allowed us to ioin their program as well as continuing to Homeschool. It has worked well for our family and has given our student athlete a great opportunity to further develop his athletic pursuits in basketball. He is now able to experience a high level of competition each week and is able to get more practice and playing time. And we as parents are thrilled to have less financial requirements to provide a high level of competition. Not all school districts have a uniformed policy, which is very frustrating. Each district in Missouri should have a uniformed set of requirements for Homeschooling students of ALL ages to participate in.In Conclusion it is our hope that SB55 has your support.Best Regards,Brian and Ashley Gunnels Dear Representatives, I am writing to ask for your support of Bill SB 55. These are the things that I have recognized as better opportunities that I am thankful to have by being able to participate in my local high school and still be homeschooled. I do not miss all of the driving we had to do to practice and find competition. It is also nice knowing that there is less financial burden on my parents. And another benefit is having transportation through the school with my team to the games if for some reason my parents were not available. And bus rides are a great opportunity to bond with my team. I am hopeful that the state will make the option to homeschool and join in on local junior high and high school athletics an option for all student athletes in the state of Missouri. Unfortunately the discrimination of homeschool students does not end with sports, they are banned from competing in any MSHSAA activity, such as speech and debate, band, musical recitals, and many other such activities. Last year, my local school required full-time enrollment for any sport BUT they had inconsistent policies when it came to Show Choir where one of my friends was not required to take any classes. HB 494 would fix this major problem as well.Many states have adopted equal access sports laws. None of them have ever reversed this decision, once it was made. These states include, among others, Iowa, Maine, Idaho, Arkansas, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Florida, and North Dakota. According to Education Week .orgQUOTE "Four out of five Americans believe homeschooled students should have the opportunity to participate in public school sports, according to a new poll from Gallup and Phi Delta Kappa...Public school parents were even more in support of the idea than the national sample, with 85 percent saying such students should be allowed to play." Now, there are those that have raised objections to this bill in the past. The first speaker covered the argument of eligibility and explained why it was not a valid complaint. I can revisit this if I need to, just ask me to during the questions. I have also heard the argument that home school students can already participate in extracurriculars as it is. In response to this I would like to inform the committee of two things. 1. MSHSAA has a complete ban on homeschool participation at the Junior High level2. MSHSAA's minimum requirement for homeschool highschool participation is two seated classes at the school. Now this may not seem too bad to some of you but with block scheduling this is a logistical nightmare and schools can be more restrictive. Last year, my school district required 100% attendance, thus requiring more than MSHSAA. Of the other schools in my area. two completely prohibit homeschool participation whatsoever, and the other schools that claim to allow it require the homeschool curriculum to be accredited by DESE, which does not accredit homeschool curriculum in MO.Something else I would like to add on this subject is the story of some friends of ours, who could not make it today. As a Rural cattle rancher Logan, who enjoys sports, always has a hard time finding a team to play on. Last year, Logan played on our homeschool basketball team, which was not competitive at all but it was the best in our area. In order to make it to practice he had to travel over an hour one way. And Logan had to travel even further to play our games, which were all out of town as we could not afford to rent a gym. This is for basketball. Now football is another story. The closest 11 man team was 1 and a half hours away, with games several hours further away than that. Logan really wanted to play football. So his parents decided to contact their local school district and ask about the policy regarding homeschool participation. The School District never responded to their repeated phone calls or other attempts to contact the school regarding the policy. They eventually decided to pay public school tuition for an out of district school that would allow Logan to participate while taking two classes. Unfortunately this school is not close to their home, and the tuition is very expensive. It has also been argued that public school students with failing grades will drop out and claim to homeschool so they can participate. This argument is inadequate because MSHSAA's own rules state that a student who is QUOTE "being expelled, or being forced to withdraw, from a school also causes 365 days of ineligibility for a student"Last year, Representative Deaton proposed this bill, and it was #1 on the house calendar to be voted on before COVID hit. So I am hoping that we can get this bill passed this year. I would like to thank Rep Basye for holding this hearing. I would like to thank Reps Baker and Stacy for cosponsoring HB 494. I would