bill allows gas companies to recoup their investments in infrastructure through an "automatic adjustment clause." This means they can bill customers on a monthly basis without oversight by the Public Service Commission. Utilities must be required to justify the prudence of their expenditures in rate cases before the Commission. The absence of this protection exposes customers to being billed for imprudent investments and cost overruns that could later be disapproved by the Commission. This bill will increase the methane released in the agricultural supply chain, increase the threats to water bodies in Missouri and beyond, and will increase the cost of captive monopoly gas customers who are effectively providing a subsidy to monopoly gas utilities because they have to start paying before a service is provided. I have sent the same testimony, with footnotes, to the members of the committee.
