15	(19) "Multistate licensing process", any agreement entered into by and among state regulators

18	change of key individuals;
19	(20) "NMLS", the Nationwide Multistate Licensing System and Registry developed by the

22	licensing and registration of persons in financial services industries;
23	(21) "Outstanding money transmission obligations":

37	under Section 13 of the U.S. Securities Exchange Act of 1934, 15 U.S.C. Section 78m, as amended or
38	recodified from time to time; or
39	(b) A corporation publicly traded outside the United States, a copy of similar documentation filed

1	with the regulator of the parent corporation's domicile outside the United States;
2	(10) The name and address of the applicant's registered agent in this state;
3	(11) A list of any material litigation in which the applicant has been involved in the ten-year period
4	next preceding the submission of the application; and

21	2. If a licensee fails to forward money received for transmission in accordance with this section, the
22	licensee shall respond to inquiries by the sender with the reason for the failure unless providing a response
23	would violate a state or federal law, rule, or regulation.
24	<u>361.987. 1. This section shall not apply to:</u>
25	(1) Money received for transmission subject to the federal Remittance Rule, 12 C.F.R. Part 1005,
26	Subpart B, as amended or recodified from time to time; or
27	(2) Money received for transmission under a written agreement between the licensee and payee to
28	process payments for goods or services provided by the payee.
29	2. Every licensee shall refund to the sender within ten days of receipt of the sender's written request
30	for a refund any and all money received for transmission unless any of the following occurs:
31	(1) The money has been forwarded within ten days of the date on which the money was received for
32	transmission;
33	(2) Instructions have been given committing an equivalent amount of money to the person
34	designated by the sender within ten days of the date on which the money was received for transmission;
35	(3) The agreement between the licensee and the sender instructs the licensee to forward the money at
36	a time that is beyond ten days of the date on which the money was received for transmission. If funds have
37	not yet been forwarded in accordance with the terms of the agreement between the licensee and the sender,
38	the licensee shall issue a refund in accordance with the other provisions of this section;
39	(4) The refund is requested for a transaction that the licensee has not completed based on a

1	reasonable belief or a reasonable basis to believe that a crime or violation of law, rule, or regulation has

3	(5) The refund request does not enable the licensee to:
4	(a) Identify the sender's name and address or telephone number; or
5	(b) Identify the particular transaction to be refunded in the event the sender has multiple transactions
6	outstanding.
7	361.990. 1. This section shall not apply to:
8	(1) Money received for transmission subject to the federal Remittance Rule, 12 C.F.R. Part 1005,
9	Subpart B, as amended or recodified from time to time;
10	(2) Money received for transmission that is not primarily for personal, family, or household
11	purposes;
12	(3) Money received for transmission under a written agreement between the licensee and payee to
13	process payments for goods or services provided by the payee; or
14	(4) Payroll processing services.
15	2. For purposes of this section, "receipt" means a paper receipt, electronic record, or other written
16	confirmation. For a transaction conducted in person, the receipt may be provided electronically if the sender
17	requests or agrees to receive an electronic receipt. For a transaction conducted electronically or by phone, a
18	receipt may be provided electronically. All electronic receipts shall be provided in a retainable form.
19	3. (1) Every licensee or its authorized delegate shall provide the sender a receipt for money received
20	for transmission. The receipt shall contain the following information, as applicable:

33	361.996. 1. A licensee that provides payroll processing services shall:
34	(1) Issue reports to clients detailing client payroll obligations in advance of the payroll funds being
35	deducted from an account; and
36	(2) Make available worker paystubs or an equivalent statement to workers.
37	2. Subsection 1 of this section shall not apply to a licensee providing payroll processing services if
38	the licensee's client designates the intended recipients to the licensee and is responsible for providing the

39 <u>disclosures required by subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of this section.</u>

1	361.999. 1. A licensee under sections 361.900 to 361.1035 shall maintain at all times a tangible net
2	worth of the greater of one hundred thousand dollars or three percent of total assets for the first one hundred
3	million dollars, two percent of additional assets for one hundred million dollars to one billion dollars, and
4	one-half of one percent of additional assets for over one billion dollars.
5	2. Tangible net worth shall be demonstrated at initial application by the applicant's most recent
6	audited or unaudited financial statements under subdivision (6) of subsection 2 of section 361.936.
7	361.1002. 1. An applicant for a money transmission license shall provide, and a licensee at all times
8	shall maintain, security consisting of a surety bond in a form satisfactory to the commissioner.
9	2. The amount of the required security shall be:
10	(1) The greater of one hundred thousand dollars or an amount equal to one hundred percent of the
11	licensee's average daily money transmission liability in this state calculated for the most recently completed

13	361.1014. 1. The commissioner may issue an order suspending or revoking the designation of an
14	authorized delegate, if the commissioner finds that:

17	(2) The authorized delegate did not cooperate with an examination or investigation by the

29	adopted or order issued under sections 361.900 to 361.1035, and the previous conduct of the authorized
30	delegate.
31	3. An authorized delegate may apply for relief from a suspension or revocation of designation as an
32	authorized delegate according to procedures prescribed by the commissioner.
33	361.1017. 1. If the commissioner determines that a violation of sections 361.900 to 361.1035 or of a
34	rule adopted or an order issued under sections 361.900 to 361.1035 by a licensee or authorized delegate is
35	likely to cause immediate and irreparable harm to the licensee, its customers, or the public as a result of the