like to thank Reps Hill and Dogan for co-sponsoring similar bills in the past, and I would like to thank Rep Christofanelli and Chairman Basye for voting this bill out of committee two years ago. Last year, this very committee voted in favor of amending this bill onto an omnibus bill toward the end of session. Last year, the Senate Education committee unanimously passed similar legislation and it was the first bill passed by that committee this session. It is my hope that this bill pass this year as well, helping families like mine and my friends that I just told you about. There are only 20 people who can affect positive change right now, and those people are you, the members of this committee in summary, homeschool students should be granted the opportunity to participate in public school sports, cocurricular and extracurricular activities for three reasons: Parents, who homeschool their children, pay taxes. These parents choose to educate their children the way that works best for them. They should not be forced to choose between athletics and academics. Sharing these opportunities with homeschool students promotes unity in the community, encourages hard work, and increases the skill of local sports teams. Mike Singletary puts it best QUOTE "Do you know what my favorite part of the

game is? The opportunity to play."It is for these reasons, and many others, that I sincerely ask you to vote in favor of HB 494. This bill will give all tax-payers equal access to the government funded public schools. I would be happy to talk to you about any questions or concerns. Thank you for your time.

s my goal to provide my children with the best possible ( I sacrifice time, vast amounts of energy, money, and my personal interests and pursuits in favor of helping my children to achieve growth on academic, emotional, spiritual, and relational levels. I am currently in my 5th year of homeschooling and despite the challenges it presents, I couldn't be more pleased with the results I am seeing in the development of engaged, bright, hard-working, compassionate, and uniquely gifted humans who I know will be an asset to my community, state, nation, and world.In addition to the quality education and the many opportunities that I am able to provide my children without the use of our public school system. I know that there are aspects of that system that could contribute to the well-rounded education of my kids. As public school students ourselves, my husband and I were extremely involved in both athletics and other extracurricular organizations in our school which helped build character, promote a team spirit, and develop positive, enduring relationships. While I would say my best take-away from my time on the high school track and field team was the relationship that blossomed with my now-husband, it was also pretty exciting that he and I both set event records which still stand some 22 years later, and competed at the State level competition in various events. My husband was also a leading member of his football team and went on to earn athletic scholarships to play college football and also competed in college track. We both worked hard to become the best athletes we could be, and learned many other important lessons along the way. I provide this information to show how our history of participation and personal growth through sports makes us especially supportive of our children's athletic pursuits and the character development that they facilitate. Unfortunately, as things are today, my children will not have those same opportunities. Until the state passes legislation that creates equity for all children of tax-paying Missourians, including homeschooling families, athletic associations and the highly varied viewpoints of public school districts will continue to bar one segment of qualified, potential-filled children within

their borders from participating. I eagerly hope to see this inequity addressed for the good of all Missouri children. As small business owners and landowners, the taxes my household pays provide significant funding for our local school district. In December, I drove to our county courthouse and wrote a check which included 2.558.41 to our Lewis County C-1 School District. Over the 25-year span that I will have had school-aged children in the home, that really adds up! Because we choose to educate our children at home, we are paying into the pot but not personally benefiting from any of the services of the schools that we help fund. While this is a choice we are okay with on many levels. because we can provide a quality of education that we feel is worth the trade, we simply cannot fabricate the team experience with our little "team of five" and their diverse ages and interests. It is in the best interests of all children in Missouri to provide kids with equal opportunities to thrive, and allowing them to join the public school teams and extracurricular organizations that they are interested in is one step in that direction. No homeschooling family here to support this bill today is asking for special treatment or favors; we simply seek the availability of equal opportunities for our children that others paying the same taxes in our communities are already enjoying. The current rules for and against homeschool participation in public school athletics and other extracurriculars are inadequate and unfair. There are different rules for kids in different districts, and a complete ban on junior high participation-a formative time for young athletes! The MSHSAA's rules, when they