House Children and Families CommitteeHB852Position: AgainstApril 7, 2021My name is Dr. Mae Winchester and I am a board-certified obstetrician-gynecologist living in Kansas City, Missouri. I also have a master's degree in biomedical science and currently am involved in perinatal research. Some of the most common problems encountered during pregnancy relate to a poorly functioning placenta. The placenta is the connection between mother and fetus, where nutrient and gas exchange occurs. A fetus cannot be healthy unless the placenta is also healthy. A poorly functioning placenta can cause fetuses to have significant growth restriction and a significantly increased risk of stillbirth. It increases a mother's chance of cesarean section and hypertensive disorders of pregnancy, which can be lifethreatening. While we know that the placenta has the power to cause these catastrophic problems, we don't actually fully understand how the placenta works and what causes it to function poorly. Management of the problems I described has not changed much in the last 50 years, because safe, well -designed research takes time. Many of the research techniques currently being used to study problems that develop during pregnancy use tissue, sometimes from abortion, that would have otherwise been discarded. Using tissue from miscarriages is not always feasible because miscarried pregnancies are often "abnormal" pregnancies - meaning there were issues with implantation, genetic problems, birth defects, or any of a multitude of issues that can contribute to a miscarriage. Similarly, animal studies can help us potentially understand human pregnancy, but are not a substitute. This leaves tissue from abortion as one of few potential sources of "normal" placenta to study. We cannot understand a problematic placenta until we understand a well-functioning placenta. Without research, we cannot improve the lives of mothers and their children. As a physician-scientist, invested in the well-being of my patients, I oppose any legislation that will limit research that has the potential to save lives in the future.I encourage you to vote no on HB852.Mae Winchester, MD

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April 7, 2021House Committee on Children and Families Chair ColemanHB 852Dear Honorable Committee Members: Thank you for allowing me to provide written testimony today. On behalf of the American Civil Liberties Union of Missouri and our approximately 15,000 supporters statewide, I would like to express our opposition to HB 852. HB 852 is redundant and further stigmatizes access to care. Under current law, "Public funds shall not be expended, paid, or granted to or on behalf of an existing or proposed research project that involves abortion services, human cloning, or prohibited human research." If that were to occur, the entity providing the funding could be subject to a lawsuit. By placing this language in Chapter 188, similar penalties apply. In fact, RsMO 188.220 specifies that "Any taxpayer of this state or its political subdivisions shall have standing to bring suit in a circuit court of proper venue to enforce the provisions of sections 188,200 to 188,215. This bill is not necessary to counter the concerns brought by the sponsor. Moreover, Missouri should move beyond stigmatizing research. Research studies surrounding abortion have the capacity to improve care options and develop new strategies that would aid Missouri residents seeking abortion. There is research that focuses on how to increase safety in abortion procedures. There is research that concerns the effects abortion in developing countries. There is research that studies abortion in situations where a pregnant person's life is in danger. Defunding all abortion research under the broad definition provided in statute would not necessarily reduce the frequency of this procedure; rather, it would stymie efforts that could make this constitutionally protected procedure safer. Efforts like HB 852 could enhance threats to research on contraceptive care in Missouri. Research projects on contraceptive care could be shut down for being affiliated with abortion providers or studying devices that make not allow the implantantion of fertilized eggs which some legislators, including those in the Missouri Senate, are redefining as abortion. Studies show that access to contraceptive care has great benefits for people. A 2014 article finds that women who have legal access to contraceptive care by age 20 reduces the likelihood of that woman living in poverty by up to 12.2 percentage points. A study conducted by researchers from Washington University's School of Medicine found that providing contraceptive care to the public reduces unwanted pregnancy and abortion rates by at least 62%. Contraceptive care is incredibly important and creating more laws that stigmatize abortion research could result in withdrawing funding from this work as well. I urge you to vote "no" on this legislation. Thank you again for your consideration. April 7, 2021The Honorable Mary Elizabeth ColemanChair, House Children and Families CommitteeJefferson City, MO Re: Opposition to HB 431 and HB 852Dear Chair Coleman and Members of the Committee:On behalf of the American Society for Reproductive Medicine (ASRM), I write to oppose HB 431 and HB 852, bills that amount to a thinly veiled attempt to disrupt and, ultimately, eradicate access to a safe, medically accepted and legal procedure and do nothing to improve the lives or health of Missourians. These ill-conceived bills, part of a national effort to stigmatize abortion patients, burden healthcare providers, and ultimately end access to legal abortion altogether, could have a direct and negative impact on patients undergoing treatment for infertility. ASRM is a multidisciplinary organization of nearly 8,000 professionals dedicated to the advancement of science and practice of reproductive medicine. Distinguished members of ASRM include obstetricians and gynecologists, urologists, reproductive endocrinologists, embryologists, mental health professionals and others. Infertility, recognized by the American Medical Association and the World Health Organization as a disease that impacts as many as 7.3 million couples in the United States can. untreated, upend the dream of building a family. Policymakers may not understand the complexities and the inefficiencies inherent in human reproduction. Medical professionals and lab personnel working in concert to treat infertility patients know these complexities all too well. Treatments of infertility are highly specialized and individualized. At a time when the strains on our national and state health care systems have, perhaps, never been clearer, it makes no policy sense to add additional barriers to quality care. Missouri should not be legislating new barriers to care in the midst of a global pandemic that has cost hundreds of thousands of American lives. If, in fact, Missouri is interested in delving into the complex reality of providing oversight for medical research and therapies involving human reproductive tissues, we, as experts, stand ready to inform a deliberative, medically necessary and evidence-based effort. In the interim, we urge you to oppose HB 431 and HB 852, each of which does nothing to protect or help patients and which singles out and irresponsibly politicizes and stigmatizes a safe, proven medical procedure. 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While visiting my parents in New Jersey from my home in St. Louis county, I discovered I was 6 weeks pregnant. My husband had left to work in Canada for his employer, McDonell Douglas for a period of a couple of months. I had decided to stay with my parents because I was caring for our 2 young children of 19 months and 7 months. Taking care of them was overwhelming because we had no family in St. Louis. The pregnancy was a complete surprise since our two children were planned and I was using proven contraception, an IUD, to prevent another pregnancy. When the pregnancy was confirmed, I needed health care. After some research we learned that abortion services were legal and available in New York through my old pediatrician. On the day of my procedure, my mother took care of my boys and my mother-in-law, took me to the city and brought me back to my parents' house. My decision was based on my inability to care for 3 children so close in age halfway across the country from any family, my desire for a career which I had just begun to formalize and my sense that my life and my needs were most important. Taking care of myself should not be shameful. My body was not intended to only be a vessel for childbirth. My life is mine to be lived as I see fit. It is wrong to stigmatize and harass women who want to have the healthcare needed to live their lives on their own terms. My sons grew up in a loving family in St. Louis County. They are college educated and doing well in their careers. They are now married young men with families of their own. We have six beautiful, wanted grandchildren all living nearby. I never regretted my decision to raise 2 wanted children and no more. I oppose any legislation that signals out abortion for any unnecessary restrictions. A woman should be able to control how many children she chooses to raise.