8	5. An order to cease and desist expires unless the commissioner commences an administrative

10	361.1020. The commissioner may enter into a consent order at any time with a person to resolve a
11	matter arising under sections 361.900 to 361.1035 or a rule adopted or order issued under sections 361.900 to
12	361.1035. A consent order shall be signed by the person to whom it is issued or by the person's authorized
13	representative and shall indicate agreement with the terms contained in the order. A consent order may

23	purposes of determining whether a transaction is a business purpose transaction, the provider may rely on any
24	written statement of intended purpose signed by the business. The statement may be a separate statement or
25	may be contained in an application, agreement, or other document signed by the business or the business
26	owner or owners;
27	(6) "Commercial financing product", any commercial loan, accounts receivable purchase transaction,
28	commercial open-end credit plan, or each to the extent the transaction is a business purpose transaction;
29	(7) "Commercial loan", a loan to a business, whether secured or unsecured;
30	(8) "Commercial open-end credit plan", commercial financing extended by any provider under a
31	plan in which:
32	(a) The provider reasonably contemplates repeat transactions; and
33	(b) The amount of financing that may be extended to the business during the term of the plan, up to
34	any limit set by the provider, is generally made available to the extent that any outstanding balance is repaid;
35	(9) "Depository institution", any of the following:
36	(a) A bank, trust company, or industrial loan company doing business under the authority of, or in
37	accordance with, a license, certificate, or charter issued by the United States, this state, or any other state,
38	district, territory, or commonwealth of the United States that is authorized to transact business in this state;
39	(b) A federally chartered savings and loan association, federal savings bank, or federal credit union

1	that is authorized to transact business in this state; and
2	(c) A savings and loan association, savings bank, or credit union organized under the laws of this or
3	any other state that is authorized to transact business in this state;
4	(10) "General intangible", any personal property, including things in action, other than accounts,
5	chattel paper, commercial tort claims, deposit accounts, documents, goods, instruments, investment property,
6	letter-of-credit rights, letters of credit, moneys, and oil, gas, or other minerals before extraction. "General
7	intangible" also includes payment intangibles and software;
8	(11) "Payment intangible", a general intangible under which the account debtor's principal obligation
9	is a monetary obligation;
10	(12) "Provider", a person who consummates more than five commercial financing products to a
11	business located in this state in any calendar year. "Provider" also includes a person who enters into a written
12	agreement with a depository institution to arrange for the extension of a commercial financing product by the
13	depository institution to a business via an online lending platform administered by the person. The fact that a
14	provider extends a specific offer for a commercial financing product on behalf of a depository institution shall
15	not be construed to mean that the provider engaged in lending or financing or originated such loan or
16	financing.
17	3. (1) A provider who consummates a commercial financing product shall disclose the terms of the
18	commercial financing product as required by this section. The disclosures shall be provided at or before
19	consummation of the transaction. Only one disclosure is required for each commercial financing product,

29	(c) The total amount to be paid to the provider pursuant to the commercial financing product
30	agreement. This disclosure shall be labeled "Total of Payments";
31	(d) The total dollar cost of the commercial financing product under the terms of the agreement,
32	derived by subtracting the total amount of funds provided from the total of payments. This calculation shall
33	include any fees or charges deducted by the provider from the "Total Amount of Funds Provided". This
34	disclosure shall be labeled "Total Dollar Cost of Financing";
35	(e) The manner, frequency, and amount of each payment. This disclosure shall be labeled
36	"Payments". If the payments may vary, the provider shall instead disclose the manner, frequency, and the
37	estimated amount of the initial payment labeled "Estimated Payments", and the commercial financing product
38	agreement shall include a description of the methodology for calculating any variable payment and the
39	circumstances when payments may vary; and

1	(f) A statement of whether there are any costs or discounts associated with prepayment of the
2	commercial financing product, including a reference to the paragraph in the agreement that creates the
3	contractual rights of the parties related to prepayment. This disclosure shall be labeled "Prepayment".
4	4. This section shall not apply to the following:
5	(1) A provider that is a depository institution or a subsidiary or service corporation that is:
6	(a) Owned and controlled by a depository institution; and
7	(b) Regulated by a federal banking agency;
8	(2) A provider that is a lender regulated under the federal Farm Credit Act, 12 U.S.C. Sec. 2001 et
9	seq.:
10	(3) A commercial financing product that is:
11	(a) Secured by real property;
12	(b) A lease; or
13	(c) A purchase-money obligation that is incurred as all or part of the price of the collateral or for
14	value given to enable the business to acquire rights in or the use of the collateral if the value is in fact so used;
15	(4) A commercial financing product in which the recipient is a motor vehicle dealer or an affiliate of
16	such a dealer, or a vehicle rental company, or an affiliate of such a company, pursuant to a commercial loan or
17	commercial open-end credit plan of at least fifty thousand dollars or a commercial financing product offered
18	by a person in connection with the sale or lease of products or services that such person manufactures,
19	licenses, or distributes, or whose parent company or any of its directly or indirectly owned and controlled