do offer scraps of opportunity for homeschooled kids, are both logistically difficult as well as subject to the changing whims of the organization. The burden this places on taxpaying homeschooling families is unreasonable. These families should not have to seek out alternative athletic teams and opportunities when they are funding programs right at home should they want to utilize them. Simple solutions can be found to ensure that our children meet the grade and attendance requirements set by the school districts. Records can be furnished; documentation can be provided consistent with what public school children need to have to qualify for teams. Same communities, same taxes, same academic eligibility expectations. This is not too tall an order. Homeschool parents, well equipped in this communication age, are up for meeting the logistical challenges of having their children where they need to be for meetings, practices, and events. And true to our helicopter parenting stigma, you can bet that we will be great assets to booster clubs and fundraising efforts for our school district's teams in which our children participate. The high standards that many homeschooled children are held to at home make them excellent candidates for team settings. Homeschooled students have one-on-one instruction, tailored to their specific needs and strengths, to help them thrive in their educational pursuits. What's more, their parents provide them with many social opportunities to learn to engage with younger children, same- age peers, older students, adults, and the elderly. This unique strategy for learning to engage with the world around them means that the diverse abilities and perspectives of homeschooled children would lend strength to a team or group. It shouldn't be one or the other. It is in the best interest of the group to bring on a broader range of skills and personalities, and it is in the best interests of the children to provide a setting to develop those skills. I conclude in the hope that you will continue to fight for the equality and well-being of ALL Missouri children, including those who are homeschooled. As an engaged community member, a taxpayer, and an intentional parent, I hope that by the day my five children "come of age" to play sports and join other extracurricular groups, the unfair obstacles that currently prevent this from happening will have been completely removed. In fact, I hope it happens much sooner than that, and the passing of HB494 will make that a reality. I know that my community will benefit from the strengths of my children, and that my children will benefit from the team experience. It is a win-win! MSHSAA also provides two avenues by which a home schooled student can participate fully in all events. Those are referenced in the above paragraph.Other Attendance Related Considerations Public school students receive a minimum of 1044 hours of instruction each year, and many public schools have made the local decision to require additional hours above the minimum. Many local school boards have also set attendance policies that students must meet to be eligible for extracurricular or co-curricular activities, as well as grade point minimums for participation. Section 167.031 states that the home school must offer 1000 hours of instruction, not that a student must complete 1000 hours of instruction. Under current statute, it is possible for a home schooled student to complete the requirements for high school graduation after only 1600 hours of instruction. An average public-school student completes over 4000 hours of instruction spread over four years. If MSHSAA or the school requires certain academic/attendance minimums, how can we know if the home school student has met that level or not? The parents are put in an inherent conflict of interest because they want their children to participate, but are also responsible for certifying the student's eligibility. There is also a reverse version of this abuse that is possible. What if a student cannot meet the eligibility requirements in school? What is to stop a parent from putting them in a home school setting so they can immediately become eligible and then participate? Concern Number Three: School funding inequity.HB494 2 states: "the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education shall withhold payments under section 163.031 for any district in violation of this section." Withheld funds can be released to the district after showing proof to the state board of education "that the school district has ceased membership in the association and has ceased remission of any funds to said association." Based on the state funding formula, which includes weighted average daily attendance data, this change in policy would negatively impact school district funding. This section imposes a huge penalty to school districts, with the loss of educational funds for ALL the students in the district, not just the funds which support the activities of the students. In addition, home schooled students would receive the benefit of the activity/sport, but because they are not counted in the daily attendance they will not be adding to the funding that supports the activity/sport.ConclusionThe Missouri Music Educators Association believes that ALL students in Missouri are deserving of an education that maintains high accountability standards. We believe that home schooled students are just as capable as public school students of reaching the current attendance and grade requirements. We believe that HB494 will harm both public school and home schooled students, and hinder us in providing a well-rounded education for all Missouri students. These activities are connected with academic courses and are organized or designed to help the students have a better understanding of the course.3. Extra-curricular activities refer to those activities which are outside the realm of normal curriculum, but are essential for the all-around

development of the students. While a quiz bowl, math competition, 'spell bee', music festival, or concert for a school performing ensemble, etc, are 'Co-curricular activities', sports are 'Extracurricular activities, adapted from the Stack Exchange 4. The proposed amendment which addresses Co-Curricular participation (marching band, choir, theatre) address the primary issue that MAAE has with this section of the bill. HB494 1..."statewide activities association" though not clearly stated, implies the Missouri State High School Activities Association (MSHSAA). MSHSAA was established by schools in 1926. Currently MSHSAA includes 594 high schools and 150 junior high schools across the state and includes 81 private schools as members. No school is required to be a member, and there is no membership fee to join MSHSAA. MSHSAA is governed by a Board of Directors which includes school administrators from across the state. In addition, there are advisory committees made up of administrators and educators from across the state specific to each activity. The MSHSAA Handbook containing the Constitution and By-Laws and all of the rules that oversee student eligibility and competitive equity are voted into place by the member schools. These rules are revised annually. The By-Laws work together to allow the schools themselves to self-govern and provide competitive equity. Missouri State High School Activities Association MSHSAA regulations govern Sports and Activities (Music Activities, Scholar Bowl, Speech and Debate, Spirit Activities). Sports and Spirit Activities are most often extracurricular programs, while the remainder of the Activities are co-curricular. Students involved in these programs who wish to participate in competitive events must meet MSHSAA minimum eligibility requirements. Many school districts also adopt the MSHSAA eligibility requirements or set higher local requirements for participation in other school activities, (clubs, school royalty, etc) and other events and activities that are not interscholastic events. HB494 1 (2) Attendance requirements cannot be applied to home school students. The bill states that home school students cannot be required to attend "for any portion of a school day" in order to participate. MSHSAA rules were updated four years ago provide flexibility for home school students and provide two possible paths towards participation. 1. Enroll in accredited online curriculum/credit that the school approves and agrees to transcript, without attending school at all.2. Enroll in two seated classes at the school which are transcripted, and the rest in home schooling to meet the 80% total credit requirement that all students meet. These two paths could work for extra-curricular activities (sports etc.) which take place outside of the normal school day and are not tied to a specific course offered during the school day. Attendance at school is only one factor in eligibility to represent the school in activities. In fact, many enrolled students who attend school, are not eligible to represent their school due to failing to meet one or more of the minimum requirements. Following are a sample of the minimum requirements voted on by the member schools that make up MSHSAA. • being a good citizen (2.2 MSHSAA Handbook) • meeting the minimum academic standard (2.3 MSHSAA Handbook) • overage student (3.5 MSHSAA Handbook) • fifth year senior (2.4 MSHSAA Handbook)• transferring schools for athletic reasons Many schools have more restrictive requirements for students that go beyond the MSHSAA minimum requirements listed above (i.e. no "F" policy, GPA, higher citizenship standards, attendance policies, etc.). The ability to participate in activities is a very motivating factor for many students. Requirements for eligibility to participate result in higher attendance, higher graduation rates, and help ensure students a well-rounded educational experience that prepares them to meet the demands of the 21st century. The majority of music programs and speech and debate would fall in to the co-curricular category where the teaching and education is part of a course which occurs during the school day. In-seat participation in these courses would be necessary in order for students to receive and benefit from the instruction. Currently home school students enrolled in these courses could still participate in a number of local events and performances that are not interscholastic competitions. By being a part of the ensemble, they become part of the community and can go on to meet the minimum requirements for full participation as previously outlined above. MSHSAA District and State Festivals and District and State Honor EnsemblesSchool music programs have a limited number of audition spots for district choir/band auditions, as well as a limit on entries for students in the solo and small ensemble district music festivals. Because of these limits, even students enrolled in school bands and choirs (some for multiple years) have to go through a pre-selection process in order to get one of these audition spots. Making these activities open to homeschool students who are not part of the curricular music program further complicates this problem. There are also entry limitations for other activities (Speech and Theatre) which raise the same issues. Other Attendance Related Considerations Public school students receive a minimum of 1044 hours of instruction each year, and many public schools have made the local decision to require additional hours above the minimum. Many local school boards have also set attendance policies that students must meet in order to be eligible for extracurricular or co-curricular activities, as well as grade point minimums for participation. Section 167.031 (2) As evidence that a child is receiving regular instruction, the parent shall, except as otherwise provided in this subsection: (a) Maintain the following records: a. A plan

book, diary, or other written record indicating subjects taught and activities engaged in; and b. A portfolio of samples of the child's academic work; and c. A record of evaluations of the child's academic progress; or d. Other written, or credible evidence equivalent to subparagraphs a., b. and c.: and (b) Offer at least one thousand hours of instruction, at least six hundred hours of which will be in reading, language arts, mathematics, social studies and science or academic courses that are related to the aforementioned subject areas and consonant with the pupil's age and ability. At least four hundred of the six hundred hours shall occur at the regular home school location. (3) The requirements of subdivision (2) of this subsection shall not apply to any pupil above the age of sixteen years.167.031 Item (3) exempts any student above the age of 16 from meeting even the 1000 hours of "offered instruction." Item (5) below indicates that a parent only has to provide a written statement that the pupil is attending home school in order to meet the attendance requirement. 5. The production by a parent of a daily log showing that a home school has a course of instruction which satisfies the requirements of this section or, in the case of a pupil over the age of sixteen years who attended a metropolitan school district the previous year, a written statement that the pupil is attending home school in compliance with this section shall be a defense to any prosecution under this section and to any charge or action for educational neglect brought pursuant to chapter 210. This is inequitable since the student enrolled in school would have to meet the standards set by the local school board for attendance as well as grading, while the home school student is not only exempted from these standards, but if above the age of 16 not held to any reportable standard. HB494 2 states: "the department of elementary and secondary education shall withhold payments under section 163.031 for any district in violation of this section." Withheld funds can be released to the district after showing proof to the state board of education "that the school district has ceased membership in the association and has ceased remission of any funds to said association." Since MSHSAA does not charge any membership fee to schools, the only funds in question would be registration and participation fees to be part of the various activities. In many music programs across the state these fees are paid by individual students, parents, or booster organizations. So all state aid would be withheld from a district as punishment for the district being part of an association designed to protect and provide equitable treatment for the students of the district involved in activities? This section provides for a huge penalty for the district, with the loss of all educational funds for the student. Not just the funds which support the activities of the students. HB494 3 opens the door for school districts to compete with other school districts without any regulations or rules to govern these activities or the students participating in them. The current MSHSAA Handbook is 160 pages long. 160 pages of rules and regulations to provide a safe and equitable experience for our students involved in interscholastic activities. The system isn't perfect, but it provides very necessary rules and regulations, along with a system to approve and implement suggested changes and improvements on an annual basis. Section 3 removes the governance provided by MSHSAA for all MSHSAA activities, but provides no replacement for the current structure provided by MSHSAA. Local ControlMAAE recognizes the right of parents to home school their children as they see fit and strongly advocate that home school parents consider including a comprehensive arts education for their students in addition to the subject areas listed in 167.031. In many school districts, home school students currently have access to classes offered during the school day subject to local school board guidelines. It is possible for home school students to attend, fine arts classes or other academic classes of their choosing, as long as they follow district guidelines. This alone does not make them eligible for activities governed by the Missouri State High School Activities Association. All students participating in MSHSAA governed activities must meet the MSHSAA eligibility requirements, whether it is speech and theatre, music ensembles, or extracurricular MSHSAA governed sports. School districts devote considerable resources to planning sequentially in all subjects, including the arts. Co-curricular activities and extracurricular programs that occur outside of the school day provide a strong complement to the total school curriculum provided to students. They are intended to build the school community and enhance the learning outcomes in each school. School districts must be provided the autonomy to provide for an appropriate education that guarantees the safety and learning outcomes for the students in their schools. Choice – Parents make a choice to home school their children. This is their right. By making this choice, they are choosing not to participate in available public or private school programs. In order to have the privilege to participate in co-curricular and extracurricular programs governed by MSHSAA, they should have to meet the eligibility requirements put in place by the member schools. Personal Anecdote: I know of several families who chose to send their children to public school in high school in order for their children to have access to the co-curricular and extracurricular programs offered in the school. I have also had homeschool students attend school just for choir or music theory classes. They were allowed to be a part of the class and participate in local (non MSHSAA governed) concerts and performances, but because they did not meet the additional MSHSAA requirements for eligibility, they could not participate in interscholastic MSHSAA governed activities. Taxes and state support for public educationAll residents of a community support the public schools

through their payment of property taxes. This is a part of the funds provided to local school districts. A portion of the public school budget comes from state support which is determined not just by student enrollment in classes, but from their actual attendance in classes. To allow students to participate in extra-curricular programs without being enrolled and attending school classes allows them to have the benefits of the program without the school receiving the resources through state funding which help to make these programs possible. Alternative Community Based ProgramsMany parents have formed homes school group programs to offer their children opportunities in music. sports, theatre, and many other areas within their communities. There are rules in place to allow organized home school group programs to participate in some MSHSAA activities and events. There are also a number of community-based programs which are open to children regardless of their educational affiliation. Personal Anecdote: The Rolla Community Children's Choir and the RCAS Jazz Choir are examples of community-based programs. In an average year the choir is made up of home school, parochial school, and public school children. Homeschool singers in these community-based programs have the opportunity to audition for honor ensembles at the state, divisional, and national levels. They are not eligible to participate in MSHSAA governed musical events, like district and state music festival, or district and state choir. Rolla is also fortunate to have a local drama/theatre company primarily for homeschool families (but open to others) for kids interested in drama and theatre. HB494 provides the potential for abuse and conflicts of interest. Home school credits and public school achievement levels don't correlate directly. Under current statute, it is possible for a home school student to complete the requirements for high school graduation after only 1600 hours of instruction. An average public school students would complete over 4000 hours of instruction spread over four years. If MSHSAA or the school requires certain academic/attendance minimums, how can we know if the home school student has met that level or not? The parents are put in an inherent conflict of interest because they are the ones who want their children to participate, but are also the ones responsible for certifying the students eligibility. There is also a reverse version of this abuse that is possible. What if a student cannot meet the eligibility requirements in school? They cannot pass enough courses to make them academically eligible, or don't meet the school districts attendance policy. What is to stop a parent from putting them in a home school setting so they can immediately become eligible and then participate? Additional Equity issues. Fairness to public school students—if the home school student now is part of a team, or cast, or music ensemble with limited enrollment, where they might never have been allowed to participate. What happens to the public school student who would have been in that spot? A student who went to class, made the good grades, wants to play and is good enough to make the team until another previously ineligible student shows up to knock them off the roster, or cast list, or depth chart, is now no longer allowed to participate. Final observationOne important reason home schools exist is because parents are trying to protect their children from over-regulation and loss of parental control of a child's education. That is a commendable goal. So, why would they now want to subject their child to one of the most highlyregulated parts of the education system. Rules within rules exist in sports, music and speech contests. Reporting requirements for a student's regular education work are onerous and complex. In all likelihood, they would require the parent-educator to revise their curriculum to meet certain state imposed requirements. The potential for loss of the independence of choice, which the parent originally sought, is huge. It would seem that home school advocates would especially want to keep their distance from this part of public education.
